What the Board did in August

Here's highlights of the July 10th board meeting:

- Thanked Dan Althoff for his 2 years as president and welcomed him to his new position as Past President
- Finalized plans for the August 21 workshop, including PowerPoint from Marla and Dan, discussion on implementing our 2016-2017 goals. Agreed to email everyone involved in our three standing committees:
 - Finance/Endowment
 - Worship
 - Membership

- > Approved March 11, 2017 for our hosting the Small Church Conference, Dan, Marla and Doug appointed to the planning committee along with others who wish to
- Discussed the 360 Circle Leadership Training program being offered jointly by UUA and All Souls, Tulsa. Agreed to consider participating after their pilot program completes.
- Learned the City of Denison will pick up both recycles and trash from us, rumors to the contrary proved unfounded

Special Workshop Report

On Sunday, August 21, approximately a dozen members of the congregation accepted the open invitation to join the first-ever "working lunch workshop" centering on the revised committee structure under the amended Bylaws.

Marla Loturco and Dan Althoff, with Doug Strong at the AV board, offered a PowerPoint overview and description of the committees. They noted that the committees were divided among those elected directly by the congregation and those overseen by the Board of Trustees.

The groups directly elected by the congregation are the Board of Trustees, the Committee on Ministry, and the Nominating Committee.

The standing committees that report to the Board of Trustees are the Worship Committee (usually referred to as the Worship Team), the Membership Committee, and the Finance/Endowment Committee.

While some committees, such as the Board of Trustees and the Worship Team, meet regularly, our conversations revealed that the duties and expectations for other committees were not widely known. Marla and Dan reminded those attending that much of the groundwork for the "lesser known" committees had already been laid out in the Policy & Procedures Manual, another church resource that is also little known!

Because it was a "first-ever" workshop on church committees, the agenda was fluid. The presentation led naturally into a discussion and brain-storming session on the role and function of the committees, particularly on those that are less well-known.

The old carpet was recycled and now graces, wall-to-wall, throughout the third floor (except for the Arts & Crafts room that already had a spiffy floor). With all the rooms repainted, the 3rd floor is worth the hike up the stairs to see.



Treasurer's Report

In the month of July, we had income of \$3,348 from general operations. After operations expense of \$3,539 for the month, we had a net income from operations of \$(191).

In July, we spent \$4,995 for new carpet. That leaves us with \$5 in the renovation fund.

For the year to date period, we had a net income of \$4,377 from operations. Those included restricted amounts of \$1,240 for RE Coordinator, \$2,036 for the elevator fund, \$250 for DBLE, and \$1,042 for the Wi-Fi fund. The total change in cash for the month was an increase of \$5,186.

As of the end of July, we had total cash of \$84,604 and our debt totaled \$25,844.

In July, we donated \$120 from the Share the Plate program to the Grayson County Shelter. Water and waste bill was \$159. Electric, gas and Cable One were paid in August.

DEFYING THE NAZIS: THE SHARPS' WAR

A NEW FILM BY KEN BURNS AND ARTEMIS **JOUKOWSKY**

DEFYING THE NAZIS: THE SHARPS' WAR, a new documentary co-directed by Ken Burns and Artemis Joukowsky about a little-known but important mission by an American minister and his wife to rescue refugees and dissidents in Europe before and after the start of World War II, will air on September 20 at 8 PM on both KERA and OETA.



DEFYING THE NAZIS is cinematically told through the letters and journals of the Sharps, with Tom Hanks as the voice of Waitstill and Marina Goldman as the voice of Martha. It features firsthand interviews with the now adult children whom the Sharps saved, as well as leading historians, authors and Holocaust scholars, including William Schulz, Deborah Dwork, Modecai Paldiel, Ghanda DiFiglia and Yehuda Bauer.

The Rev. Waitstill Sharp and his wife Martha answered a call from the American Unitarian Association asking if they would travel to Czechoslovakia to help provide relief to people trying to escape Nazi persecution. They were invited to take part in "the first intervention against evil by the denomination to be started immediately overseas. "The mission would involve secretly helping Jews, refugees and dissidents to escape the expanding Nazi threat in Europe. If they were discovered, they would face imprisonment, probable torture and death. Seventeen other members of the church had declined. With two young children at home, the Sharps accepted. They expected to be gone for several months.

Instead, their mission would last almost two years.

"The Sharps' early grasp of the true nature of the Nazi threat and their willingness to leave the safety of America and take action to help endangered refugees was a rare act at a time of widespread indifference," said Sara J. Bloomfield, director, United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. "Their courage and sacrifice should inspire us to reflect deeply on our own responsibilities in a world that also faces many challenges."

"The Sharps' story is inspiring modern day faith leaders to action. Unitarian Universalists are partnering with Jews, Christians and Muslims to carry on the Sharps' legacy by standing up against religious bigotry, Islamophobia and indifference in the face of today's refugee crises. Hundreds of actions are being planned for the book and film's release across the country through the Defying the Nazis UU Action Project. The Unitarian Universalist Association, Unitarian Universalist Service Committee and Meadville Lombard Theological School are encouraging all UUs and multi-faith partners to honor the Sharps by working to advance the values for which they sacrificed," said UUSC President Rev. Dr. William F. Schulz. "The Sharps answered the call of their faith, risking their life to save others. Their selfless dedication to a more just world is an example for Unitarian Universalists and all who care about human rights."

NOTE: Red River screened the first version of this movie on Sunday, January 9, 2013 in a special Sunday extended service. The working title was "Two Who Dared, The Waitstill and Martha Sharp Story."
