The Eight Principles of Unitarian Universalism

1. The inherent worth and dignity of every person
2. Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations
3. Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth
4. A free and responsible search for truth and meaning
5. The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process
6. The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all
7. Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part
8. Commitment to dismantling racism and other oppressions while promoting a diverse and multicultural community.

Unitarian Universalist Shared Values

Justice – We build diverse, multicultural Beloved Communities that promote the thriving of all.

Interdependence – We honor the interdependent web of all existence and acknowledge our place and role in sustaining it.

Equity – Every person is inherently worthy and has the right to flourish with dignity, love, and compassion.

Generosity – We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope, freely sharing our faith, presence, and resources.

Pluralism – We celebrate that we are all sacred beings. We embrace and learn from our differences and commonalities.

Transformation – We adapt to a changing world, collectively transforming the growing spiritually and ethically.

The Ten Commitments – Living Humanist Values

1. Empathy – I will consider other people's thoughts, feelings, and experiences.
2. Critical Thinking – I will practice good judgement by asking questions and thinking for myself.
3. Responsibility – I will be a good person even when no one is looking and own the consequences of my actions.
4. Ethical Development – I will always focus on becoming a better person.

5. Global Awareness – I will be a good neighbor to the people who share the Earth with me and help make the world a better place for everyone.
6. Peace & Social Justice – I will help people solve problems and handle disagreements in ways that are fair for everyone.
7. Environmentalism – I will take care of the Earth and the life on it.
8. Service & Participation – I will help my community in ways that let me get to know the people I'm helping.
9. Humility – I will be aware of my strengths and weaknesses, and appreciate the strengths and weaknesses of others.
10. Altruism – I will help others in need without hoping for rewards.

The God Delusion

The alternative to the Ten Commandments cited by Dawkins in The God Delusion is^[1]:

1. Do not do to others what you would not want them to do to you
2. In all things, strive to cause no harm
3. Treat your fellow human beings, your fellow living things, and the world in general with love, honesty, faithfulness and respect.
4. Do not overlook evil or shrink from administering justice, but always be ready to forgive wrongdoing freely admitted and honestly regretted.
5. Live life with a sense of joy and wonder
6. Always seek to be learning something new
7. Test all things; always check your ideas against the facts, and be ready to discard even a cherished belief if it does not conform to them.
8. Never seek to censor or cut yourself off from dissent; always respect the right of others to disagree with you.
9. Form independent opinions on the basis of your own reason and experience; do not allow yourself to be led blindly by others.
10. Question everything

Tellapallet

Another set of ten commandments is^[2]:

1. Do unto others as you would have others do unto you
2. Preserve things of beauty for future generations to enjoy
3. Never stop learning and growing
4. Be tolerant and open-minded
5. Question authority

6. Make decisions based on reason and facts, rather than superstition and hope
7. Tell the truth
8. Resolve conflicts with dialogue rather than violence
9. Oppose injustice
10. Don't discriminate based on race, gender, or religion

Pagan - Another set of alternative commandments^[3] is:

1. Treat the Earth and all that dwell thereon with respect.
2. Remain close to the Great Spirit.
3. Show great consideration for your fellow beings.
4. Work together for the benefit of all humankind.
5. Give assistance and kindness wherever needed.
6. Look after the well-being of mind and body.
7. Dedicate a share of your efforts to the greater good.
8. Be truthful and honest at all times.
9. Take full responsibility for all your actions
10. Do what you know to be right.
