Spring Congregational Meeting ~ Sun. May 18th

The Spring Congregational Meeting will be Sunday, May 18 @ 12:35 in the Chapel. Our bylaws require that we hold two Congregational Meetings each year - in May and in October. At the May 18th meeting we will discuss several important issues

- The proposed budget
- Lay worship speakers for next year
- Our annual goals
- Elect people who have agreed to serve

The nominating committee slate is

- Robert Shelton treasurer (2 years)

- Gerry Shehan Committee on Ministry (3)
- Carole Harner Committee on Ministry (1)

The Board agreed some years ago that only a balanced budget will be presented to the congregation. In order to balance the proposed budget some painful cuts were needed as our stewardship campaign came in about \$4,000 shy of our goal. One cut (\$1,800) was in the worship honoraria, which will mean next year we will be looking for more volunteers to speak or perhaps we will use more video presentations.

Please come to the meeting! Bring your thoughts and ideas. If you cannot attend the meeting, please complete a proxy and return it to the board secretary, Doug Strong.

In order to sustain us through the meeting, the board invites everyone to bring a food contribution for a finger food potluck.

DYING in the AGE of CHOICE

A Workshop for Those Seeking a Death with Dignity

Everyone will die. We know that. This workshop openly explores how to better prepare for end of life issues. Dr. Jim Chastain from the Final Exit Network will focus on several areas which are critical for those who wish to have a death with dignity.

These include

- How to talk with your loved ones about your wishes for care you do and do not want at the end of life
- How to assure your wishes will be honored and how to put those wishes in writing
- Selecting a health care surrogate to speak for you if you cannot speak for yourself
- What to do if you become irreversibly ill and can no longer bear the suffering
- The importance of Advance Directives and why a Last Will and Testament is critical in Avoiding Probate
- Preparing a Living Will and using the Living Will Registry
- How to use Hospice
- Turning to Final Exit Network to provide information and compassionate support



Dr. Jim Chastain grew up in Mississippi, as a son and grandson of Baptist ministers. He holds an undergraduate degree from the University of Utah, an MBA from the University of Chicago and Ph.D. from the University of Illinois. He spent his working career as a professor of finance. In retirement Jim worked in the Den-

ver headquarters of the Hemlock Society for two years. Since Final Exit Network was formed as an outgrowth of the Hemlock Society in 2004 Jim has been active with it, first as Board and Advisory Board member and now as President of the Final Exit Network affiliate of Florida and as a Senior Exit Guide.

Final Exit's Guiding Principles

We hold that mentally competent adults who suffer from a fatal or irreversible physical illness, from intractable physical pain, or from a constellation of chronic, progressive physical disabilities have a basic human right to choose to end their lives when they judge the quality of their life to be unacceptable.

This right by its nature implies that the ending of one's life is one's choice, including the timing and persons present, and should be free of any restrictions by the law, clergy, medical profession, and even friends and relatives no matter how well-intentioned. We do not encourage anyone to end their life, are opposed to anyone's encouraging another to end his life, do not provide the means to do so, and do not assist in a person's death.

Open to Everyone without charge

Financial Update ~ from our church treasurer

In the month of March, we had income of \$2,329 from general operations. After operations expense of \$1,628 for the month, we had a net income from operations of \$701.

In March, we had grant expense of \$732 for worship and religious education. There was no renovation income or expense.

For the year to date period of July 2013 through March 2014, we had net income of \$12,107 from operations, net expense from renovations of \$5,857, grant income of \$7,450 from the new NTUUC grants, grant expense of \$6,849 and principal payments of \$2,961. The total change in cash for the year to date period was an increase of \$3,890. This was better than our budget primarily due to the new grants received in January.

As of the end of March 2014, we had cash of \$55,178 and debt of \$36,376. The cash amount includes \$4,487 reserved for renovations and \$10,959 reserved for grants. The amount reserved for renovations was increased in March by a transfer from savings of \$4,000 for the HVAC project currently underway.

In March, we donated \$53 from the Share the Plate program to the Grayson County Shelter.

Board Bits ~ From the April 2014 meetings.

Highlights from the April 2014 board of trustees meeting:

- Combined with the recently installed insulated windows, a new energy efficient HVAC system for the third floor has been completed. Rather than having to heat or cool the entire third floor, each room has its own system which can be operated by a remote control. The next step in the project will be insulating the attic. Much appreciation and thanks goes to Marilyn Alexander who spearheaded the project.
- The proposed budget was beyond the income raised in the stewardship campaign so the board was forced to make nearly \$4,000 in cuts. After a lengthy conversation a balanced budget was created with the largest cut (\$2,300) coming from the worship. The board agreed this is a concern that will be brought to the May congregational meeting.
- The 2014 Leadership School will be Aug 4-8 in Denton. We can send two people and have dedicated funds to cover the tuition.

The new energy-efficient HVAC system on the third floor has been installed. We can now heat or cool each room independently!

Previous graduates from RRUU include Marion and Elbert Hill, Penny Armstrong, Marla Loturco and Joyce Peak. Anyone who might enjoy going this year is encouraged to speak with any graduate for an overview of this in-depth and very rewarding experience.

- The Nominating committee presented its slate for the upcoming election as follows: For President, Dan Althoff; Treasurer, Robert Shelton; Committee on Ministry, Gerry Shehan and Carole Harner; and for Nominating Committee, L.D. Clark.
- The Board agreed to shift the May and June board meeting from the 3rd Thursday to the 2nd Thursday.
- The next meeting will be Thursday, May 8th and anyone who would like to attend is invited.

In addition, if you don't feel you have a sermon in your heart - how about being a Worship Associate? You can find your own material or the worship team will provide you with a script.
