Dan's Dispatch



The congregational meeting we held last month was a wonderful celebration of self-governance. The Unitarian Universalist commitment to the "right of conscience and the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large" is so profound that it's the fifth of our Seven UU Principles.

For me, congregational polity is so important that I might almost consider it "sacramental"—to borrow a word from my former faith tradition.

At every May meeting, we decide on numerous items of importance, such as the election of church officers, trustees, and the upcoming budget. I want to express my thanks to all who attended our meeting, in person or by proxy, and made self-governance possible.

I am especially thankful for the generous financial support that we all pledged towards our church operations for next fiscal year 2016-17—we received an increase in pledged support of approximately 21%! At a time when budgets are strained in so many areas, and retirees do not receive even a modest cost of living adjustment in their Social Security checks, such an outpouring is truly remarkable. It shows we have confidence in ourselves and in our future. I think we deserve to take some well-earned satisfaction in that!

I am also very appreciative that the congregation voted in favor of simplifying our Bylaws. I believed personally we were burdened, rather than helped, by a document that required a lengthy list of committees (and committee members) to accomplish our mission. The Board now has the flexibility to appoint committees as needed, rather than as required by the Bylaws.

This flexibility is especially helpful in a smaller congregation such as ours.

My sincere congratulations and thanks to Marla Loturco (Vice-President) and Kelly Cofield-Dyer (Treasurer) on their election. Congratulations and thanks are due also to Elbert Hill (Nominating Committee) and Robert Shelton (Committee on Ministry). The Nominating Committee and Committee on Ministry stand independently of the Board of Trustees and serve as additional key sounding boards for the concerns of the congregation. They will begin serving officially in those capacities on July 1st.

It has been my honor and great privilege to serve as president for the past two years, and I hope I have contributed to the health of this congregation and to the cause of Unitarian Universalism in Texoma and north Texas. I was humbled and flattered that the Nominating Committee asked if I was willing to serve an additional term, but I felt unable to accept due to some impending additional responsibilities at Southeastern Oklahoma State University where I teach. You may be aware that we are facing a serious loss of faculty and administration in the next school year, and as Chair-Elect of the Faculty Senate there, I expect to be heavily involved in the reorganization of the university. Your confidence in me has filled me with gratitude, and I did not want to leave the congregation headless—so to speak—at the end of our May meeting. That is why I accepted the honor of being nominated for president again, but also why I can hold the office only through the end of August. I will continue to do my best until then, when another is identified as a willing nominee for president. Again, my deepest thanks for allowing me to serve as president for these past two years.

A Welcoming Place for Children Sunday, June 5 - worship and a special workshop after things

Teresa Wright of Pathways UU Church in Hurst, Texas will present a workshop to everyone who is interested in learning how to create a religious education experience for children in small congregations such as ours. Her many years of experience in working with small numbers of children who attend occasionally at Pathways can provide us with a helpful model of greeting and engaging children when they visit. Teresa will share two sets of activities and lesson plans she has designed: one for younger children and another for older children.

Working with children in a UU setting doesn't have to be complicated. Although it certainly requires some degree of planning and preparation, she indicates there are only four principles involved:

- Everyone--adults and children alike--should have fun!
- Everyone should learn something
- There should be something physical for the kids to take away with them
- Everyone should feel welcome, included, and important.
- And though this last thing isn't a principle, snacks!
 Never underestimate the value and importance of snacks!

Whether or not you see yourself as a future volunteer for children's Religious Education, please stay to hear Teresa and support our important project of creating a welcoming place for children at Red River UU Church. We have something that can be found nowhere else in Texoma, something that some unknown number of young families may be aching to find--an openness to liberal religious ideas and a passion for social justice. Let's be ready to open our doors, our arms, and our hearts for them and their kids!

Why this is important

The Prime Directive (with apologies to Star Trek) of existence is a simple one: DO NOT VANISH! This dictate has kept families, businesses, organizations and even churches from becoming extinct. Most faith communities won't admit that their core mission is not to save souls, but to perpetuate their church into the future. Right now the Unitarian churches in England are on the brink of extinction. There are 173 Unitarian churches in Great Britain today, only 2 have more than 100 members. There were approximately 50,000 Unitarians around the time of the first World War - today that number is 3,600. (See details of what our Unitarian cousins in Great Britain are doing about it here.)

The huge gap at Red River is our current inability to welcome children. It has not always been this way. The church database lists 133 children who've visited over our 17 years history. Parents visit with their kids, often, because they want their children to have some sense of a religious connection free of the angst they experienced in the church they grew up on. We thwart our prime directive each time we tell visiting families to check out Community UU in Plano or the Denton UU Fellowship. Our future or lack thereof is linked to those 133 children who are not here.

It is best that we spare ourselves knowing what the average age of our congregation is. Suffice to say it is north of fifty. Please linger on Sunday, June 5 for Teresa Wright's visit. Participation does not mean one has to volunteer. We're all in this together as a lay-led congregation and the more energy we can create towards creating a Welcoming Place For Children the better it will be for our church.

Spring Meeting Notes

The 2016 Spring Congregation Meeting was held on May 15th with 28 members counted (present or by proxy). The minutes of the last meeting along with the various written reports were approved.

The proposed revisions to our bylaws were discussed and approved unanimously which brought a round of applause. The age of membership now is 13 and rather than having 11 standing committees we have three: Finance/Endowment; Membership and Worship. The board may now appoint committee as needed.

The proposed budget was reviewed and approved without any modifications.

The election of church leadership was done by acclamation, with Marla Loturco, VP; Kelly Cofield-Dyer, treasurer; Elbert Hill, Nominating; and Robert Shelton, Committee on Ministry. The position of president, however, remains vacant. Our current president explained his work at school will require more attention so he declined to run again (this was Dan's second round as church president). He did acquiesce in part by agreeing to stay on two additional months, leaving the office on August 31, 2016.

The congregation agreed that when the nominating committee announces the candidate for president, we will have a special meeting. We agreed to table discussion on the annual goals until that meeting.

A discussion regarding our need for children activities was held. We have funds to help entice people to lead activities for children. People indicated they were willing to help but dislike missing the service.

In the open discussion the congregation learned that we could get a filtration system for drinking water and stop using bottled water. The congregation approved the purchase. Also discussed was how to keep the new chapel carpet free of coffee stains by exploring using wide base travel mugs.

Small UU Church Conference

A conference focused on issues facing UU congregations of less than 75 members - like Red River - will be Saturday, June 11th from 10-4 at the Arlington UU Church. Registration opens at 10:00am with light breakfast and beverages. An ingathering service will be held at 11:00am followed by our keynote address. We'll break for lunch after the keynote. The afternoon will include three different breakout sessions: 1) Growing Membership; 2) Becoming a Welcoming Congregation and 3) Developing a Covenant of Right Relationships. Want to go? Treasurer's Report

In the month of April, we had income of \$3,107 from general operations. After operations expense of \$8,717 for the month, we had a net income from operations of (\$5,610).

In April, we received a grant of \$500 for the Earth Day Celebration. We paid that amount to the Earth Day Committee. We spent \$74 from our Wi-Fi fund leaving us with a balance of \$1,236.

For the year to date period, we had a net income of \$9,892 from operations. Those included restricted amounts of \$4,762. The total change in cash for the month was an increase of \$5,609.

As of the end of April, we had total cash of \$60,258 and our debt totaled \$26,945.

In April, we donated \$100 from the Share the Plate program to the Earth Day Festival.
