Houston: We have a problem!

Last year three studies hit the religious media outlets which has set the Worship Team in a funk. The studies explored how willing church goers are to watch a sermon on video rather than a live-and-inperson clergy type. No major surprises – most folks want the flesh and blood rather than a hi-def sermon. Let's face it, no one gets up on Sunday and says, "Boy, I sure would like to watch a sermon on video today!"

The studies found that almost half of those who don't go to church (47 percent) say it doesn't matter if the sermon is live or delivered by video and church goers under 30 (37%) generally agreed it didn't make a difference. Three in 10 claim videos won't keep them from coming. The same number say live or video sermons are fine. That information could be helpful as we look at ways to grow.

The funk came from learning that ...

- smaller churches have a bias against video
- those with a college degree are more likely to want an in-person sermon
- Older people who regularly attend church are the least favorable toward video sermons

We're <u>small</u>, <u>degreed</u> and <u>older</u>. We are in trouble!

This is important for Red River because we make use of video sermons. The good parts of video sermons ...

- we get to hear a variety of UU clergy, each with his/her own style
- we come to know newer, younger ministers who will be the future face of our faith
- we can count on quality content since ministers scrub their cruddy videos
- we are able to keep within the budget

The bad parts of video sermons ...

people opt out and stay home

Unitarian Universalists have, since time forgotten, valued the sermon above all else – even coffee! It is the sermon that brings us to the chapel week after week. When using a video sermon the worship team crafts a full service to enhance and deepen the experience, including a worship associate and live music on those Sundays. The aim is to assure the worship experience has value and meaning even when the speaker is on video.

Living in a rural area, it is a struggle to find speakers, harder to get ministers who are generally working Sunday mornings. Video sermons make the work of the worship team less grueling yet people are staying home.

Change is difficult and made more challenging when people assume they won't like a video sermon before experiencing services using one. Some argue that you go and visit a friend in the hospital, you don't send an Instagram image of yourself. Some ask how a minister would feel to have 30 cell phones propped up on chairs with people watching an in-person preacher from their homes.

The worship team feels that Hi-Def sermons are good theology and good business for Red River. Yet people are still opting out and staying home.

Change takes planning. Before launching their new product Sears asked focus group participants if they would buy a remotely operated garage door opener. The response was overwhelmingly negative. Henry Ford famously said if you asked the people what they wanted they would have requested a faster horse.

Please give video sermons a fair shot. Please remember that Hi-Def sermons are good theology and good business for Red River - for all the reasons listed above. The worship team hopes that you will come to church anyway because good things happen here: friendships, spiritual growth, community and great coffee.



The North Texas UU Congregations is an umbrella organization to which Red River UU belongs. We are one of thirteen congregations that make up NTUUC.

NTUUC, through their endowment, has given our Fellowship grants for multiple years. Marla Loturco of Red River UU is on the board of NTUUC as the secretary. This organization is a vital support to our Fellowship and it is essential for us to be involved. We receive education, training, and funding from this organization. It also connects us with the twelve other congregations in North Texas.

The last board meeting for NTUUC was held on November 7, 2015 at Horizon UU Church. Highlights from the meeting include:

- ✓ Rebecca Marmaduke from Oak Cliff Social Justice was a visitor attending the meeting to talk to us about gun control and a group called Moms Demand Action to End Gun Violence. This is a national organization with a local Dallas chapter. Rebecca asks that local churches allow the group to hold their quarterly meeting at various UU churches in the metroplex area without charge. She will also be the liaison if any NTUUC churches would like to ask the Mom's group to speak at their social justice meetings or Sunday services.
- ✓ An new video on NTUUC is almost ready for release. It was previewed at the meeting and is having some final adjustments made before release.
- ✓ NTUUC has created a brochure that includes one page on each of the 13 member congregations. This will be available soon as well. A copy has been given to the Red River UU board in case they want to make any changes to their page.
- ✓ If you would like to attend any NTUUC events, region events, or even GA and could use some financial assistance, the NTUUC committee you can apply to is now called Registration Assistance. Marion Hill from Red River UU serves on that committee.
- The NTUUC Awards deadline is December 10, 2015. Individuals and congregations may submit suggestions for Ministers, Staff, and Volunteers from their congregation for the awards at http://www.ntuuc.org/events/recognition-awards. Red River UU has been lucky to have a Marty Robinson Award for Volunteers winner every year since the beginning of the awards: Amy Hoffman-Shehan (2010), Marla Loturco (2011), Bruce Cameron (2012), Carolyn Cameron (2013), Marion Hill (2014), and Elbert Hill (2015).

- ✓ A Social Action Workshop is being planned for March 5, 2016. It will be held in Fair Park and will talk about Environmental Justice as it intersects wit Social Justice, Racial Justice and Economic Justice. It will be an interfaith event. Aly Tharp is one of the organizers with the NTUUC Education Committee and NTUUC Social Justice Committee both involved as well.
- ✓ The grant request deadline is November 30, 2015 with the grants awarded on January 23, 2016 at the Awards Banquet held at Oak Cliff UU. Everyone from Red River UU is invited to attend. Tickets will be available in January from Marla Loturco or on-line at <u>www.ntuuc.org/</u>.

Some happenings around the NTUUC cluster:

Arlington UU Church - Hosting a COG (Covenant of the Goddess) allday event that includes a Diversity, Racism, and Privilege Walk; taking the first small steps toward the big project of repairing/reconditioning their aging building.

Community UU Church - Adult RE program is vibrant with Fall courses offered every night of the week; the congregation voted to pass a resolution of support for the Black Lives Matter movement.

Denton UU Fellowship - 2016 Stewardship Campaign goal is \$180,000 of which there are pledges totaling \$141,000 (78% of goal) as of November 1, 2015. For 2015 there were 112 pledge units and to date, 64 so DUUF is hoping to hear from about 40 to 50 more.

First UU Church of Dallas - First Sunday in November had a Planned Parenthood speaker through Rev. Daniel Kanter's connections. Share the plate collection for Planned Parenthood was over \$20,000.

Horizon UU Church - Search committee has a new brochure and had a good workshop on this. Information could be available to other churches in search. Hosting Great Decisions discussions and Dec 2: Crisis in Syria.

Pathways Church - Have been keeping our kids busy. We are about halfway through with the OWL program for our 8-10 year olds, they also recently harvested from our two box gardens and fed the congregation a salad luncheon after the service. On another Sunday they teamed up with our Humanist covenant group to hear a presentation from a local beekeeper.

Sacred Journey Fellowship - Young adult meetings on Sunday evening - starting to run out of room. Averaging 25-30 people 18-30 years old.

Westside UU Church - Westside just held our Biennial Progressive Dinner and Auction called BUUts and Bling at the Stampede Room of the Fort Worth Stockyards. It was very well attended and we are hoping to come close to the \$34,000.00 we raised in 2013! Our MSC committee is hard at work putting the finishing touches on our search packet for the prospective candidates looking for a full time church.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of October, we had income of \$3,156 from general operations. After operations expense of \$2,195 for the month, we had a net income from operations of \$920.

In October we received a donation of \$15 for the Wi-Fi fund. We spent \$127 for Wi-Fi services. We also spent \$335 for paint for renovation of the upstairs rooms.

For the year to date period, we had a net income of \$9,317 from operations. Those included restricted amounts of \$5,862.The total change in cash for this month was \$474.

As of the end of October 2015, we had total cash of \$61,031 and our debt totaled \$29,114.

In October, we donated \$103 from the Share the Plate program to the Earth Day Festival.
