On Sunday we will take a look at the history, the innovation, the projects and the people whose lives have been made better because of UUSC. It is a proud and remarkable part of our free faith tradition and worthy of our understanding.

We will also distribute *Guest At Your Table* boxes so we, too, can be part of the work of the Service Committee (what's "Guest At Your Table?" See page 3).

Next Sunday we will screen a new documentary film *Two Who Dared: The Martha and Waitstill Sharp Story* who co-founded the service committee.

We're excited about being able to screen the forthcoming documentary *Two Who Dared*". *This film,* which will premiere the week of April 7-18 to celebrate Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, tells the story of a Unitarian minister and his wife whose work on helping Jews flee Nazi Germany resulted in the

formation of the UU Service Committee.

This remarkable story of courage, documenting the lives of Reverend Waitstill Sharp and his wife Martha is told from the point of view of Martha and Waitstill, drawing on their recorded interviews, letters and unpublished memoirs. The film also includes interviews with children rescued and noted scholars. (More about the film on page 3.)

RRUU's near neighbor) on December 20. The staff expressed appreciation, with comments such as "Looks like Christmas in here!" Other churches in the area also donated gifts for the residents, including clothing and shoes, so RRUU has participated in a community-wide effort to help homeless adults and children make the best of a bad situation at this season.

Attendance at services has been down some the last few weeks. It seems to me that our worship team and Adult Forum planners have been providing excellent, interesting, and vivid programs. So I wonder, is something in particular keeping people away, beyond the usual reasons of illness and traveling, something we need to address as a congregation? The date of February 2 had been chosen for the workshop, but it has to be changed because of conflict with a NTAUUS workshop on Reproductive Justice that same date. An announcement about the new date for the RRUU workshop will be made after our January 10 board meeting.

#### More about the film "Two Who Dared"~

In February 1939, Waitstill Sharp, a young Unitarian minister from Boston, and his wife Martha left for Czechoslovakia on a refugee mission. For months, the Unitarian Church had been receiving alarming reports from Prague over the plight of refugees. The Sharps arrived in Prague, home to the largest Unitarian church in the world, with \$28,000 in monetary aid. The Unitarian church was already a step in front of the Nazis, having set up a secretive network of volunteers and agencies to secure the safe passage of both Jews and non-Jews out of Prague. The task became even more difficult when on March 15, 1939 the Nazis entered Prague. For the next five months, the Sharps continued their work undaunted by the presence of the Gestapo and the possibility that they would be arrested or killed. In August 1939, the couple left Prague and headed back to the United States, barely escaping arrest. Only 10 months later, the Sharps returned to Europe on their second mission, setting up a refugee office in Lisbon, Portugal. Eventually, they made their way to Nazi-controlled France, to find ways to help refugees escape. In an elaborate plan, the Sharps



helped a renowned German-Jewish author, Lion Feuchtwanger, and his wife escape to New York via Spain. During their sixth months stay in France, the Sharps worked closely with another American rescuer, Varian Fry.

Finally, in December 1940, after rescuing a plethora of

people from the horrors of Nazi persecution, Waitstill and Martha Sharp returned to the United States. Following the war, Martha Sharp remained very active in efforts to assist the Jews around the world and the establishment of Israel.





#### Guest At Your Table

we are helping nurture a spirit of gratitude and "justice, equity, and compassion in human relations." Guest at Your Table fosters understanding and awareness of UUSC's human-rights work.

This year, the boxes are featuring some of our particularly innovative partnerships. These people are your "guests," and you are asked to share your blessings with them to support our shared mission.

#### **Financial Update**

We continue to do better than budgeted, primarily due to lower expenses. However, we are still using our savings to fund part of the cash payments of principal on our loan.

We still have \$3,663 remaining for general renovations. There was no renovation expense in November.

We contributed \$77 to the Grayson County Shelter from the Share the Plate program in November.

In the month of November we had income of \$2,050 from general operations. After operations expense of \$1,821, we had a net income from operations of \$229.

For the year to date period of July through November 2012, cash decreased by (\$1,801) year to date. This amount was funded from our savings.

As of the end of November 2012, we had cash of \$36,639 and debt of \$45,847.

# Reproductive Justice: Expanding Our Social Justice Calling

Saturday, Feb 2 at First Church Dallas

Delegates at the 2012 General Assembly in Phoenix, AZ, selected "Reproductive Justice: Expanding Our Social Justice Calling" to be the 2012-2016 Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) of Congregations.

The Congregational Study/Action Issue is an invitation for congregations and districts to take a topic of concern and engage it, reflect on it, learn about it, respond to it, comment on it take action—each in their own way. A Congregational Study/Action Issue is NOT a statement—it is a question.

This workshop will help us better understand how to use the resources available and what individual congregations can do to further a study of this topic.

The RRUU Board has decided to terminate our commitment to the Adopt-A-Street program for our old Harrison St. location, under which we agreed to keep the street near our church clean of trash. Since we no longer are located there, we have not picked up trash in that area since we moved. We will check with Adopt-A-Street about making a commitment to clean a street in our current neighborhood.

RRUU will be providing a meal once every quarter for the residents of the Grayson County Shelter, which is the only homeless shelter in the county and is located only a block from our church. We took a meal there recently, and a few church members ate and visited with residents, who

seemed to appreciate our contribution and involvement with them. Marion Hill will coordinate future meals with the shelter and will be announcing our next scheduled "meal date" early in 2013. If you wish to help by providing food and/or serving at the shelter, please contact Marion.

Plans are humming along for the church-wide Appreciation Dinner on Thursday, February 21. Be sure to reserve the date on your calendar, and be thinking of specific reasons you appreciate individuals within our congregation.

We plan to replace the Memorial Tree donated by Pam Nelson, a former member of RRUU (now living near Austin, TX), after the death of her daughter. That particular tree was too big to take with us when we left the Harrison St. location. Both corners in front of the church, as well as the space between garage and playground, have been suggested as possible locations for the replacement tree.
