The twelve sessions each introduce a different meditative practice that is designed to heighten awareness and being in the moment. Attendance at any of the earlier sessions is not required, and workbooks will be made available as needed for a fee of \$10. Areas explored so far have been memorization of poetry and developing a practice of waiting.

Board Bits

What your board did at the last meeting (August 18, 2009)

- We were all present except for Jim Murphy who was on a business trip. We started the meeting at 6:13 p.m. with a check in. We went home at 8:21 p.m.
- Don Durland acted as our Process Observer and timekeeper for the meeting.
- Minutes were approved for the last meeting. Reports were accepted.
- Still have many leadership positions open and all on the board are going to be looking for people who would volunteer to fill those positions including the Safe Congregation Panel
- Dianna Niemann-Harris has agreed to be interim chair for the Social Action Committee as she will be working on the NTAUUS Social Action Committee as well.
- Membership intent to join card was discussed tabled until after the bylaws are rewritten.
- Reviewed current to-do lists of individual board member proiects
- Discussed Board Email Policy Unanimous acceptance by board for our own email policy – will be presented to the congregation for approval as RRUU Email Policy at the next congregational meeting.
- Review of August 15th workshop presented by Daniel Polk, President of NTAUUS. Overall consensus it was very worthwhile. A couple of immediate ideas to be pursued –
 Short range planning committee for RRUU direction (5 year plan is due to be reworked beginning in the spring) –
 Develop an all church covenant of how we treat each other.
- Letter of apology to the congregation was approved and will be mailed to members within the next month.
- Healing Circle will be held on September 26th with Margaret Borden from Austin Texas as mediator.
- Concerns of Congregation Doyle Adams expressed his concerns.
- RRUU ads will be placed in the playbills for SPC & Theatricks. Planned to reach approximately 8000 individuals and also to support a local community event.

If you would like to see the full board minutes – they will be posted on the "Board Board" in the back of the Sanctuary as soon as it is available. The next board meeting is September 15th starting at 6:30 p.m. Board meetings are open to all, if you wish to be on the agenda please contact a board member. Deadline for the agenda is September 11. Those wishing a few minutes during the "open mic" will want to be ready to speak near the end of the meeting.

Message from Marla Marla Loturco, President, RRUU



A warm and loving thank you is in order for Daniel Polk, current NTAUUS President, for the workshop he presented at RRUU on August 15, 2009. I hope those of you who attended were as pleased by the results of the day as the board and I were. For those of you who missed the opportunity I would like to share some of the information from the day that I found the most helpful.

The morning session was devoted to Governance Models and Goal-setting.

The governance model that Red River Unitarian Church currently is developing looks to be closest to Board-Committee. In this model each board member also serves on a committee and acts as a liaison between the committee and the board. Committees have some decisional capabilities which are currently being determined. This is an ongoing learning situation and will take time for us to work out exactly how this will function.

RRUU has a Mission Statement (on the website if you are not familiar with it) which was adopted in March 2002 and a five year plan which ends this year. Another part of the morning seminar was a look at how 5 year plans are developed. First a Vision and Mission statement are devised. From there goals are set by the board to accomplish that mission, along with strategies to reach each goal. Committees then develop specific action items. Daniel recommended we have an outside facilitator trained in growing churches assist us in beginning this process when we are ready.

The tone of the afternoon session was set by a quote from Hosea Ballou. "If we agree in love, no disagreement can do us injury; if we do not, there is none that can do us any good."

During the afternoon session the participants developed a covenant to govern our time together as a group. There were some beginning statements which participants were encouraged to add to, change, or remove from the covenant. The goal was to create a covenant that all participants could agree to. When it was finished everyone signed it to show that they chose to live by this agreement. The covenant we developed for the workshop is paraphrased as follows:

We, the members of Red River Unitarian Universalist Church, agree that in our interactions with each other we will:

- * Speak from our own experiences and use "I" statements.
- * Remember the other person's perspective while avoiding making assumptions.
- * Separate the person and the behavior.
- * Participate in community but reserve the right to pass.
- *Stay within clear boundaries and ask ourselves if we are within the guidelines.
- * Address the other person respectfully and listen respectfully.
- * Remember the positive in the other person.
- * Refrain from side conversations and triangular communications.
- * Look for common ground.
- * Respect other's privacy and confidentiality.
- * Learn to expect unfinished business.
- * Learn to let go.
- * Practice forgiveness and find our own absolution.
- * Support the congregation.

Please look over this covenant and think about what you would like to change to make this a covenant that RRUU members could affirm to live by. We would like to create this covenant in the next congregational meeting and adopt it as our guideline for living together in right relations. Just in case others have the same misconception I had, I thought the statement we make each Sunday during the worship service was a covenant. In fact, it is an affirmation we say each Sunday and is not a covenantal relationship between members of RRUU.

The rest of the afternoon was spent discussing conflict management, respectful listening, overcoming the obstacles to resolution, and small group discussions on various topics. It was a learning filled day and many of us followed up by going to the PFFFT (outdoor chalice circle) gathering in the evening to relax and enjoy each other in a informal setting. To those of you who didn't join us – we missed you!


