## From Resolve to Results

Among our current Annual Congregational Goals is this:

Sharing our Good News: Schedule three "Bring-A-Friend-To-Church" [now being called "Friendship"] Sundays where the entire congregation strives to identify people they know who would appreciate learning about us and designing worship experiences geared at introducing ourselves to our friends

No one voted <u>against</u> this goal, so we're all 'on board' about this outreach project. Our first Friendship Sunday is January 22 with Rev. Annie Foerster speaking. Last October, our collective resolve was easy to sanction. Now, months later, we're about to have the rubber meet the road. - Nearly all visitors show up because someone invited them.

However, the average Unitarian Universalist only invites a person to church once every 26 years! It begs the question: Why are we hesitant to invite someone to church?

# Treasurer's Report

In the month of October, we had income of \$3,827.84 from general operations.

After operations expense of \$2,090, we had a net profit of \$1,737.84.

As of October 31, we had \$2911.86 available in checking.

In October, we donated \$91.00 from the Share the Plate program to the Texoma Earth Day Festival.

Expenses include building insurance of \$210, UUA donation of \$118.75, water and waste bill of \$199.58, and electric bill of \$165.97.

(We need to have enough table space prepared for the various dishes in each category: Appetizer, Main Course, or Dessert.) Also, does anyone want to volunteer to prepare the third-floor and second-floor spaces we'll use? The Chapel will already be decorated for the holiday season.

As part of the festivities, we'll have a gag-gift exchange (items \$1 or less). So when you arrive, please place your gift under the tree in the Chapel and climb the stairs for the Appetizer course. Let's Feast!
