Elbert's Epistle ~ Update from the president

The church yard sale (moved indoors due to rain) brought in almost \$350, and this was matched by a member of the congregation, so our church is nearly \$700 richer than before. Leftover clothing and

other items were donated to the Crowded Closet, an extension of the Grayson County Shelter. The shelter allows its residents to select needed clothing items from the Closet, and the rest is sold to raise money to carry out the shelter's mission as the only homeless shelter in Grayson County. RRUU is also collecting toiletries and personal care items for shelter residents. Bring any unused items of soap, shampoo, toothpaste, toothbrushes, shaving supplies, etc., and deposit in the basket provided in the church foyer.

At the recent Fall Congregational Meeting, we voted to reestablish the church's Endowment Committee. The money that had been in that account was used in purchasing our current church home. The new committee will be charged with raising money, overseeing its investment, and protecting endowment funds for the future. If you would be interested in serving on the Endowment Committee, please tell me or another board member before the November 14 board meeting.

Another vote we took at the Fall Congregational Meeting was to continue our Share the Plate Sunday (the second Sunday of each month) contributions to the Earth Day Texoma Festival and the Grayson County Shelter. Several members spoke in favor of continuing the current contribution structure, noting that since RRUU isn't able to contribute large sums to any charity, we can maximize our impact by designating only two recipients of Share-the-Plate moneys. Although Earth Day Texoma is supported by a number of other organizations and businesses, our own Green Team chalice Circle is widely recognized as the

main organizer—thanks especially to members Amy Hoffman-Shehan, Marla Loturco, and Carole Harner.

A few weeks ago, Marion and I had lunch with Ashley Earls, director of the Grayson County Shelter, to talk about additional ways our church might help with shelter needs. Currently, besides our Share-the-Plate contributions six times a year, and besides allowing the shelter board to meet monthly in our building without charge, we prepare and serve a meal to shelter residents about once a quarter. (The next one is November 7. A "shelter crew" of half a dozen members plans a menu and prepare the dishes individually, and a few serve the meal and eat and chat with residents. If anyone wants to join the shelter crew, contact Marion Hill at mhill@communicomm.com.

Some possible ways RRUU members can contribute, which came from the meeting with Ashley, are these:

- 1. Teaching residents how to create a meal using ingredients on hand at the shelter. The residents have duties while staying there, and these involve meal preparation, but many are inexperienced in planning meals from what's available.
- 2. Teaching life-skills training, such as how to interview for employment and how to dress for an interview. (RRUU member Judy Donahue, who had a successful career in the corporate world, has volunteered to teach such a class, once in January and once in February of 2014.)
- 3. Transportation to take residents to doctors and/or jobs when needed.
- 4. Filling in for staff members who must be absent. Ashley said she could especially use someone (preferably a male) to fill in on Thursday evening and Saturday night when needed. A volunteer would need to fill out a volunteer application in order to do this.
- 5. Use of the church building occasionally (for a fund-raiser or a special party for residents), since the shelter does not have a large room for such events. One fund-raiser Ashley contemplates doing is one in April, which would feature a mechanical bull ride. The shelter also will need sponsors for that event.
- 6. Friendly visitors, to stop in and visit with residents. Ashley noted that it's important for homeless people to know that "someone cares."

RRUU Dinner At The Grayson Co. Shelter \sim Nov. 7^{th}

Members of RRUU will be cooking and serving a meal at Grayson County Shelter on November 7, the third time we have done this.

The current RRUU Shelter Crew consists of nine RRUU women, who about once a quarter prepare dinner for all those residing at Grayson County's only homeless shelter, our church's near neighbor. A few of us eat dinner there and

have had good conversations with residents.

Each time we bring a meal, Marion Hill calls ahead to check on the number to be served (usually 18 to 25) and any other pertinent information, such as whether

young children are there and whether one or more residents are diabetic. Crew members then settle on an entree and side dishes for individuals to contribute, and each may opt out of a particular meal as needed. 7. A PR article in the local paper, listing churches and other organizations that support the shelter, the various ways organizations and individuals assist the shelter, and suggestions of other needs the shelter has. Marion Hill is working on such an article with Ashley. Not only can such an article help the shelter, but it's an opportunity to mention RRUU, since we're one of the churches that helps.

Actually, Ashley said, about anything church members can think of doing to help, the shelter would be glad to have! The congregation voted at the Fall Congregational Meeting to join the Texas UU Justice Ministry, an organization of 20+ UU congregations in Texas that advocate on justice issues with the state legislature.

