Final Thoughts on the BP Oil Spill

After I spoke last Sunday I realized I failed to end with a hopeful message. Here it is. There is a solid track record of people solving problems when they become determined. In the 1960s American rivers sometimes caught fire – not today. In the fifties black and white kids in Sherman couldn't go to school in the same classes – today they do. In the 40s my parents' generation had to stop the Nazis – they did. Before them infectious disease was a scourge – not today. Before that agricultural societies went from one famine to the next not today. I realize these problems aren't entirely solved, and they are much worse in some places than others, but they are much less severe than previously in places where people decided to make a change. The problem I talked about last Sunday – essentially the problem of sustainability – has only been appreciated for a little while. No one even used the word when I was in college. Today lots of people are concerned about solving it. In my opinion the Senate blew it last week when they gave up on climate legislation for this congress, but they almost didn't blow it; they almost tried to pass it whereas a few years ago they voted 99-0 against the Kyoto Protocol. - Pete Schulze



Report From GA

RRUU members Elbert and Marion Hill represented the church as delegates to General Assembly in Minneapolis, MN, June 23-27. They report that the most hotly de-

bated issue was whether the UUA should boycott Phoenix as the site for its 2012 GA. The UUA Board of Trustees had called for moving the convention site in response to the passage of Arizona SB 1070 (which requires law enforcement personnel in Arizona to check immigration status of any person suspected of being in the U.S. illegally, when "any lawful contact" is made with that individual). But the Board referred the decision to General Assembly delegates after a letter from UUA President Peter Morales proposed UUA hold the convention as scheduled in Phoenix but make it a different kind of convention, one focused on the issue of immigrant justice, with other convention business kept to a minimum. Morales' letter included invitations from two immigrant advocacy groups to hold GA in Phoenix.

After hours of debate and negotiation in mini-assemblies, delegates overwhelmingly approved a compromise resolution to hold a "Justice General Assembly" in Phoenix in 2012. Phoenix-area UUA congregations were among those speaking in favor of the compromise.

In other business, delegates adopted a Statement of Conscience on "Creating Peace" after four years of congregational study, and chose "Immigration as a Moral Issue" as the topic for the next four-year study. (Of the five proposed study topics, RRUU's delegates had voted for "National Economic Reform: A Moral Imperative," reasoning that economic justice would be basic to resolving each of the other four proposed issues.) The convention also approved Actions of Immediate Witness to work for Gulf Coast environmental and economic justice, and to advocate for "cleaning up" the Clean Energy Bill. Proposals to advocate ending the blockade of Gaza and the growth of Israeli settlements on Palestinian territory, and to advocate ending the war in Afghanistan and Pakistan, failed.

"UUs have strong feelings about issues," Elbert noted, "and people on both sides of arguments made good points. But I'm proud of our denomination's ability to find valid compromises on divisive issues."

Delegates were urged to encourage members of their home congregations to attend GA 2012 in Phoenix, Marion said, "in order that UUs' witness for justice can have maximum impact."

For those who have never attended a GA but would like to experience a more typical one than 2012 will be, she suggested members also consider attending GA 2011 in Charlotte, North Carolina. "The Ware Lecture on Saturday evening is always a highlight—this year, Winona LaDuke, a Native America activist and economist gave a great talk about environmental issues from a Native American perspective.

The workshops are informative and helpful, and meeting other UUs from across the country is inspiring and fun."


How To Begin (Changing Your Life) by Forrest Church

Commitment Campaign Final Report

Our Commitment Campaign for this fiscal year formally came to a close the end of June with outstanding success. Nationally, an average of 52% of church members pledge annually. That average is higher at 73% in Unitarian Universalist congregations. We have cause to celebrate at Red River Unitarian Universalist as 85% of the mem-

bership made a financial commitment to offset this year's budget!

The FY-11 budget approved at our last congregational meeting cited an anticipated pledge amount of \$24,104. As the result of a well executed campaign faithfully responded to by the membership, our actual pledges for the fiscal year are \$25,010 exceeding the budgeted amount by nearly a thousand dollars.

A detailed campaign final report was submitted to the Board of Trustees and can be viewed on the Board bulletin board in the back corner of the sanctuary. Generous thanks are due to all who participated in any way toward the success of the campaign.

Voices of Liberal Religion

"Common Thoughts

I'm seeing a pattern.

