# A Call to Faith in Turbulent Times

a 4 part small group experience

Many Unitarian Universalists and other people of faith feel challenged by this moment in our nation's history. The actions of political leaders are raising large moral questions. Many of us feel compelled to explore what our faith commitments and values require of us. Information is coming from every direction.

We have learned that it is crucial to stay informed, yet not all sources are reliable. Others ask us to contact legislators, attend meetings, join in protests, engage in political conversations with friends and acquaintances, and take public action, sometimes for the first time ever.

Many turn to our congregations and faith communities for help to clarify how our values call us to respond and to strengthen us to act.

Since the November election, have you encountered difficult conversations within our church community? Do you carry extra tension around current events? In today's political environment, the actions of our leaders and the tone of public discourse have led many UUs to reexamine longheld values and long-standing relationships.

Many seek solid ground in our faith communities, wishing to reconnect in covenant. To this end, the UUA is offering a new small group ministry resource, in four 90 minute sessions.

The sessions are designed to help nurture, support, and strengthen UU to respond to this moment and its significant challenges.

Each session offers a different lens for a group to examine together the call of our faith and our moral and ethical commitments at this extraordinary moment:

- Call to Vision
- Call to Love
- Call to Imagination
- Call to Relationship in Action

They were written by the Rev. Marta Valentín and use a standard "small group ministry" format, known as an effective tool for people to engage in deep discernment rather than in debate.

A Call to Faith in Turbulent Times will meet on 4 consecutive Wednesday evenings (May 10, 17, 24, 31) at church from 6:15 - 7:45 PM, so people can drive home before dark.

You do not need to register. Just come.

While it would be more useful for participants to attend all sessions, drop in participation is fine.

# Spring Congregational Meeting ~ Sunday, May 21

The Spring Meeting is the time we will have an open dialogue about several issues which people have asked the board to include on the agenda. We will also elect new church leadership and we will vote on a budget for the new fiscal year. It is an important meeting.

Issues which will come before the membership for consideration include

- Should Red River UU become a Reproductive Justice Congregation (as outlined in the Feb. 2017 newsletter)?
- Should Red River UU continue to lock the building during the Morning Assembly?
- Should Red River UU begin the Welcoming Congregation Program (as outlined in the Feb. 2017 newsletter)?
- Discussion regarding establishing (again) a **Caring Team**
- Discussion regarding moving beyond the partisan divide within the congregation
- Discussion and vote on distribution of the Share The Plate donations for 2017-2018
- Discussion and voting on Congregation's Goals for the 2017-2018 church year
- Discussion and voting on the Proposed 2017-2018 Budget
- Nominations (if any) and election of church leadership

The meeting starts at 12:35 PM in the chapel with a finger food potluck, to which everyone is invited to bring a dish to share.

All members will receive a meeting packet on Monday, May 7 as required by our bylaws. Everyone who wishes can download the packet from the church App or via the church web site.

Members unable to attend the meeting will be able to vote online, or they can download a paper proxy ballot. Details about voting will be in the Meeting Packet which will be emailed on Monday, May 7th.

Friends of the congregation are warmly invited to attend the meeting as well and can participate in the discussions. However, only members may vote.

### Earth Day ~ a Great Success

The good news about the weather was it did not rain! Yes, it was cold and very windy whish is probably the main reason the attendance was, at best, sparse. However, for the 700 or so people who did attend, it was a great success. Even the vendors, whose sales were dismal, agreed it was the weather and hope to return again next year. Thanks to the 19 folks from church who volunteered to make the day the success it was. Texoma Earth Day Festival is out largest outreach project. We can be proud that Red River UU is the reason Earth Day is in Texoma. Well done, everyone!

### Treasurer's Report

In the month of March, we had income from general operations of \$3,569.

After operations expense of \$1,906, we had a net income from operations of \$1,663.

Operations expense include water and waste of \$93, gas bill \$66, electric bill \$128, UUA donation of \$118, internet \$68 and building insurance \$196.

In January, we received a \$3,000 grant from NTUUC for a/v improvements and community outreach. From the grant, we purchased the church app at a cost of \$240, an additional microphone at a cost of \$1,965 and Earth Day fliers \$116, leaving a balance of \$679.

The Small Congregation Conference was held in March. There are receipts still outstanding, therefore a financial accounting is unavailable at this time.

In March, we donated \$167 from the Share the Plate program to the Grayson County Shelter.

As of March 31st, we had \$7,488 available in checking. Kelly Cofield, Treasurer

#### Happening Around the Cluster

Arlington UU - Received a grant from NTUUC for a face uplift in their church. They are starting their work on the sanctuary and coffee room.

Community UU - Finishing welcoming congregation program and expect to have congregational approval at the next congregational meeting. Film about transgender youth on May 13 from 10-12 they are showing a Katie Couric documentary which explains transgender identities in compelling detail. Details here.

