attend the Dwight Brown Leadership Experience this summer, Penny Armstrong and Joyce Peak were accepted into the program <u>and</u> the North Texas Association of Unitarian Universalist Societies (NTAUUS) will help with expenses to send these awesome congregational leaders to the DBLE program.

### Texoma Earth Day Festival, 2010

The Earth Day Festival went as smoothly as it could with rain delays in the early morning and high winds all day. We received many compliments about how well organized the festival



was. Our biggest improvement from last year was the addition of signage to post schedules and honor sponsors. We received many compliments on the printed program, which was designed and sponsored by CORE (through Paula Brennecke's contributions).

We were honored to have Tom "Smitty" Smith, Director of Public Citizen of Texas and Texas' most decorated environmentalist, as key note speaker. The timing couldn't have been better, as two Grayson County communities are facing the possibility of cement plants being licensed. The festival featured 4 workshop areas, a wide variety of vendors, and fantastic children's activities. Workshops were well received and offered information on gardening, health and nutrition, and alternative energy.

The festival was organized by the Green Team (primarily 2 people at this time) and a handful of community leaders from other organizations. We're grateful for the members of RRUU who came through for us to volunteer at the event. We wouldn't have made it through the day without them.

A wide number of area and local events (Jazz Fest in Denton, German Fest in Muenster, an Earth Day event in McKinney, and a Home & Garden Show in town) hurt our attendance numbers. The vendors felt it in their pocket books.

As a reflection of the economy, funding for the festival was very tight. We'll be lucky to meet all of the expenses of the festival and will have no startup money for next year's festival. RRUU members can help by shopping the Green Team table for left over volunteer t-shirts for \$5 or canvas shopping bags or Better Shopping Guides for \$10 each.

RRUU has been asked by one of its members to provide a donation basket to The Rehabilitation Center: Therapeutic Solutions for Children and Adults. They are sponsoring a Ribs for Rehab event on June 18, 2010. Two years ago RRUU provided a selection of fair trade items in a basket. 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#### Board Bits What your Board did at their last meeting, March 9th



Everyone on the board was in attendance with the Everyone on the board was in attendance with the exception of Dianna N-H. We started at 6:40 pm and went home around 9:00 pm. Dan Altoff attended at the board's request to report to the board on the nominations and finance committees' work. Doyle Adams attended to express cares and concerns and give a brief report on the Buildings & Grounds Committee.

Amy H-S acted as our Process Observer and timekeeper for the meeting.

Minutes were approved for the last meeting and reports were accepted.

Board decided to nominate Joyce Peak and Penny Bertrand to attend DBLE

Dianna N-H and Dan Althoff volunteered to be SWUUC representatives for the meeting to be held on April 24, 2010.

Special reports on the Sound Equipment (using the \$2500 Grant from NTAUUS), Stewardship Campaign, By-Laws Changes, RRUU Sign status, and NTAUUS were given.

We have a new sign to put up for the church - now we need permits from the city.

Brief update on the policies & procedures report and some feedback from non-board members, reports from the nominations committee on the status of the slate and the finance committee on the status of the budget - both needed for the May Congregational Meeting.

Discussion of the Congregational Meeting on May 16 and the steps that need to be accomplished prior to the meeting. Decision was made to post all materials for the May 16 meeting on the website and send emails as well as a postcard to let people know the materials are available on line. People without email will receive the normal packet via USP mail.

Amy will be contacting Joe Sullivan to see if he will assist RRUU in developing a comprehensive 5 year plan, including goals and actions. RRUU received a \$3300 grant from NTAUUS for that purpose, and to purchase church leadership books. We need to report back officially to NTAUUS in September on the status of the process.

Next board meeting we will be talking about a timeline for re-arranging the sanctuary for the new sound system.

If you would like to see the full board minutes – they will be posted on the "Board Board" in the back of the Sanctuary as soon as they are available. There is also a Book with the minutes that have been removed from being posted. The next board meeting is May 11th, starting at 6:30 p.m. Board meetings are open to all; if you wish to be on the agenda please contact a board member. Deadline for the agenda, and reports to the board, is May 7th. Those wishing a few minutes during the "open mic" will want to be ready to speak near the end of the meeting.

