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A Workshop for Our Church Committees

As a lay-led congregation, we depend only on ourselves for everything that happens under our roof-from our Sunday services and programming, to raising our own funds and deciding how and where to spend them, to welcoming our new members into the church's life and supporting veteran stalwart members at the same time. Being lay-led offers many opportunities to choose our direction, but it also asks a little something of us as individual members of a community. At our last congregational meeting in May, we voted to reduce the number of committees we need to run our affairs. Three of the regular operating committees are the Worship Committee (or Team), the Membership Committee, and the Finance/Endowment Committee. The membership on those committees comes from member volunteers, although they are officially "appointed" by the Board of Trustees—and the Board of Trustees is very eager to "appoint" volunteers!

In addition to those three volunteer Committees, there are two Committees that are directly elected by the congregation. Those are the Committee on Ministry and the Nominating Committee. Those two Committees have individual descriptions in the Bylaws about their composition and role in the church. The Nominating Committee's role is fairly straightforward and limited. And we know that the Committee on Ministry is intended to oversee all our church's ministries. But what are our ministries? How should they be overseen? How should we evaluate them? How should we report to the larger church about them?

Although the committee names give an idea of what they're about, most of the details are not found in the Bylaws, so it's up to us to give them a more definite shape and direction. Fortunately for us, we have an existing Policy and Procedures Manual that we can use as a starting point – we don't have to reinvent the wheel and we can build upon work that has already been done.

There is a role each one of us can play as we chart the direction of our small but mighty congregation. So if you are already a member of, or if you are interested in finding out about any of the following:

- Nominating Committee
- Committee on Ministry
- ✤ Worship Committee
- Membership Committee
- Finance/Endowment Committee

please join us after church on Sunday, August 21st, from 1:00 to 3:30 p.m. as the Board hosts a Special All Committees Workshop. We will explore together how our church committees can work to build an even stronger and more vital liberal religious community for ourselves and for our part of the world that needs our unique voice.

Oh, and more one thing. Rumor has it that there will be things to eat and drink, too!

The UU Flaming Chalice

A flame within a chalice is a primary symbol of the Unitarian Universalist faith tradition. Many of our congregations kindle a flaming chalice in gatherings and worships and feature the chalice symbol prominently.

Hans Deutsch, an Austrian artist, first brought together the chalice and the flame as a Unitarian symbol during his work with the Unitarian Service Committee during World War II. To Deutsch, the image had connotations of sacrifice and love. The flaming chalice is the official symbol of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee and the Unitarian Universalist Association. Officially or unofficially, it functions as a logo for hundreds of congregations. Perhaps most importantly, it has become a focal point for worship. No one meaning or interpretation is official. The flaming chalice, like our faith, stands open to receive new truths that pass the tests of reason, justice, and compassion. Many UU find comfort in seeing the light of reason, the warmth of community, and the flame of hope in the use of the flaming chalice.

Our chalice logo was created just for us. The river, in two shades of blue, are the letters "R R" and the top of the chalice contains the two letters "U U". We added the two interlocking circles which traditionally have represented the consolidation of the American Unitarian Association and the Universalist Church of America back in 1961. The image, to the right-without the circles, shows the detail of why the logo looks the way it does.



What the Board did in July

Here's highlights of the July $10^{\rm th}$ board meeting:

- Welcomes Kelly Cofield-Dyer to the board as the church treasurer
- Agreed to host a Sunday afternoon gathering for those who currently serve on the three elected committees and the three standing committee to brainstorm ways of enhancing church life
- Approved hosting the 2017 Small Church Conference for congregations in North Texas - sometime next spring
- Agreed to set up an electronic suggestion box where people can email suggestions about church life, activities, programs and outreach projects - or anything else!
- Listen to ideas brought to the board by a young visitor who suggested we post who is on the Board, offer a visitor packet of materials; reach out to those who self identify as agnostic, atheists, free-thinkers, or 'nones'
- Agreed to Appeal to the City of Denison to ask why we are charged for refuse services but are not permitted to use them

Treasurer's Report

In the month of June, we had income of \$2,984 from general operations. After operations expense of \$1,816 for the month, we had a net income from operations of \$1,169.

In June, we received a donation of \$5,000 for new carpet. We spent \$1,102 of our renovation fund for renovating the upstairs and new tile for the entry foyer. We spent \$68 from our Wi-Fi fund leaving us with a balance of \$1,042 in that fund.

For the year to date period, we had a net income of \$10,831 from operations. Those included restricted amounts of \$5,738. The total change in cash for the month was a decrease of \$4,495.

As of the end of June, we had total cash of \$67,149 and our debt totaled \$26,945.

In June, we donated \$131 from the Share the Plate program to the Earth Day Festival


