Fall Meeting Stuff

Declaring a quorum (24 present), V.P Linda Tracy guided us through the agenda well. Here are **some** highlights:

- Marla Loturco reviewed the results of the recent Sunday Mornings at Red River and reported that 37 people completed the survey. The entire report is available on the church app, eNews, web site and here. Reading the various individual comments lets people see that we, overwhelming, like our church.
 - o 89% of us are comfortable watching video sermons
 - o 70% are willing to bring refreshments and clean up afterwards
 - o 43% would be interested in having a weekly 'Open Dialogue' after the service
 - o 'The Morning Program' was the preferred name for the weekly bulletin
- Those present overwhelmingly felt strongly that we need to continue keeping the doors unlocked Sunday mornings and agreed it would be important for us to have another Emergency Response Team training for all interested
- A good discussion about ways that we might make the building more accessible for people with disabilities concluded with the membership telling the Board of Trustees that making our goal here is "Access For All" and not just some areas.
- People indicated that a change in how refreshments are handled is indicated and a solution was suggested (details elsewhere in this newsletter)
- Doug Strong gave a brief explanation of the history and importance of the Freedom of the Pulpit and Freedom of the Pew
- The four current goals were discussed with two of them accomplished already, the other two are in process

Red River Grassroots Zen

In the book Buddhist Voices in Unitarian Universalism the UU Buddhist Jeff Wilson, who is also a

scholar in religious and East Asian studies, argues that most, if not all Modern American Zen Buddhism has been deeply influenced by Unitarian Universalism. While Christian Missionaries were forbidden and even punished in Japan in the 19th century, the UU's were invited there. It is not well-known that the UU movement has had a complex interrelationship with and at times even entwinement with Zen and other forms of Buddhism for centuries. The UU movement in turn has been increasingly influenced by Buddhism, especially Zen Buddhism as can be seen by the popularity of groups such as, for example, the UU Buddhist Fellowship and well as many others.

Zazen and kinhin meditation (sitting and walking), the main practices of the Zen tradition are practices that surpass words, letters and concepts. They are ways to make the pure experience of the dynamic reality of the present moment into a transforming practice based on the dual cultivation of calm abiding and clear seeing. We will train in what to do with your body, breath and mind in meditation.

In contemporary America the word "Zen" had been used and abused to mean almost anything; a socio/cultural habit that tends to eviscerate its depth of meaning and turns it into yet another stereotype, commodity or personality trait.

"Grassroots Zen" implies an influence by a practice group in Rhode Island and the book written about them entitled *Grassroots Zen* by Manfred Steger and Perle Besserman © 2001. The book is about structuring a non-patriarchal, non-hierarchal form of Zen while keeping the practice as traditional as possible. It is like the protestant reformation of Zen and is based on the reputed final words of Siddhartha Gautama, commonly known as the Buddha, to "Be lamps unto yourselves, seek your own salvation with diligence."

If you have an interest in Zen as a topic, a practice or both, please come and practice sitting and walking meditation with us for 40 minutes followed by discussion centered on discovering what Zen really means as it evolves into a drastically changing, globalized world characterized by what some have called "the long emergency."

Topics; What is meditation? How do you do *Zazen* and why? What is Zen? Buddhist history, Zen History, Engaged Buddhism, Critical Buddhism, Grassroots Zen, Social/environmental Justice.

In the month of September, we had total receipts of \$2,599.00 from pledges and weekly offerings.

Total disbursements were \$1,775.21, including \$265 contributed to the Grayson County Shelter for September's Share the Plate collections, leaving net income for the month of September of \$849.29.
