Logo Committee will continue work on the logos as directed by Congregation.




E-mail Etiquette Tip of the Month

2009 NTAUUS AWARDS PROGRAM

The North Texas Association of Unitarian Universalist Societies (NTAUUS) is formally announcing the creation of its first annual NTAUUS recognition awards. Jim Murphy acted as our Process Observer and timekeeper for the meeting.

Minutes were approved for the last meeting and reports were accepted.

Again need one more person for Safe Congregation Panel

Three people are attending the SWUUC Fall Leadership Conference from the church, either paying for it themselves or with some scholarship reimbursements. Marla Loturco is taking the Small Vital Congregations Track, Carla Murphy is taking the Beyond Fundraising Track and Penny Armstrong is taking the Religious Education Track.

To do lists are being accomplished by each board member but they continue to keep growing each month.

The Short Term plan was reviewed and we began to work on a plan of action to accomplish the tasks. Each committee is being asked to submit policies & procedures, please consider including: Definition/description of committee, Policies, Estimated time commitments, & skill requirements for membership.

Carla Murphy will be replacing Dianna Niemann-Harris as NTAUUS representative until such time as the number of representatives from small churches is changed to one.

Brief discussion of our response to Temple Beth Emeth and thanks to the congregation for their warm generosity.

Cynthia brought the minutes of the Congregational Meeting for the board to read/discuss for possible additions/clarifications. We reviewed all aspects of the Congregational Meeting to determine which things worked and what we might change for the next meeting.

The next board meeting is December 8th, starting at 6:30 p.m. Board meetings are open to all: if you wish to be on the agenda please contact a board member. Deadline for the agenda is December 4th. Treasurer's Report

November, 2009

Income, "in kind" giving and fiscal management at RRUU continue in profoundly positive ways. With the revised budget adopted at the special congregational meeting, the effort of the Board to be good stewards of the church resources is greatly enhanced.

It is with GREAT delight I am able to report to you the ChaliceArt Sale held in late November exceeded the income from any previous sale. Many thanks to everyone who made the choice to wear their UU faith and purchased pieces through the sale. Please speak to Carolyn or Bruce Cameron (our incredible ChalceArtists and benefactors) if you would yet like to make a purchase. With some purchases still in progress, a final figure from this awesome fund raiser is not available as of newsletter deadline.

Following is a synopsis of the most recent treasurer's report to the Board.

For October we had total revenues of \$1,798.28 and our expenses were \$3,075.81 for an (anticipated) net loss of \$1,277.53. October included three weeks of worship honoraria plus a double payment of our "fair share" to SWUUC and NTAUUS to bring us up to date. These expenditures were made based on the September net profit of 1,136.50. In addition to these figures, a special offering was received in response to the desecration of the Beth Emeth Synagogue in Sherman. The \$440 collected was forwarded to our sisters and brothers at Beth Emeth who graciously received our gifts.

Message from Marla Marla Loturco, President, RRUU



What a wonderful Congregational meeting we had on Nov 8th. With over 50% of the membership participating – an impressive number by any standards, we did good work together. Bylaws are dynamic - they continue to grow and change to reflect the church growth and change. We passed a new set of by-laws, reducing the number of pages from 23 to 9 and couldn't have done it without the extensive labor of love done by the by-laws committee: Jim Murphy, L.D. Clark, Gerry Shehan and Don Durland who reviewed a number of by-laws from UU churches across the country. None were 23 pages long! Thanks also to the congregation input for some fine tuning.

We also approved a revised budget for the remainder of the fiscal year (through Jun 30); endorsed the Green Team's Guidelines regarding sustainability; and approved a Congregational Behavioral Covenant.

Carolyn Cameron and Sue Wells were elected to the Committee on Ministry and will join Elbert Hill who has one year remaining on his term. Our by-laws state that openings due to resignation on the Nominating Committee shall be filled by appointment, but because the Nominating committee is normally elected by the congregation, I asked for a straw vote on a slate of people who were presented by the board. Dan Althoff and Shann Schubert were the final recommendation from the meeting and were appointed by me to join Marion Hill.

We also looked at various designs being considered to update our church logo. The general feeling is to incorporate a flaming chalice and a river in a design that can become uniquely Red River UU Church. I have been told by the Logo Committee that you will find the final designs elsewhere in this issue of the newsletter.

I must admit I was somewhat nervous about presiding at my first-ever congregational meeting and want to express a sincere thank you to everyone. We managed to wade through a series of important issues, engage in lively conversations and finish in a bit over two hours. The atmosphere was friendly, cheerful, informative, supportive and encouraging. What a tremendous group of kindred spirits we are!

Three members of the congregation attended the Southwestern Unitarian Universalist Conference (SWUUC) Leadership Training in November. Penny Armstrong, Carla Murphy and I ventured to Glen Lake Conference Center in Glen Rose for a week-end of concentrated training. Carla Murphy brings back lots of valuable information on Church Funding - stewardship drives, fund raisers, and money management. Penny Armstrong found lots of helpful information for Religious Education, Safe Congregations and to assist her in co-facilitating the Adult Forum along with Suzanne Durland. I attended the Small Vital Congregations and learned various approaches for growing a church, working with conflicts and making ourselves known in the community. Each of the churches represented in my session made a brief presentation on their church and what we do in the community. Our church received high praise for our Earth Day Festival as a way that small numbers may make a big difference in a community. The whole congregation benefits from such training programs that are offered throughout the year. It not only is a great way to glean valuable information, it is wonderful to meet other UU's and learn what they do in their local congregations. Conferences will be posted in the church foyer as they are announced and anyone interested may attend.

If there is anything that all Unitarian Universalists enjoy, it is breaking bread together and our Thanksgiving Feast for 54 people was a splendid ending to a moving Thanksgiving worship celebration centering on gratitude. I will always be awed by the culinary talents that culminate in such delicious selections. I am equally awed by the bonds of fellowship we create and am honored to play a part in what it is that brings each of us to the church.

I was also overwhelmed by the response to our fundraiser. I want to thank Carolyn and Bruce for hosting the Chalice Art Fund Raiser and everyone who purchased jewelry in support of RRUU. We made \$3265 for RRUU which is the largest Chalice Art Fund Raiser yet!


The Holidays of December are upon us. The Season of the Heart is a precious time and isn't it wonderful that we have a church family with which to share it?

WELCOMING CONGREGATION PROGRAM

The following excerpt from the UUA website briefly describes the welcoming congregation program. The idea of establishing RRUU as an official welcoming congregation has been mentioned and may be brought up as long-range planning gets underway. The Board would like to know if you have thoughts on the matter.

History

In 1987 the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) established the Common Vision Planning Committee. This committee found many negative attitudes, deep prejudices, and profound ignorance about bisexual, gay, and lesbian people, which resulted in the exclusion of bisexual, gay, and lesbian people from their churches. As a result of these findings, the delegates of the 1989 UUA General Assembly voted overwhelmingly to initiate the Welcoming Congregation program to educate its members. Each congregation adapts the program to best meet its goals and each unique situation can bring positive changes to individuals and congregations.

What's Ahead

Our vision goes beyond the Welcoming Congregation Program. By taking this first step, we hope to explore more issues than those presented here—like sexism, racism, ableism, to name just a few. Becoming a Welcoming Congregation will act as a catalyst to learning more about ourselves and to ending exclusion. Only when we are truly open to the wealth of diversity in our world will the inherent worth and dignity of every person be affirmed with a large voice.
