Dan's Dispatch



The unexpectedly weird weather following Christmas reminds us how quickly circumstances beyond our control can change. Fortunately, though, most circumstances in most of our lives are indeed within our control.

As members of this community, we are able to determine for ourselves our direction and goals. As we enter a new year, I hope we will all take a moment to reflect upon the long-range goals we have set through our Board of Trustees.

In May of 2013, the Board set out a five-year plan with nine points:

- 1. Increase community projects from four to eight;
- 2. Develop Religious Education program for youth, with paid part-time Director, paid childcare in nursery, and average attendance of 20;
- 3. Growth in membership to 60 members;
- 4. Operate at a profit;
- 5. Attendance, including visitors and friends, to average 50 per week;
- 6. Worship services with three ordained or professional speakers per month;
- 7. Increase interest groups from five to eight;
- 8. Improve building and grounds; and
- 9. No minister planned in five years.

We are now just a bit beyond two and a half years into our five year plan; we have completed church years 2013-14, 2014-15 and we are a little more than halfway into church year 2015-16, so I see this a good time to pause and consider where we stand in relation to our stated goals. These are very optimistic and enthusiastic targets, and I think it's fair to say that we still have a great deal of work to do if we intend to meet them more completely than we have to date. Next month in this column, I will provide some figures to go along with these points.

As part of the trust you have placed in me as president of the Board of Trustees, I see it as my honored duty and privilege to recall what we have pledged to ourselves—covenanted with each other—to accomplish. That largely explains my ongoing interest—not to say "obsession!"—with the details of such things as our Safe Congregation Policy and our Bylaws.

As Unitarian Universalists, we typically place a very high value on words. As the old joke goes, Unitarian Universalists are often such bad singers because we read ahead to see if we agree with the lyrics!

This is a very good moment to see if we "agree with the lyrics" we ourselves have written. I hope you will share your observations, comments, or concerns with me or any Trustee about our Five Year Plan. And as always, you are invited and welcome to attend our monthly Board of Trustees meeting to share your thoughts about the congregation's governance and direction.

PS – January's Share the Plate will be on Jan 31st

For the seventh consecutive year, someone from our tiny congregation has been selected the "North Texas UU Church Volunteer of the Year." Our own Dan Althoff is so honored this year.



Dr. F. Daniel Althoff is a charter member of Red River and has been an active member ever since. During his first tenure as president, Dan challenged the Texas Comptroller who

denied the church tax exemption status because our bylaws do not profess a belief in a supreme entity.

His insistence on defending Red River UU's status as a church in 2004 was important not only for the congregation but for all UU churches in Texas and beyond. Dan found a lawsuit appropriate for Red River UU to join, then located a sympathetic Texas attorney to represent the church pro bono, and the resulting victory not only provided validation and pride for Red River, but also brought favorable attention to Unitarian Universalism across Texas and nation-wide through the publicity generated by the Comptroller's ill-considered lawsuit (Google "Texas Unitarian Church denied exemption" for the fascinating history.)

Dan grew up a Catholic who appreciated the rituals and soaring religious music he encountered in that denomination. He calls on that background, plus his own experience of playing and writing music – including *Good Religion* which the choir at Community UU in Plano sang at our building dedication - to enrich worship activities at church as both pianist and member of the Worship Team. Dan's musical abilities are an added gift to the congregation which he freely shares many Sundays a year.

Last year Dan accepted the nomination to serve on the Board of Trustees. As church president, Dan employs his friendly, amiable disposition in maintaining good relations with NTUUC and UUA and leading the congregation in cooperating with the larger UU community. He lives the UU Seven Principles, showing respect for all people of whatever background; demonstrating respect for the environment by assisting with Earth Day Texoma; employing the democratic process to right wrongs; and can always be counted on to help when needed – from painting walls to participating in area UU workshops and retreats.

Dan Althoff joins the ranks of Amy Hoffman-Shehan (2010); Marla Loturco (2011); Bruce Cameron (2012); Carolyn Cameron (2013); Marion Hill

(2014) and Elbert Hill (2015) Marion Hill and Elbert Hill (previous honorees) and will be honored at the Annual NTUUC Awards Luncheon on Saturday, January 23, 2016 at the Oak Cliff UU Church.

Red River is the *only* UU congregation in North Texas to have a member received the Marty Robinson Volunteer Award every year since the award was created in 2010.



Everyone is invited to attend the luncheon. Tickets are \$18 and are available from our NTUUC representative – Marla Loturco.

Named after Marty Robinson, the award honors volunteerism which is at the heart of any religious community. Having first joined a Florida congregation, Marty Robinson became part of Jefferson Unitarian Church in the early 1970s, and headed up the RE program before moving to Germany. When she returned a few months later, she had to settle in Dallas - she said "she couldn't go back to Ft. Worth after they had given her such a big sendoff!" Marty went on to serve as President of First Unitarian in Dallas, and in 1986 helped found Horizon Unitarian Universalist Church in Farmers Branch/Carrollton. She has been instrumental in its continued growth and success, serving in many capacities, including President and chair of Pastoral Caregivers. Marty has also served as President of SWUUC, (the SW District of the UUA) and Chair of Volunteers for the 1994 General Assembly in Ft. Worth.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of November, we had income of \$3,412 from general operations. After operations expense of \$1,457 for the month, we had a net income from operations of \$1,955.

In November we received generous donations of \$1,200 for the renovation fund and \$165 for the Wi-Fi Fund.

For the year to date period, we had a net income of \$11,272 from operations. Those included restricted amounts of \$9,550.The total change in cash for the month was a decrease of \$2728.

As of the end of November 2015, we had total cash of \$63,714 and our debt totaled \$29,114.

In November, we donated \$151 from the Share the Plate program to the Grayson County Shelter.
