### Dan's Dispatch



For a small congregation, we have done—and continue to do—some pretty amazing things. Even an admittedly partial list is impressive, starting with the purchase and ongoing improvements to our unique and lovely building.

Then there's the continuous commitment to celebrating Earth Day in Sherman, which won a national award for the Green Team two years ago; the voters' registration drive; the quarterly dinners at the Grayson County Shelter; the remarkably varied Sunday services with performers and speakers of all sorts; and the Adult Forum with its rich array of topics and discussions.

And with all these, I know there are yet many other activities and interests that I haven't mentioned, and I apologize for my sieve-like mind as I type this out! I do know we are a group of people whose dedication and involvement span a vast field of service—service to our communities as well as service to individuals. We do a pretty good job, I think, of living out the words of the covenant we recite every Sunday.

With all this broad spectrum of interests and activities, though, we sell ourselves short as a liberal religious community if we don't also help attend to the personal concerns of our membership. That's why I'm once again calling for a few—maybe three, maybe four members to revitalize our dormant Caring Committee. It's not that we *don't care* for each other; no, that's not it at all. We care very much. But we look after each other in informal ways, which is not at all surprising in a small congregation. And as wonderful and as effective informality often is, some of us may not know where to go or who to talk to when we're experiencing a difficult time. Having actual names of actual members on our website linked to the Caring Committee could be the connection that a hurting or struggling friend is looking for.

And as we look towards how we care for each other, let's also look at how we welcome newcomers and visitors. I don't believe there's anybody among us who sees us now as forming a complete and "closed" circle-one that doesn't want to open up to anybody else. To borrow a phrase from the service on February 28, our "saving message" is open to people of all ages, including children. We are fortunate to have a group of two to three individuals who cheerfully volunteer their availability during our Sunday service to attend to young visitors who may come to church with their families. Data and the lived experience show that visiting families are much more likely to return if there is some special activity dedicated to their children. Looking after the needs of families with children is one of the keys to a healthy and growth-oriented congregation. So, in short, we still need more volunteers to be available to play with visiting young friends once a month. It might be an overused word, but it would definitely be a blessing to the church, to the family, and to the child.

As we all know, being a lay-led congregation is very hard work. We do not have any full-time staff. What gets done is entirely up to us--whether that's planning a service, helping to run a church garage sale, setting up for Earth Day, updating our website, producing the newsletter, lending a sympathetic ear to another church member, or playing bingo with a visiting child. It's all a part of what we do and who we are. And we all need each other to do it, and to do it well!

# Chapel Ceiling Replacement Project

Our chapel is getting a new ceiling because the current one is sagging. Better to fix the problems before it comes crashing down one day. The project, supported with a \$5,900 NTUUC grant, will take two weeks to complete, starting on Monday, March 28<sup>th</sup>. During the work the chapel will be a construction zone with the doors sealed off (to keep the dust in and people out). Completion date: April 16<sup>th</sup>.

#### What will be happening inside:

- a new wood ceiling
- new wall-to-wall carpeting (current carpet will go into the Anthony Rm & the F. Church Library)\*
- an extended chancel
- permanent placement and lighting for the Sneller Memorial Window
- recessed ceiling lighting throughout
- recessed spot lights to highlight the pulpit
- two video projectors mounted in the ceiling
- two recessed power screens for video projection
- new ceiling fans
- centralized light controls on the AV desk

When we are finished, we will be able to focus worship on either the north or west wall and there will be enough illumination so everyone can see. We will be able to run all sound, lights, video and screens from the AV desk.

Clearly there is no way we can use the chapel during the work. We get to become flexible.

### Emergency Response Training



Fourteen people attended the special Emergency Response Training presented by Robert Shelton on Feb 27<sup>th</sup>. One person takes the lead in dealing with the situation. S/he will... use active listening; re-

main calm; not crowd in; arms by side; have palms up to demonstrate trust; use good eye contact; assess the situation while talking, never argue, humanize the situation, watch body language (heavy breathing, sweating).

One person needs to sneak out and call 911 (local police can't get text message). The group agreed... we need several people who can act as lead person; we need crash bar on chapel outside exit door; and the whole congregation needs to know this information. Robert also demonstrated how to disable an intruder safely. Everyone felt it was valuable information for us.

# Here's a Feel Good Story

One afternoon a woman pulled in the church parking lot and stopped at our Little Free Library. A member was coming out of the church. The woman called to her and said how pleased she was to have our Little free Library back. She had heard that we had taken it down for some minor repairs. She said, *"I use your library all the time. In fact I drive from all the way across town. I am so glad that it is back. I've missed it."* 

The library is a quiet, consistent outreach we provide. We go through a lot of books in a month, especially children's books. Remember you can always bring books and place them in the library. It is as simple as that. The more books we put in, the more books get read.

# A Suggestion Worth Trying
