Spotlight: The Committee on Ministry



The Committee on Ministry (COM) is a three member committee, selected by the congregation. The two-fold purpose for their existence is to keep a finger on the pulse of RRUU and to be a safe place for people to go when they have issues with others in the church. They are the check in a check and balance system between the board, minister (if we had one), and the congregation. Anything told to the COM is told in confidence and, without permission, should not be discussed outside the COM by any committee member.

Anyone with an issue about the board, an individual board member, or someone in the congregation should ideally attempt to settle the problem with that person or persons. However, if they are uncomfortable approaching said individuals alone, they may explain the situation to the COM and request someone to accompany them to any meeting in an attempt to work out issues. The COM is not a "complaints department" where you get to complain and leave. They are "facilitators" to assist with the issues being worked out between individuals and groups.

The COM is also the committee within the church that can hold informal discussions to find out what is running well at RRUU, and what changes individuals would like to see. Last year they performed a survey, the results of which were given to the worship team as suggestions and feedback on what congregation members would like to have included during worship.

The COM, in addition to a board member is also the final authority for the disruptive persons policy and as a group will deal with individuals who do not attempt to live the RRUU Behavioral Covenant.

So, if anything in the church seems out of sync with our Behavioral Covenant, our policies, our bylaws and you don't feel comfortable addressing the board, please seek counsel from any one or all of the individuals on the Committee on Ministry. Currently on the committee are Carolyn Cameron, Peter Schulze, and Jim Gauthier. An email to COM@rruu.org will reach them all.

Eligibility for voting is set in our bylaws. "Section 2: Re-

Eligibility for voting is set in our bylaws. "Section 2: Requirement for Voting Membership. Individuals who have been members of the Church for 30 days or more and who have (as an individual or part of a family unit) made a contribution of record during the last 12 months, which must have occurred at least 30 days prior to the meeting, shall have the right to vote at all official Church meetings."

If you are not yet a member and would like to be able to vote in this meeting you must sign the book by April 22, 2011. All voting members must make or confirm a contribution of record by April 22, 2011.

Social Action will sponsor our annual roadway pick up along Harrison Street and Kat Walston, SAT member will organize this event. The Social Action Team will be leading worship on April 17, 2011 for a Celebration of Animals. This outdoor service welcomes members and friends to bring their pets to church. It will include a pet food collection, blessing one another's animals and hopefully a speaker from the Free-To-Live shelter in Durant.

The Team also hopes to work with The Green Team in cosponsoring another book exchange and at a different time, a second clothing exchange at RRUU. These events afford members an opportunity to bring used books/clothing and take home any thing they wish which others have brought. Books and clothing remaining after the events are donated to local programs.

The Social Action Team is always open to people who have a passion for justice and desire to be proactive. We are seeking a chairperson or co-chairs to guide the group as Dianna Niemann-Harris, Acting Chair by Board appointment ends her term on the Board of Trustees in June. Chair responsibilities are not complicated nor time consuming. The Chair insures an article is submitted for the monthly newsletter, sets dates for the two yearly meetings coordinating with the Adult Religious Education co-chairs and receives emails (from the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee and other UU sources) to print and post on the SAT bulletin board in the entryway.

RRUU Chalice Circles: Which Small Group Is Right For You?

Chalice Circles are small groups of people who meet regularly for the purpose of getting to know one another while learning, discussing, and acting on topics of common interest.
