Each of us as alive aware humans experiences our life in two dimensions, The Outer World (the air we breathe, the food we eat, the others we share with, the work we do) and The Inner World (feelings, thoughts, imaginings, dreams) that are very real to each and can be shared with others but remain an inner private world. For many, many years and across the globe some have been able to recognize, experience and dialogue with a third realm, The Other World. This is the world that has spawned Gods - Goddesses. It has been described as Heaven and Hell. Richard Newlin has experienced and dialogued with this Other World for most of his life. He will share some of what he has learned and possibly you might be able to acknowledge and dialogue with your own 'Other World'.

We're settling in even as the work continues. The new roof is on, and up next is the mandatory rebuilding of the front porch which will incorporate a ramp so that the entire first floor (both the chapel level and the nursery, kitchen and meeting room level) will be accessible. A master plan for drought tolerant landscaping is in the works along which can include a compost bin, all aimed at keeping our pledge for sustainability.

If you haven't yet seen the church be sure and come. It is an amazing space for us and our Sunday services for October promise to be stimulating and inspiring. And, don't forget our Fall Congregational Meeting is Sunday, October 30.

Financial Update ~the treasurer's report

September was one unbelievable month! The generosity of RRUU members and friends was overwhelming. Seven "units" of church members lent \$50,000 for the renovation of our new church, with a 4% interest rate over a ten-year period. On top of that, over \$31,000 was given to the church, through check or outright purchase, by members and friends to further facilitate the renovation. This additional funding will be put to good use, as new needs continue to arise. For example, it was recently discovered that the porch cannot be repaired; it must be replaced.

The \$31,000+ is an approximation because everyone may

not have informed me of their donations. I will try to keep an informal tally of what has been contributed. If any church member/friend has a receipt or a list of what they have given for the renovation, please give me a copy and I will add it to your in-kind gift list as well as the tally. If a reimbursement is needed, I will be happy to write a check (and will need a receipt.)

Regular offerings totaled \$1944.26 in September; because of the Labor Day work date, there were three collections instead of the usual four. However, all bills were covered, with over \$300.00 to spare. (As in the past two months, bills were less than

usual.) Spirit Horse Therapeutic Riding was the recipient of our Second Sunday Share-the-Plate, and slightly over \$43.00 was sent to them. Checks in the amount of \$10,500 were deposited for the building renovation fund!

This month I will be working on getting thank-you notes to everyone who has made building renovation donations or purchases; these can also be used for tax purposes. Some members have asked for a run-down on how much of their pledge has been donated so far this year, and I will also be sending those out to everyone who has pledged.

The Chapel ~ Pews or Chairs or Both?

There are those who think the pews are appropriate, create a sense of the sacred and are an important part of the chapel ...

There are those who find the pews so uncomfortable that they squirm to find a position that won't create stiffness ...

And there are those who have the exact reaction to the chairs and find them so uncomfortable that it is painful ...

There are those who think the chairs are perfect, allow for flexible room arrangements and that the pews thwart liberal worship ...

And there are those who don't feel strongly one way or another, who are equally comfortable in either pew or chair.

There are those who think the walls need to be adorned with symbols that reflect our heritage and faith ...

There are those who want the walls free of anything so the chapel will be less cluttered and free of distractions ...

There are those who want to the room arranged in traditional rows and those who want us in a circle and those who want is to be able to see one another across a crowded room...

We are a typical UU congregation wrestling with newness, each anxious to offer an opinion or two or three or more.

The Worship Team wants to suggest we play with pews, chairs, views, symbols and opinions over the next few months as we settle into life in the chapel and invites everyone to play with sitting in different places, different chairs/pews to see if we can collectively come up with arrangements that meet the greatest need. To that end you can look for some tinkering, not on a weekly basis, but more like for a month at a time - long enough to see if we really like or really don't care for the current layout.

Currently the team is playing with two rows of chairs in the center and pews on the sides, facing the side wall, with the nine banners on the front, side and back walls. Other arrangements will be tried in the weeks ahead. The goal is to have something more settled by the turn of the year.