Less formally, we decided at the Fall Congregational Meeting to have monthly, or near-monthly, potluck meals after church, occasions when we can get better acquainted with each other. The first such potluck will be December 1, 2013, a time when people can get creative with Thanksgiving leftovers.

Board Bits~ from the October 2013 Board Meeting

Our Vice-President Gil Alexander had cardiac surgery on October 15, and his wife, Marilyn, had back surgery on the 23rd. Both are doing well.

At board meeting on October 10, we discussed the possibility of getting an elevator installed to go from the basement of the church to the top floor, to make our building fully accessible for all members and visitors. The church doesn't have sufficient funds in its operating budget to cover the \$50,000+ that an elevator and installation would cost, so we have been exploring ways to get grants. NTUUC (North Texas Unitarian Universalist Congregations, of which RRUU is a member) makes grants to churches, but since NTUUC only gives about \$60,000 in total grants each year, RRUU couldn't expect one large enough for an elevator.

Another possibility is a Chalice Lighters grant, but again we probably couldn't expect one large enough to pay for an elevator. Also, although RRUU has received C.L. grants in the past, we probably don't qualify for one at this time. To apply for a C.L. grant, a church must be a Fair Share congregation—meaning that our dues to the UUA (Unitarian Universalist Association, the national organization of UU churches, of which RRUU is a member) and SWUUC (Southwestern Unitarian Universalist Conference of the UUA, of which RRUU is a member) must be paid up for the year—and 20% of the church's members must have pledged to be Chalice Lighters themselves. Although RRUU is a Fair Share congregation, and although we have a few members who are signed up as Chalice Lighters, probably not enough currently are. (If you are a Chalice Lighter, please let me know at mhill@communicomm.com. If you would like to become one, a pledge form is at

http://swuuc.org/pages/stewardship/chalice-lighters.php. To become a Chalice Lighter, you only have to pledge to donate at least \$10 each time a Chalice Lighter Call is made, three times per year. By doing so,

you can help other UU churches as they seek to grow within their own communities, and can also help RRUU qualify for a C.L. grant at some future time.)

The board felt that the church shouldn't go into any more long-term debt at this time, since we still have most of the \$50,000 debt to our own members for remodeling costs, so the matter of installing an elevator was tabled for the time being. We are, however, planning to ask for smaller grants from NTUUC to install a heating/air conditioning system on the top floor and to hire musicians for several Sundays a month.

The board is currently reviewing the Policies and Procedures Manual to make sure we are acting in line with what we say we should be doing.

The board hired Kevin Bartell to fix the sliding doors to the Clara Barton room. The doors are now working and can be used to shut out surrounding noise during Adult Forum.

Treasurer's Report ~ A Monthly Update on our Finances

In the month of September, we had income of \$3,995 from general operations. After operations expense of \$1,354 for the month, we had a net income from operations of \$2,641.

In September, we had renovation expense of \$1,931 for the window replacement project. We also had grant expense of \$1,608 for the Fall Retreat, worship and religious education.

For the year to date period of July 2013 through September 2013, we had net income of \$6,806 from operations, renovation expense of \$5,201, grant expense of \$2,633 and principal payments of \$977. The total change in cash for the year to date period was a decrease of \$2,005. This was lower than our budget primarily due to the window replacement project. In September the board voted to transfer

\$2,000 from general savings to the renovation fund to be used to complete our current projects.

As of the end of September 2013, we had cash of \$49,283 and debt of \$38,360. The cash amount includes \$1,143 reserved for renovations and \$7,725 reserved for grants.

In September we donated \$105 from the Share the Plate program to the Grayson County Shelter.

Joyce first visited our church in September 2009 and after spending three month attending she became a member on December 27, 2009.



Experts who devote their life in examining religious behavior tell us that worship is the glue which holds a congregation together. Upon hearing that many UU churches suspend worship for the summer, a Lutheran minister exclaimed, "If Lutherans did that, I fear no one would come back in the fall!"

Worship - from the Old English weorthscipe meaning 'worthiness, acknowledgment of worth' - is a complex conglomeration and merging of tradition, expectations, hopes and things 'of worth'. - With a different click you may down-

load a PDF file of the survey from the church web site which you can print, take and bring or mail to church

 Alternately, you may pick up a copy of the survey at church, complete and leave it at church

If you complete the survey on line, you can see the statistical results from those who've completed it. The written comments will not display, however.


Meditation Group


