On July 14, most of RRUU's board members attended an all-day board-training workshop at First Jefferson UU in Fort Worth, sponsored by NTAUUS (North Texas Association of Unitarian Universalist Societies). A dinner the evening before at First UU in Dallas, which NTAUUS also sponsored and which Marion and I attended, brought congregational leaders from around north Texas together to compare ideas for working together to advance denominational work in this area.

Our first RRUU board meeting of the year on July 19 went well. We set up a calendar for the rest of the 2012-13 church year, discussed the board covenant, young family concerns, and ideas for church growth, and decided that board members will study together the book *Growing a Beloved Community*, by Tom Owen-Towle.

On Sunday, July 22, the congregation held its first New Member Recognition Ceremony in a long time, the first in our current building. We recognized 11 new members, some of whom had been members for quite a while but one of whom joined that morning. We're happy to have each of you and hope you'll all find many ways to participate in RRUU activities.

On July 27 and 28, the board held its retreat that a grant from NTAUUS funded. The main topic of discussion during the weekend was long-range planning, including developing a plan for growth.

Work is under way in the chapel to remove paneling and re-do walls. During the remodeling, services will be held upstairs in the Adult Forum room and adjoining dining area. It's a minor inconvenience to achieve a much nicer look for the chapel. Thanks, all of you who are involved in the work! And thanks to all those who contributed money or helped make bookmarks for sale at GA and elsewhere, to provide funds for the chapel's refurbishing!

## **Financial Update** ~the treasurer's report

This is my first report for the newsletter as your new Treasurer. I'm really impressed with everything that Marie Bellman accomplished over the past year. She put in a lot of work and deserves many thanks from all of us. Thanks to Marie's excellent instruction, the handover of the Treasurer duties went very smoothly.

We are changing the timing of the monthly reports in order to allow the newsletter to be published a little earlier. Therefore, I'll cover June again this month and talk about July in the next newsletter.

In the month of June, we received \$308 from fund raisers in addition to our regular income from pledges and weekly offerings, resulting in total income of \$2,263. However, we still ended up with a net loss of \$40 primarily due to an advance payment of \$500 for the board retreat planned in July. The \$500 was funded from savings due to a grant received last year.

For the year July 2011 through June 2012, we had a net loss of \$41,266 which was an improvement over the budgeted loss of \$49,900. The loss was primarily due to renovation costs that were funded by a \$50,000 loan.

As of the end of June, we had \$38,440 in cash and we own our building. This cash balance included \$3,117 donated specifically for renovations. To offset these assets we have debt of \$47,944 which was needed to pay for the required renovations.

In July we have received another \$2,525 for the chapel renovations. Work is proceeding on the chapel thanks to the volunteers who made the bookmarks and other generous donors of both cash and materials.
