Gifts beyond a pledge and other fund raisers will be appreciated and well directed, but having a specific pledged amount is essential to the flow and operation in our church.

Please carefully consider what a fair share of support might be and pledge that amount during this pledge period. With your support, Red River Unitarian Universalist Church will continue to be a home for liberal and broad-minded seekers of truth and justice. RRUU will be here for you.

Fill the Plate Drive to Feed the Hungry begins at RRUU

When two or more of the RRUU family get together, things begin to happen. Actually, the happening began with eight RRUUers gathered in Adult Forum on February 21st to explore the future of our Social Action Committee. Acting chairperson Dianna Niemann-Harris guided Chelsea, Penny, Paula, Marla, Don, Amy and Suzanne through the process of considering a new idea which the group heartily adopted!

Beginning this month, March 2010 in addition to our regular "Share the Plate" monthly offering, RRUU will also be engaged in filling the plates of hungry people in our community! A large plastic bin is now located in the back of the sanctuary complete with wheels for easy moving and a slotted lock box for financial contributions to help "Fill the Plate."

Members and friends of RRUU are invited throughout the month to bring donations of paper products (tissue, toilet paper, paper towel, napkins, sanitary supplies) and/or hygiene items (toothpaste, deodorant, smaller bottles of shampoo, conditioner, mouthwash, etc.) to fill the plastic bin. Non-perishable food may also be included, however donations of cash or check in the lock box afford the food pantry to purchase food for 10 cents a pound, far less than individuals would pay per pound to buy and donate food.

The fourth Sunday of each month has been designated "Fill the Plate" day, at which time there will be a brief dedication of our food pantry gifts as part of the morning service. For our first quarter (March, April, May) of "Fill the Plate", Dianna has agreed to deliver the donated items and a check for the total in monetary gifts to the Grayson County Shelter food pantry. Amy Hoffman-Shehan will be compiling suggested giving items and researching other pantries to receive our gifts in the future on a rotational basis. Penny Armstrong will insure information is submitted for the monthly newsletter and weekly announcements and Enews. Marla Loturco and Paula Blackshear will tally the deposit of cash and checks the 4th Sunday of the month, add the deposit to the bag to go to the bank, and give the treasurer the deposit slip copy for writing the monthly check to the food pantry. Chelsea, Marla, Amy, Penny and Dianna agreed to take rotational turns doing the dedication in worship. Others who feel moved to be a more active part of this project are most welcome to talk with or email Dianna (socialaction@rruu.org) to be added into the rotation. Together we will "Fill the Plate" and help address hunger throughout the region!

P.S. Suzanne Durland is researching a "Hat's Off" project for providing baseball caps or other hats with good eye shade to send to field workers whose eyesight is at risk from harvesting in regions of intense sunlight... more to come on this as the project develops!

Deadline for the agenda, and reports to the board, is March 5th. Those wishing a few minutes during the "open mic" will want to be ready to speak near the end of the meeting.



Each month I serve as Treasurer at RRUU my appreciation for those who have held this position through the years in churches expands and deepens. That is probably most richly true for the month of January during which I had my lifetime first experience with completing W-2 and 1099 forms for employees while compiling calendar year giving statements for members and friends of RRUU.

Despite some snags and initial errors on my part, the four 1099 forms and five W-2 forms as well as our employer W-3 form were all completed, submitted accurately and timely to the IRS with appropriate copies to current and former employers and contract staff. 2009 giving reports were mailed January 15th to former members and distributed to current members and friends of RRUU on the last two Sundays of January.

Our January income was \$7,095.75 and our expenses were \$3,019.83 for a net income of \$4,075.92. The income includes the \$2038.80 special collections for Haitian Relief. Our Second Sunday **"Share the Plate" offerings for January will go** to NAACP as will the February Second Sunday gifts.

As of the first Sunday in 2010 weekly offerings are being entered in our computer accounting program crediting the individual giving units. I have hopes of finding time to enter this data (now on paper) for July to December of 2009 as well.

The Value of Personal Spiritual Practice Denise Davidoff, former UUA Moderator

I was raised in a conservative Jewish home by parents who were the children of immigrants from Eastern Europe. My parents were well-educated and assimilated and successful. They were living the great dream of America. Mom and Dad offered my brother and me advantages and middle class privilege. They offered us freedom to think and dream, but the offer did not cover religious training. They could not imagine a child of theirs who would question Hebrew scripture. They could not imagine, much less sanction, a child of theirs leaving the tent.

But in my college years at Vassar, I began to do just that. Twenty years before the emergence of a vocabulary of feminist religious thought, I cringed from the patriarchy, resisted the chains of orthodoxy, peeked tentatively outside the walls that felt so stultifying. What was out there?

Well, you know what was out there, awaiting my discovery at age 28, now forty-five years ago. Unitarianism, just one year away from becoming Unitarian

Universalism. That's what was out there!

It is my practice to take time to consciously acknowledge the gift of life most every day. I look at the world about me and acknowledge awe before the miracles of nature.

I acknowledge the joy of family, the blessings of health and the comfort of substantial material possessions. It took me a while to realize that this practice is actually meditation, perhaps it is prayer. It is a personal religious ritual, simple and at the same time complex and, I believe, very Unitarian Universalist.

Given the freedom to figure out how to be conscious of the grace in my life, disobliged to repeat a litany not of my choosing, encouraged to be awake to wonder, I can see that I am growing into the life of a serious religionist. I love this facet of Unitarian Universalism more than any other. The imperative to learn, to discover, to not necessarily finish up where one starts. How lucky can we get to have this opportunity for spiritual sustenance and deep worship experience! The challenge is to get more of us to understand and value the gift.

I tell you these intimate details about my spiritual life because it is important for you to understand that if I am effective as a UUA leader, it is because I engage in individual spiritual practice. This relationship between the private person of liberal faith and the liberal faith public figure, this necessary source of centeredness and energy is the single most valuable lesson I have learned in the course of serving the Association in a variety of roles. The lesson is profound and ample payment for going to all those endless meetings!

Stephen Covey, author of the book First Things **First, writes: "We settle for the illusion society sells us** that meaning is in self-focus, self-esteem, self **development, self improvement. It's what I want. Let** me do my own thing. I did it my way. But the wisdom literature of thousands of years of history repeatedly validates the reality that the greatest fulfillment comes in our willingness to more effectively reach out and help others and to live for something **higher than ourselves. I think that's why we gather in congregations. I think that's the essence of our com**mon call as Unitarian Universalists.

Callie Clinic to Receive March 14th "Share the Plate" Offering

Recognizing the needs in our communities and our obligation to give as well as receive, Red River Unitarian Universalist Church has a tradition of having "Share the Plate" the second Sunday of each month. On "Share the Plate" Sunday, all cash offerings in the morning collection are given to a particular non-profit organization in one of the areas where our members live.

All cash gifts in our offering on March 14, 2010 will go to the Callie Clinic, formerly known as ARCOT. ARCOT began in 1991 to serve Grayson, Fannin and Cooke Counties. In 2007 the name was changed to Callie Clinic to honor Callie Frost who served the Texoma community with her charitable efforts. The clinic is the sole provider in the tri-county area for individuals impacted by HIV/AIDS. Funding comes from the donations from the community and foundations as well as state and federal grants.

While all services funded by the grants are limited to Grayson, Fannin and Cooke Counties, with donated funds and items, Callie Clinic is also able to provide some limited assistance to individuals from Southern Oklahoma. Please consider the incredible difference this program makes to those impacted by HIV/AIDS in **our region and add your "green" to share hope and** kindness on March 14th.