Denton UU - Annual meeting in three Sundays and new officers will be elected and Pam Watt will be at Horizon UU on May 21, 2017

First UU Dallas - First Church is proceeding with a capitol drive to pay off debts from repairs forced buy the city. Their goal is to raise 10 million and they have a good start on reaching that goal. Also on May 20, 2017 they are hosting a seminar from 8:30 to 3:30 on End of Life Wishes.

First Jefferson UU - Doing landscaping to spruce up outside and allow signs to show is the current project.

Horizon UU - Teach-in about white supremacy will be occurring this Sunday in RE and soon in the pulpit.

Oak Cliff UU - received a grant to install outside lights in their back parking lot that are solar and self-contained. After working through code division they are finally getting permission to install them

Pathways UU - Structure and space is ever evolving challenge for Pathways. The rent is going up on the building and the air conditioning system isn't working correctly. A decision needs to be made between accepting the current limitations of their building or finding a new home. They have found a new real estate agent who specialized in church relo-

Tyler UU - Allison Stovall's Celebration of Life is May 11 at 11:00 am in Tyler for anyone who would like to attend. Tyler just started a second adult study group facilitated by a member and attendance is good.

Westside UU - April 30, 2017 was the installation for Rev. Shari L. Woodbury as their new minister. Westside found a choir director they can hire for special events so there were about 50 people in the choir for the installation.

## Transylvania Pilgrimage –Summer 2016

From the editor:

While I do not know this young person, I do know that the First Parish in Bedford MA has for years been in the Partner Church program that their church with the Unitarian church in Abásfalva, Romania. (Population 300.) I enjoyed the story and felt others may enjoy it as well. DMS

Do you remember all the baked potatoes you bought at coffee hour last year? I was one of the recipients of your generous donations, and we used those potato proceeds to fund my pilgrimage to Transylvania in August of 2016. I left from Logan Airport with ten UU youth from a congregation in Maine and four from Seattle, our ages ranging from 14 to 19. Our mission was to spend a couple days in Kolozsvar, the second largest city in Romania, before meeting up with around 20 Hungarian vouth and beginning our international youth camp, where we would travel together to churches, villages, and historical sites, while learning about one another's religions and beliefs. After the camp, I travelled to our partner village of Abásfalva, and to Gyepes, the nearby partner village of the Yarmouth church.

I went on this trip to a place I've never been, with people I've never met, in a country with a language I've never spoken. With the combination of all of these factors, it was easy to feel alone, but I never did because of the many instances in which I was reminded of the community at First Parish that had sent me and supported me the entire time.

When the group went into the first Unitarian church in Kolozsvar--the first of seventeen churches that we visited during that trip--I was so excited to see the same style of embroidery that covers the hymnals in our church here in Bedford. I had grown up knowing that the hymnal covers were made in Transylvania, and there I was, sitting in a church where entire pews were covered in the embroidered fabric. It was really cool to realize that our church shares this aspect of Transylvanian culture with other churches from the birthplace of our religion.

After leaving Kolozsvar, we joined up with the Hungarian youth and began our tour around the country. We went to a Hungarian folk festival, hiked the citadel where the Unitarian preacher Francis David was im-

prisoned for his beliefs, slept in fortresses surrounded by the beautiful green hills of the Transylvanian countryside, and helped to rebuild a cemetery and re-tile a roof. On our way to Deva, an important pilgrimage site, we visited a small village with a large misty mountain. Here, we all gathered in a beautiful church where one of our trip leaders suggested we sing hymn: "Spirit of Life." I've heard this hymn time and time again in the walls of this church, and there I was, singing it halfway around the world with people from other states and countries. This song, like many others that I got to sing with the Hungarian youth, is one that unites UUs across borders.

Of course, the time I felt closest to the community we have here was when I was able to visit our partner village of Abásfalva. This was a place that I had always heard of in sermons, and seen pictures of on the walls and bulletin boards here, but I never thought that I would be able to visit it myself. I left the youth camp for a couple of days and embarked on a new ad-venture, joining the adult travelers from First Parish for the winter chapel dedication in our partner village. It was truly one of the highlights of my trip to see and learn about the beautiful village, as well as experience the incredible kindness and generosity of the villagers, who welcomed me into their homes with open arms. It was amazing to learn about village life there. I didn't know that "when the cows come home" was a real thing until I saw dozens of cows walking themselves down from the mountain in a herd, each to his own home. When the plaque in the winter chapel was unveiled, revealing the names of all the members of our congregation who had donated to help fund its construction, I could really see how closely connected our congregations are, even though we are separated by thousands of miles.

As I began college this fall, I was once again in an unfamiliar place, surrounded by unfamiliar people, but thanks to this incredible experience, I was not only prepared to face this challenge, but I am able to still find many things in my new city to remind me of the welcoming, supportive community here at First Parish.
