In accordance with the church bylaws, the Board of Trustees is hereby notifying the legal voters of Red River Unitarian Universalist Church in Denison TX to meet in the Chapel of the church on Sunday, the nineteenth day of May, 2013 at twelve-thirty-five o'clock in the afternoon and then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

- 1. To discuss and approve the October 21, 2012 Congregational Meeting Minutes
- 2. To discuss Annual Reports required by By-Laws
- 3. To nominate from the floor and vote on the Board of Trustees Elections
 - a. Vice-President
 - b. Secretary
 - c. Trustee
- 4. To nominate from the floor and vote on the Nominations Committee
- 5. To nominate from the floor and vote on the Committee on Ministry
- 6. To discuss and approve a 5-year plan for the church
- 7. To discuss and approve the Budget for the 2013-2014 year

The Bylaws state that the Requirement for Voting Membership is: Article V, Section 2 Individuals who have been members of the Church for 30 days or more and who have (as an individual or part of a family unit) made a contribution of record during the last 12 months, which must have occurred at least 30 days prior to the meeting, shall have the right to vote at all official Church meetings.

From the Bylaws about Proxy: Article V - Section 8: Proxy

Nothing in these Bylaws is meant to prohibit voting by proxy. A voting member in attendance at a Congregational meeting will be allowed to vote by proxy on behalf of no more than two other voting members.

Board Bits ~ from the April 2013 Board of Trustees meeting

Most of the time during the April board meeting was spent on budget issues. Due to the generosity of many members, it looks as if we will finish the fiscal year 2012-2013 with a balanced budget! Our treasurer, Carole Harner, has been working diligently on the budget for 2013-2014, and the board approved that proposed budget for distribution to the congregation on May 4 and for discussion and voting on at the congregational meeting on May 19.

We also spent a good bit of time discussing the G.I.F.T. (Generously Investing For Tomorrow) program, which is a new way of calculating the dues that each church is assessed annually for UUA (Unitarian Universalist Association) and SWUUC (Southwestern UU Conference of the UUA).

Previously, the denomination's Fair Share program assessed each church a certain dollar figure per member, and RRUU has proudly paid our full assessment each year. (Not all churches have done so; a favorite way for some congregations to trim their budgets is cutting back on the amount they send to the UUA.) GIFT is a pilot program being tried in the Southern Region of the UUA, which would assess a church's dues as a percentage of its operating budget from the previous year (including capital expenditures).

The problem for RRUU is that in 2011-2012 we spent over \$70,000 in renovation costs on our building (one-time expenses that won't be repeat-

ed and thus not "normal" expenses). Our treasurer has spent considerable time analyzing the effects of the GIFT formula on RRUU and determined that we would owe more than \$7,000 to UUA and SWUUC if all our renovation expenses were included in the dues calculation—an amount that clearly we couldn't afford!

On Carole's recommendation, the board voted to exclude renovation expenses in figuring the amount RRUU would pay for dues to UUA and SWUUC, and she communicated with UUA about our decision and the basis for it. She convinced UUA that the amount voted by our board (\$2,224.36, based on our regular budget excluding renovations) is the proper amount for us to pay in the coming year. Thanks to Carole for all of her work in this area!

Other items discussed included the all-church workshop (to be facilitated by consultant MarySue Foster and postponed from the April date announced earlier, probably to a Sunday in September); and the possible installation of an elevator to make our entire building more accessible for all members and friends. Estimates by elevator companies we've consulted place the cost at over \$50,000, but we are looking into grants that might help with that expense.

Treasurer's Report

During March we had income of \$3,003 from general operations. After operations expense of \$2,188, we had a net income from operations of \$815.

We received donations of \$236 for renovations in March and spent \$319, primarily on the playground installation. We also spent \$208 from our worship grant for new sound speakers in the chapel.

We are doing much better than our budget thanks to everyone who has helped to keep expenses lower.

On a year to date basis, our net income from general operations continues to cover our year to date principal payments. We are doing much better than our budget thanks to everyone who has helped to keep expenses lower than budgeted and/or made additional donations.

For the year to date period of July through March 2013, we had net income of \$5,029 from operations on the income statement. We also had expense of (\$3,161) for the cash payment of principal on our loan, net income of \$1,112 for renovations, expense of (\$1,500) for the board retreat that was covered by a grant from last year, and we have \$8,792 remaining from two new NTAUUS grants for RE and worship.

As of the end of March 2013, we had cash of \$48,711 and debt of \$40,305. The cash amount includes \$4,229 reserved for renovations and \$11,050 reserved for grants for the RE program, worship and board retreats.

In March we contributed \$89 to the Grayson County Shelter from the Share the Plate program.

The Rhetoric of Worship Workshop \sim June 14th



A 3-hour workshop coming June 14th (from 1 - 4 pm) with Rev. Dr. Christine Tata. Here's a peek at what we'll be studying. Open to all who wish to attend.

Logos: Worship begins with the *logos*, the word – the verbal message that you want to deliver. We'll talk about the best ways to choose and deliver those words, and how important it is that they are heard – and how very important the words are in our tradition. What message does the church want to give?

Ethos: Then we'll talk about the church's *ethos* – its attributes and reliability as a source of truth.

The ethos of an institution is displayed in the attention it pays to the necessary components of its work. If everything is sloppily done, the sound is bad, the hymns don't fit, the offering is lackluster, the missions are forgotten, and the worship unprepared, it belies the important message it is trying to convey in its logos. Here is where we will address all the technical details that are so important.

Pathos: Finally, once we have defined our logos, and we have created a reliable ethos, our worship can evoke *pathos* – it can encourage the movement of the human heart. This third session will talk about how vulnerable people can be when they come to church and the worship leader's responsibility to be generous and cautious and kind, in helping people move through the moments. The church needs to have a coherent message and a credible, competent framework, in order to make a safe space for feelings. We'll talk about the music, and the candles, and the meditation, and all the other ways in which the human heart responds to worship at its best.
