As I write, the renovations on the chapel are just getting underway. These improvements were made possible, in part, by a grant from North Texas UU Congregations and we are grateful to them for this and all the previous grants

that have added so much to our common life.

It seems very appropriate to me that our chapel is getting this special attention. The glue that holds any faith community together, perhaps more so than any single item, is the time we spend together on Sunday mornings. Whether we choose to call what we do in that space "worship," or a "service," or a "program" makes little difference to me; I've used all three words interchangeably to refer to the same activity! And because that space is central and so important to us as a congregation, it should ideally reflect the best in us. The choices we have made in and for that space are intended to show off the best in ourselves to ourselves – and especially to other people who may find and visit us.

As our "old" chapel has always been, our "new" chapel will be flexible in its configuration and ori-

entation. This is very much in keeping with the variety of Sunday experiences we pride ourselves on offering. For beyond the attractive exterior of our building, which presents the public face of Red River Unitarian Universalist Church, we will find in the newly updated chapel the public heart of Red River. In this heart beat the rhythms of justice, peace, love, compassion, and understanding. The other day I was commenting to some other members about Red River UU. I said that there's no church—indeed, no other place—in Texoma that's anything quite like us. I believe what I said, and I said that with no small amount of pride and satisfaction, a very forgivable peccadillo.

Whether we have on any given Sunday a dramatic staged reading, a concert, a "traditional" service, or even a cabaret, the variety expresses the diversity of the human condition and with our very human concerns. But the message is essentially the same: *Come, come, whoever you are...Ours is no caravan of despair, come, yet again, come*.

chancel table, and assorted things vanished from the chapel. It might have taken a bit longer if the meditation group hadn't done a moving meditation by packing the hymnals and moving some furniture before anyone else arrived.

Board Bits

The Board of Trustees met on March 13, 2016. Highlights of the meeting:

- Agreed to pay our congregation's annual dues to the TX UU Justice Ministry (TxUUJM) at \$2.00/member
- Approved TxUUJM's request for congregations to show support in the campaign to "Let's Tell The Supreme Court to Rule With Empathy, Justice and Compassion!" as it relates to SCOTUS current consideration to overturn the TX court decision to close most abortion clinics in the state, leaving only 10 open (and only in the Dallas/Houston/Austin/San Antonio areas).
- Annual Stewardship Appeal: Agreed that we will again skip face-to-face soliciting in favor of a written appeal to the congregation. Agreed pledge Sunday will be April 17th as part of the Great Reveal of the new chapel ceiling project.
- David Roth Concert: Agreed that while we would enjoy hosting David Roth again, his available date of Monday, June 27th probably would not result in a financial success. Previous concerts hosted by Red River have not drawn even a minimum audience.
- Welcoming Kids to church: We are struggling to get people willing to agree to lead an activity for kids. Articles and announcements have failed to recruit people. Perhaps more people would volunteer if we have a series of One-Hour activities with cliff notes that a volunteer can grab and use with children. Dan agreed to prepare materials of activities that we can show the congregation.
- Bylaw Revisions: At the Fall 2015 Congregation meeting, The congregation recommended that the board review the bylaws with a hope to simplifying them and to bring revisions to the Spring 2016 Meeting. Agreed to meet and prepare the revised bylaws in time to include in the meeting packet.
- Secular Home School: A group of parents who collectively home school contacted us asking if they could use the church for certain activities. The board agreed to contact the group feeling their goals are ones that we can easily embrace. Sadly the group has not responded to our outreach after their initial inquiry. Agreed to put the item on hold until we hear from the group.
- Budget Approvals: Agreed that all expenses from the renovation fund must have prior board approval.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of February, we had income of 3,940 from general operations. After operations expense of 1,775 for the month, we had a net income from operations of 2,196.

In February we received a donation of \$200 for renovations. We spent\$8,358 for supplies for the new ceiling, remodel for the upstairs bathroom, and lights for the front porch. The renovation expenditures leave us with \$1,715 in the renovation fund. We also received \$120 toward a new microphone. We purchased the new equipment at a cost of \$347. In addition, we received a donation of \$50 for the Wi-Fi fund.

For the year to date period, we had a net income of \$13,735 from operations. Those included restricted amounts of \$6,477. The total change in cash for the month was an increase of \$6,198.

As of the end of February, we had total cash of \$67,412 and our debt totaled \$28,035.

In February, we donated \$83 from the Share the Plate program to the Earth Day Festival.
