The Role of Faith in the Struggle for Black Equality: The Case of Malcolm X

Professor Jacqueline M. Moore, speaking

While many people know about the religious roots of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s civil rights philosophy, few have looked at how faith influenced Malcolm X's nationalist beliefs and actions. Although his initial involvement with the Nation of Islam (NOI) gave him a distorted concept of Islamic theology, his belief in the justice of his God reinforced his bold statements and helped shape his nationalist arguments. His ultimate break with the NOI and Hajj to Mecca allowed him to explore visions of faith that were less condemnatory of whites and shaped a new global perspective that influenced other Civil Rights leaders.

Jacqueline M. Moore is Professor of History at Austin College where she teaches US, Asian and African American history. She is the co-editor of Rowman and Littlefield's African American

Name This Room ~ The Winning Names!

The Board reviewed the various suggestions (some were right amusing) and selected the names.

The Chapel - When we purchased the building the addition added (probably in the 1960's) had a name plate "The Chapel". The board chose to keep the name.

The Foyer - is the area outside the Chapel doors. The Upper Foyer - outside the Clara Barton Parlor The Veranda - the large porch outside the Parlor The Soul Café - well known to us all



The Clara Barton Parlor - Named for Clara Barton, a life-long Universalists who is probably best known for her work in equality and social justice. After witnessing the lack of help given wounded soldiers left on battlefields during the civil war, she cam-

paigned and founded an organization devoted to helping those in need: The American National Red Cross.



The Emerson Room - named for Ralph Waldo Emerson, whose original profession and calling was as a Unitarian minister, left the ministry to pursue a career in writing, public speaking and led the Transcendentalist movement. He became one of America's best known and

best loved 19th century figures.



The Forrest Church Library - The son of Senator Frank Church, the Rev. Dr. Forrest Church was a leading UU minister, author of ten books and one of our best know 20th century UU theologians. . On February 4, 2008, Church sent a letter to the members of his congregation informing them that he had terminal cancer. He shared his

dying process in his work in a final book, entitled *Love* & *Death*.



The Susan B. Anthony Room - An activist, reformer, teacher, and lecturer, Susan B. Anthony dedicated her life to promoting woman suffrage and paved the way for the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment. She authored the original text of the Amendment

which was passed 14 years after her death.



The Beatrix Potter Nursery -

Named for the Unitarian English author, illustrator, natural scientist and conservationist probably best known for her imaginative children's books featuring animals such as those in *The Tales of Peter Rabbit* which celebrated the British land-

scape and country life.

February 3

"Words and deeds of prophetic women and men"

The Bylaws of the UU Association inform us that 'the living tradition we share draws from many sources,' and after naming them, concludes (that) we are inspired to deepen out understanding and expand our vision.

We look to our heroes---our prophets---as standards by which to measure ourselves. We may believe they're divine incarnations, then we dissect them with a moral scalpel.

We will have a short email reading, followed Sunday by discussion about our religious authorities and the strengths and weaknesses of diversity in religion.

February 10

"Wisdom from the world's religions, which inspire us in our ethical & spiritual life"

The great religions provide historical significance and demonstrate tolerance for them as far back as the the 1568 Edict of Torda, signed by Unitarian King John Sigismund of Transylvania. This tradition continues through the centuries, often demonstrating religion basis in pagan views. We will have a short email reading followed by discussing what is and is not important to each of us.

February 17

"Jewish and Christian teachings that call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves"

The central theme of Judaism is a covenant with God, and here we come to the sometimes troublesome concept of them being the "chosen people." Traditionally Unitarian Universalists have been ambivalent about their Jewish and Christian heritage, currently saying we are neither Christian nor non-Christian. Liberal Christianity is a powerful force among us because it provides a coherent perspective and a consistent theology, although literalists belittle the language and the idea of heaven, earth and hell. We will have an email reading with discussion and questions.

February 24

"Humanist teachings, which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit"

Religious humanism is as old as the Greek philosophers and as old as Buddhism, Confucianism and Taoism.....all nontheistic faiths. It is also as new as 20th century UUs seeking to be differently religious in the face of growing religious fundamentalism. We will have an email reading with discussion and questions.



Financial Update ~ From the church treasurer

I'd like to thank everyone who made an extra donation in December. We received both additional year end donations in response to the letter from our president and additional donations to cover renovations. We also received another \$350 from the sale of bookmarks. I'm lucky to be part of such a generous, hard working group!

In the month of December we had income of \$3,471 from general operations. This income includes cash collected as special year end donations. After operations expense of \$1,717, we had a net income from operations of \$1,754.

I'm very pleased to announce that we have moved into a cash generating position with a

total increase in cash of \$658 year to date. This is much better than our budget. The improvement is primarily due to lower expenses than budgeted and to additional donations.

As of the end of December 2012, we had cash of \$39,098, including \$4,368 reserved for renovations, and debt of \$45,847.

In December we contributed \$12 to the Earth Day Festival from the Share the Plate program. This amount was lower than usual probably due to our failure to announce that it was the second Sunday. Year to date, we have contributed \$245 to the Grayson County Shelter and \$169 to the Earth Day festival.