### Treasurer's Report

As your reluctant treasurer a few weeks ago I experienced an emotional, intellectual, spiritual and soul satisfying time of indescribable relief... and burst



into singing the Halleluiah Chorus... we have a candidate for election as the new treasurer! While I have done my best to fill this role for the past 10 months and learned a phenomenal amount, it will be with great relief I pass the task on and share with the new treasurer as she learns the job. Thanks to you each and all for the support as I made my way fumbling and bumbling through the year as treasurer.

The emphasis for April was supporting, encouraging and assisting our Campaign Co-Chairs Suzanne and Don Durland **to kick off this year's pledge drive.** This included composing the list for the Celebration Dinner, putting together the invitations and mailing them out. As treasurer I was also involved in recording and encouraging the pre-pledges by the leadership of RRUU and have the continued responsibility of tracking all pledges as they come in. My final part of this process will be to join with others in contacting members who have not yet responded and encouraging them to make a commitment for giving in fiscal year 2011 (June 2010 to May 2011).

Our March income was \$2,765.34 and our expenses were \$2,865.43 for a net loss of \$109.00. Considering we had three paid Pulpit Guests in the month and purchased our new sign for display at the corner of Armstrong and Harrison, the loss is justified. The income includes the \$2038.80 special collections for Haitian Relief.

RRUU also does significant "Second Mile" giving, sharing our resources to help meet the needs of others. In March our Second Sunday "Share the Plate" offerings for March in the amount of \$144 went to the Callie Clinic for AIDS/HIV relief. RRUU also provided six canvas shopping bags of food, paper products and hygiene items to the Grayson County Shelter food pantry and passed on eight boxes of books for sale at the Earth Day Festival.

# Share the Plate with CASA

A significant piece of how we share the wonderment that is Red River Unitarian Universalist church is in our "second mile" giving. Each month 10-15% of the monthly resources which come in to RRUU are given to programs and projects outside of the church. On May 10<sup>th</sup> all cash offerings will be given to the CASA, the Court Appointed Special Advocates Program in Grayson County. The mission of CASA of Grayson County, Inc. is to provide trained, court-appointed volunteers, who investigate, monitor and serve as advocates in court to help abused and neglected children secure permanent placement in safe, nurturing homes. Please remember to bring some folding green (or write a check clearly designated for CASA) the second Sunday in May. What better way to honor or remember she who mothered you than with a gift to help insure children who have been mistreated find the nurture and love which defines "home" and "mother"?

### "Fill the Plate" Update

We continue the journey toward Social Justice in our ministries at RRUU in ways large and small and somewhere in between. Our ongoing efforts to help meet the needs of our neighbors continue through the food/paper products/hygiene items collections. During April we collected two canvas bags very full with food, paper and hygiene items which were delivered to the Grayson County Food Pantry along with the \$72 donated for this purpose during March and April.

The large green containers in the back of the sanctuary can be added to any Sunday with paper products like tissue, diapers, feminine products and personal items such as toothpaste, mouthwash, soap, deodorant or household cleaning products. None of these necessities can be purchased with food stamps. To help buy food for the hungry, donations of money are recommended as pantries can buy food in bulk at a highly reduced rate making the \$1.00 we would spend for a can of tuna actually purchase 6-8 cans of the same size if purchased by the pantry.

Our May and June food pantry donations of items

and money will travel across the Red River to help supply one or more of the pantries in the Durant area. Remember to bring your items any week of the month and/or add some cash to the small black lock box which is always either on the table in the back of the sanctuary or conveniently located on the bar height chair to your left as you leave worship.

### A thought from The Care Team

The Care Team now has a direct phone line so anyone who is in need of temporary emergency assistance can call for help. The call connects you to a voice mail system. By leaving your name, number and message – your voice message will



be instantly transcribed and emailed immediately to a Care Team volunteer. The number is 903.363.7717. Look for it each week in the Order of Worship; the enews; and in the monthly newsletter. The number is available day or night.

In order to alert people to needs expressed during the Candles of Community, a new "Among Ourselves" section has been added to the weekly e-news so people can reach out to others. The aim of the Care Team is simple: To love everyone by our actions.
