Fall Congregational Meeting ~A joyous success

The fall congregational meeting was an upbeat, joyful time with 72% of the congregation represented. It was a morning of wonderful news!

Marie Bellman, treasurer, presented a revised budget which included a total of \$14,500 in cash gifts along with a bank wire from William Findley who purchased the Wedding Chapel building for \$12,011.69. A new item for janitorial services was added. The revised budget of \$127,096.40 was unanimously approved.

Participants offered words of praise to those who have worked so hard on getting the building up to snuff and learned that more projects are still in the works, including a handicapped ramp and some sort of kitchen.

The potluck lunch was a success even though our church dishes etc. are still packed away.

As many of you are aware, because you have been coming on Sunday mornings, the work on the building is continuing. A new porch is the current large project, which must be completed before we can pass all our inspections. Last week the gas meter was installed so we now have both hot water and heat. Our 100 year old building is getting modern! Bruce Cameron is putting in many hours of work and supervision on our new home.

The enthusiasm from everyone is wonderful and I understand that most of us have ideas about what we would like to see happen at the church. I ask however, that on Sunday morning, we refrain from giving suggestions, criticism, and/or 'you shoulds' – thanks and appreciation are appropriate.

Sunday morning is a time for celebration of our community and worship/spirituality for ourselves. While it may be hard to resist, after all we are all there, in order that the right people hear your ideas, please jot down your suggestions and send them to aesthetics @ rruu.org. as they are the ones who need to know. Equally important

to your suggestions are your helping hands, volunteer to help with some of the work. There is lots that can still be done by unskilled labor and if you are skilled, even better.

November 5, 2011 is Austin College's Great Day of Service. There will be students who will be working at RRUU to help with many tasks. Everyone in the congregation is also invited to attend. Let's make it a Great Day of Church Work Service!. The goal for the day is to liberate the dining room windows by scraping off the paint covering the glass; scrub down the walls and floor in a room in the basement, wash down the wood paneling on the second floor, and doing some yard work. Two major projects are being addressed by the board at this time. One is the Building Use Policy, the other is changes to the Bylaws. The board hopes to have a building use document ready before the first snow fall!

Other things going on at church include the Adult Forum's upcoming *Building Your Own Theology* class and our first major meal in the building at the Pilgrim's Feast. I want to thank everyone who came to the Fall Congregational Meeting. The participation was excellent, the conversations lively and engaging.

Look for a town hall meeting in early January to talk about the revisions recommended to our bylaws.

Four things are needed when you sign up:


- Your name

Beginning...

"Building Your Own Theology" class starts

Based on the assumption that everyone is their own theologian, this classic UU adult education program invites participants to develop their own personal credos.

From the blog "No Forbidden Questions" comes comments which might help entice you to take the class:

One of the aspects of Unitarian Universalism that I

have a whole lot of respect for is the emphasis on figuring out one's religious beliefs for oneself. There is no authority structure ready to kick you out if you have a slightly deviant opinion or a moment's doubt. Given the havoc that such hierarchies have wreaked throughout history, I think it's worth saying — good job, UUs. Building a community that allows free, independent thought is so important.

The quest for truth is presented right from the get-go as a quest for spiritual truth, as a process of determining your own religious beliefs — as opposed to simply truth or beliefs. This presumes that the right answer you find will have a strong spiritual component, and will be something rightly described as a religion. This understanding clicked into place for me when I first learned about the book series and accompanying adult religious education course called Building Your Own Theology, by Richard S. Gilbert.

If we say you're "building your own theology", then it's clearly implied that you are building a theology right from the start. Unitarians are not asking, "Do you have any supernatural beliefs?" They are asking, "Which supernatural beliefs do you have?" Even if they will accept the answer, "None," the premise of the question will shape the answers typically

Board Bits ~from the Sept 6 th Board Meeting

The board meeting was held on October 18, 2011. All members were present except for Elbert Hill who was traveling in Europe.

In addition to normal board business the following topics were covered.

Financial Update ~the treasurer's report

"October was a good month for the renovation account."

RRUU is now operating as if it had two main accounts - one for renovating our church building and one for taking care of church operations. October was a good month for the renovation account. Through a generous donation, the cash fund increased by \$3,500 and now totals \$14,000. This fund is in addition to the \$50,000 loan. RRUU has raised \$64,000 for church renovations! Nearly \$30,000 has been spent on com-

pleted work, leaving approximately \$34,000 for continuing renovation projects. I am working closely with Carolyn Cameron so that I know what has been spent and the Cameron Team knows how much money is left in the coffers.

The general savings fund was also enhanced in October. The wedding chapel was successfully sold for \$12,011.69, with the money wired to our bank account on October 28th. The general savings fund has been used in the past to pay bills that could not be covered

by Sunday offerings and other monthly income. The bills are usually for church operations; in the future, the fund may also be tapped for building needs. This was never an "opportunity" in the past!

The only area that fell short in October was that of incoming funds needed for everyday bills. Offerings and other income totaled \$2199.00; this was \$996.00 less than bills that totaled \$3195.00. The general savings fund was used to make up the difference.

After trying both pews and chairs in different arrangements, the consensus is that chairs are more inviting, provide better comfort and make the chapel more flexible for multiple uses (like meals, weddings, dances).

A small Anglican congregation in Houston is very interested in purchasing our pews as they have just rented space and want it to look more "like a traditional sanctuary".

The arrangement of facing the

back wall of the chapel has two important advantages. It is more conductive for sound reproduction and the placement of the speakers on the wall (upcoming soon) will enhance the ability for all to hear. Also it makes the



room more usable for video presentations by facing the back wall.

Someday perhaps we can remove the wood paneling which will enhance the beauty of the chapel.