First, there's a new and popular book titled "Without Buddha I Could Not Be a Christian." Then there's another new book titled "It's Really All About God" with the subtitle "Reflections of a Muslim Atheist Jewish Christian." And now we in Bedford have some new parishioners (a same-sex couple, by the way) who, before coming to First Parish on Sunday mornings, attend The Pub Church on Saturday nights, a Disciples of Christ church that meets over beers in a bar called The Dugout on Commonwealth Avenue across from Boston University – <u>thepubchurch.blogspot.com</u>. (Years ago, btw, I too had a few beers at The Dugout. The last time was a bleak November night in 1972 when on the bar's TVI watched McGovern concede the presidency to Nixon. At the

time, I didn't think of it as church, but even the religious need sometimes to cry into one's beer.)

And, more highbrow, there's also Harvard Divinity School professor Harvey Cox who recently prophesies the end of fundamentalism, saying: "The very nature of human religiousness is changing in a way inimical to fundamentalist thought. The most rapidly growing spiritual groups today focus not on someone else's authority, but on a direct encounter with the divine. Whatever else it may mean that so many people call themselves 'spiritual but not religious,' it suggests they still yearn for contact with the sacred, but are suspicious of the scaffolding, the doctrines, and hierarchies through which it has often been conveyed."

Where has Harvey been? I'm glad he's belatedly awakening to the last two hundred years of Unitarian Universalism. For centuries now we've been saying that religious experience matters more than religious beliefs. Who cares where you get your inspiration? It matters that, once in a while, you're inspired. And, yes, welcome to the holiday season. Once in a while I hope you are inspired - Christian/Buddhist/Atheist/Muslim/Jewish/Pub-going/Unitarian Universalist/ or none-of-the-above.

The menu is vast. Welcome to the feast.

We're Number Two...and also number one and number seven. When we consider the seven principles which Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote, our Social Action efforts at RRUU relate most closely to the second, seventh and first principles:

- * Justice, equity and compassion in human relations.
- * Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- * The inherent worth and dignity of every person. While social action reflects our commitment to all of the principles, these three are most directly related to the things we do or fail to do in the area of acting on and in the social milieu of our day and time.

Our July Share the Plate cash offerings of \$60 went to the Families Feeding Families meal program out of Durant, OK. The program welcomes anyone who is in need of a meal with no restrictions, application or criteria other than being hungry. Families in the Durant area prepare and serve a simple evening meal daily, free all who come to their site in search of food. This is a mission and ministry which RRUU has supported for some years as part of our Social Action.

Our ongoing "Fill the Plate" donations of cash, paper/hygiene products and nonperishable food will also travel to Southwest Oklahoma the next few months. The items and dollars donated during July, August and September will be delivered to the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry in Durant for distribution. All are encouraged to bring smaller sized toothpaste, deodorant, hair care products, cleaning products and/or paper products (tissues, toilet paper, feminine needs items, paper towel) and place them in the green bins in the rear of the sanctuary. Since the food pantry can purchase food items for ten cents on the dollar, cash or a check are the most cost effective way to help feed people.

This month we are also joining to help children and youth in struggling families get ready for school. All are invited to bring backpacks and/or school supplies. Please give generously to our August 8, 2010 Share the Plate offering for back to school help. Each RRUU household is encouraged to bring any or all of the following to contribute: backpacks, pencils, blue or black pens, red pens/pencils, 24 count crayons, markers, glue sticks, rulers, pink pearl erasers, loose leaf paper, folders, single subject spiral notebooks, 3 ring binders, pencil boxes, 5 subject spiral notebooks, and folders. The supplies, backpacks and dollars collected will go to the Back-to-School Program of the Salvation Army of Grayson County and of the Duran/Bryan County Families Feeding Families Organization.

Some have asked "Why Oklahoma when our church is in Texas?" The reality is state borders are nothing more than an imaginary line. Our congregation extends into Oklahoma by virtue of our members and friends. Some come to RRUU from Bryan County, OK, and we have participants from Cooke, Fannin and Grayson Counties in TX. The Social Action Team endeavors to share our gifts in essentially a 30 mile radius of our physical location. When we are aware of special needs, the circle expands to include Haiti or New Orleans, synagogues and temples, those of all races, orientations and genders. In the same way we welcome all in worship and events, so we work to reach out to all. Come celebrate your principles by taking action in social needs and issues!
