

Social Action—"One More Step!"

Our Share the Plate donation for March raised over \$120 for the Muscular Dystrophy Foundation. The April donation will go to local women's shelters. In the coming year, we hope to establish a program that may utilize the proceeds from several Second Sundays to commit to a larger project in the community.

NTAUUS is pleased to sponsor a Social Justice Empowerment Workshop. The workshop is scheduled to begin at 9:00 a.m. on April 11 at Horizon in Carrollton. Two facilitators from the UUA, Rev. Carole Ann Cole and Susan Leslie, will lead the session. NTAUUS is covering the cost of the workshop, so there is not expense for our attendees other than transportation. RRUU will be sending four representatives.

2-1-1 Texas, the Texoma Area Information Center has recently offered our Social Action Committee a seat on their board. 2-1-1 is a professionally staffed service that provides quick information and referrals to services such as finding food, shelter, clothing, medical, and mental health assistance. It can also provide questions regarding eldercare, housing assistance, affordable childcare, disaster relief and much more. Simply pick up the phone and dial 211. There are many services available that go unused simple because of a lack of awareness.

By the time this goes to press, we will hopefully have completed our Habitat project and the Baker Lake Cleanup. I say hopefully, because the weather forecast is not promising. In the event that the Habitat project is postponed, it will be rescheduled for April 4. Please check the bulletin boards for pictures of both events.

At the 2008 General Assembly in Ft. Lauderdale, delegates selected "Ethical Eating: Food and Environmental Justice" as a Congregational Study/Action Issue 2008-2012. 
Hunting for Easter-Cans!?

I'll start with our Ushers and Collection Counters. Without them our Sunday collections would not make into the bank. Our Treasurer makes sure those funds are recorded correctly and pays all our bills. Our Finance Committee helps plan our budget and oversees our financial operations. Our Stewardship Committee makes sure we have the resources to keep operating and pay those bills. Our Chalice Circles help keep us connected with each other and with the larger community, and their Facilitators deserve our gratitude for their or-ganizational work. Thanks in particular this month to our Green Team, led by Amy Hoffman-Shehan, Marla Loturco and Kris Riek, who are putting together the most impressive Earth Day Festival our area has ever seen. Also, we cannot forget our Church Directory Team, headed by Jim Murphy and Marla Loturco, who are putting the finishing touches on our best church directory ever. Thanks also to David Lawrence, who keeps our Social Action and Charity Work going month after month. And to John Ockels for coordinating our Adult Religious Education classes and to the teachers who teach our children and youth. And of course, my fellow Board Members and the Committee on Ministry, all of who have been working especially hard during this time of year.

I don't have the space to mention every one I should, including all our various church committees and their leaders. My special thanks go out to all the unsung and even unnoticed RRUU heroes. It has been said that our church could not possibly afford to pay for all the work that is done for it and on its behalf. We are grateful, therefore, for our members, newcomers and old-timers, who have taken the initiative to volunteer and to be willing to serve when called upon. Without such generosity of time, energy and spirit, our little church would not exist. Each contribution of money, time, talent, and presence, no matter how small or how large, is absolutely essential to the health and well being of our church community. February 2009 Treasurer's Report

RRUU is still doing very well financially. For March, we had total revenues of \$5,114.81, and our expenses were \$5,582.59, resulting in a net loss of \$467.78. For the fiscal year-to-date, we had total revenue of \$45,617.83 and our expenses were \$45,508.61, resulting is a year-to-date net gain of \$109.22. As of March 31, 2009, RRUU has a total of \$53,091.29 in the bank in checking accounts, savings accounts, and CD's. Those funds are dedicated as follows:

6-Month Emergency Reserve	30,392.50
New Home Fund - Restricted Assets	5,695.00
DBLE Scholarships - Restricted Assets	1,000.00
Uncommitted Funds	16,003.79

I have configured my accounting software to track pledges, and I update those pledges on a weekly basis. On the Journey...

From the Rev. Mark Morrison-Reed, Unitarian Universalist Minister

"The central task of the religious community is to unveil the bonds that bind each to all. There is a connectedness, a relationship discovered amid the particulars of our own lives and the lives of others. Once felt, it inspires us to act for justice. It is the church that assures us that we are not struggling for justice on our own, but as members of a larger community. The religious community is essential, for alone our vision is too narrow to see all that must be seen, and our strength too limited to do all that must be done. Together, our vision widens and our strength is renewed."

After using these words at the start of the stewardship campaign on March 8, I find there is more to say about how important it is "to unveil the bonds." In the March newsletter column, I offer a summary of many developments in the congregation. However, judging growth in how we are related to one another is harder to explain with facts and figures. Speaking for myself, I am very aware of the challenge of building a relationship when I may see the general congregation but once a month. Depending on schedules, a month or more may go by before we can say hello again in person. I have not had the chance to get to know many of you in depth beyond the leaders on the committees with which I work. Many of you may not know much of me outside of the services I lead and what I offer in the monthly newsletter. Yet, it may surprise you to know that when I speak of this church at the monthly Unitarian Universalist minister's meetings around the metroplex, I describe Red River as a light in my life. I enjoy being part of this community and seeing how you change and grow as a liberal voice in Texoma. My highest priority with this church is to serve as I am able to support your development.

It is my privilege to work with a congregation at its forming edge, where many of the patterns of how the community is with long members, new friends, and those in its service are in formation. Those patterns can be infused with health and adjusted along the way much more easily than those churches with more decades and centuries of life. The significance of unveiling the bonds is not just to discover their existence, though mere presence is powerful in its own right. e.e. cummings describes the "human merely being". Knowledge of another's existence is indeed enough to act for justice. The next step is to go further in expanding the networks among us that will support a broader vision and a greater strength. As the church grows in numbers of people, each of us will be called to use greater levels of communication. This community has gone beyond the size of an extended family. RRUU is now a multi-celled community, with its own channels and groups within the whole. More than ever RRUU needs the gift of assuming good intentions and direct conversation. This religious community exists because of your willingness to unveil the bonds time and again. We are all on the same side in nurturing Unitarian Universalism in the Southwest. I have faith that we can succeed beyond all imagination if we so desire.
