What your Board did at their last meeting, October 12, 2010



Board Members in attendance included

Penny Armstrong, Don Durland, Amy Hoffman-Shehan, Dianna Niemann-Harris and Marla Loturco. Jim Murphy was on an out of town business trip. Doug Strong was in attendance and acted as timekeeper and process observer.

The meeting began at 6:40 pm and finished around 9:00 pm. See full board minutes for details.

In addition to the standard agenda the board addressed/discussed:

* Budget deficit for first three months of 2010-2011 fiscal year.

* Penny Armstrong continues as (Acting) Secretary of the Board.

* Fall Congregational Meeting – October 24 at 2:45 pm. No child care is planned for the meeting.

* Don has asked several people to bring finger foods.

* New call lists were sent out.

* Don will ask hospitality to do coffee, Amy will bring tea.

* Added to new business of congregational meeting – request suggestions from congregation about how we can trim the budget.

* Board accepted hospitality's request to have our Thanksgiving food celebration at Angela's instead of the church.

* Going to create a call list and recruit volunteers to assist in calling people who have not been in church for awhile to make sure they are ok and see if there is any church assistance they might require.

If you would like to see the full board minutes – they will be posted in the "Board Book" in the back of the Sanctuary as soon as they are available. The next board meeting is November 9th, starting at 6:40 p.m. Board meetings are open to all, if you wish to be on the agenda please contact a board member. Deadline for the agenda and reports to the board is November 4th. Those wishing a few minutes during the "open mic" will want to be ready to speak around 7:00 pm.

Treasurer's Report



For the month of September RRUU had an income of \$7,015.13 with ex-

penses of 7,992.93. This left us using \$977.80 from general savings to meet September bills. These figures include transfer of grant and "set aside" funds for purchase of our sound system components as well as regular monthly income and expenses. Considering the first quarter of FY 11 expenses we are over budget on childcare, insurance, honoraria and mileage. Looking at income for the same period, unpledged regular giving is 22% below the budgeted amount and 80% of pledge units have given less than 25% of the pledge to date.

As reported in brief at our October 24th congregational meeting RRUU is feeling the pinch of the local economy. Some suggestions offered by the congregation for the Board to consider to reduce costs included:

* Members and Friends of RRUU doing Sunday morning childcare on a rotating basis. (Note: This involves a \$10 background check on each person in the rotation and the Board was asked to revisit the wording for background checks to insure only matters pertaining to child safety are included.)

* Decrease the frequency of mowing in the summer to every three weeks rather than every two weeks.

* Members and Friends of RRUU doing weekly cleaning Sunday afternoons or evenings in teams of 2-4 with each team taking responsibility for a month of cleaning responsibility.

* Request Worship Arts Team schedule two paid pulpit guests monthly and arrange Chalice Circles or Committees to prepare and lead two services a month.

* Asking the Treasurer to send out giving status updates by E-mail to all who participated in the Campaign by making a pledge. This communication is to be simply informative to each pledge unit noting the pledge amount and the giving recorded to date. These ideas will go to the Board of Trustees for their discernment and action to make our income and expenses balance out.

We believe in the freedom of religious expression. If the mind and heart are truly free and open, the revelations which appear to the human spirit are infinitely numerous, eternally fruitful, and wondrously exciting. We believe in the unity of experience. There is no fundamental conflict between faith and knowledge, religion and the world, the sacred and the secular, since they all have their source in the same reality. We believe in the worth and dignity of each human being. All people on earth have an equal claim to life, liberty and justice - and no idea, ideal or philosophy is superior to a single human life.

We believe in the ethical application of religion. Good works are the natural product of a good faith, the evidence of an inner grace that finds completion in social and community involvement.

We believe in the motive force of love. The governing principle in human relationships is the principle of love, which always seeks the welfare of others and never seeks to hurt or destroy.

We believe in the necessity of the democratic process. Records are open to scrutiny, elections are open to members and ideas are open to criticism - so that people might govern themselves.

We believe in the importance of a religious community. The validation of experience requires the confirmation of peers, who provide a critical platform along with a network of mutual support.

Social Action Committee Leads Worship and Invites Action



RRUU Social Action will lead worship on Sunday, November 21 as RRUU anticipates Thanksgiving by giving thanks. This service will center around the UUA Guest at Your Table project kick-off. Members and Friends of RRUU will join in Guest at Your Table this fall, adding our gifts to those of other UU's.

November 21st is also Big Hat and Tiara Sunday. You are invited to dust off your old Homecoming Queen Tiara (or dash to Wal-Mart and buy one) and wear it to church! If you are not the Tiara type, wear the biggest hat you can put your hands on. In addition to the hat on your head, you are invited to <u>bring as many baseball</u> type hats as you can put your hands on to donate. The hats will be sent to field workers who often have eye issues (and sometimes even blindness) from sun damage as they harvest our fresh fruits and vegetables.

"Share the Plate" offerings of \$91 in October went to the Unitarian Universalist United Nations Organization (UU-UNO) and help our efforts to be recognized as a Blue Ribbon Congregation. On Sunday, November 9th we will share the plate (all cash offerings or checks designated) with the Grayson County Crisis Center. This is an awesome program which provides a temporary safe haven for women (and their children) who have experienced domestic abuse. The Center has safe, clean housing, a playground, secure parking and play areas indoors. Meals and assistance with taking necessary steps to insure future safety are also offered at the Crisis Center.

This fourth quarter of 2010 our contributions of food, sundries and money in the cash box go to the Salvation Army Food Pantry. We were made aware this food pantry was high on requests and low on items to distribute, therefore Salvation Army was moved up in our rotation to begin sending our donations a quarter earlier than planned.
