Hope and Keep Busy: Literature, Faith and Social Justice in Dark Times*

"Hope and keep busy" is a line taken from the classic novel *Little Women* by Louisa May Alcott. Placed in the context of Alcott's life and her Unitarian family's dedication to the abolitionist movement, these words take on a power that can inspire those of us concerned with social justice issues in the present day. This presentation will provide an overview of nineteenth-century American women writers who used the power of the written word to advance the women's and abolitionist movements. Many of these writers were activists who were compelled to action through their religious commitments. Authors discussed will include Louisa May Alcott, Angelina Grimke, Harriet Beecher Stowe, and Harriet Jacobs.

*Note: 'Dark Times' is not a reference to 2017, but the 19th Century.

Greetings to all-I hope everyone survived what I call "Turkey Trauma Day." Thanksgiving is my favourite American holiday (it wasn't such a big deal in

Canada....) because it doesn't involve presents!

The Board has been busy with several issues I would like to share with you. The Board met on November 19th with several guests to discuss plans to increase the safety of our members during our worship time. At this meeting, emails from several members were presented, along with the comments of all who attended. In light of the recent tragedy in another church in Texas, the Board has decided to reinstitute the 'locked door policy' for now. Many of us have expressed the view that they don't like the idea of a locked door, but it seems an acceptable price to pay if it makes some of us feel more secure. We started locking the doors on November 26th.

Once we are assembled, the front and back doors will be locked, and will be monitored by the Board rep on duty that Sunday. We do have monitoring set up so that we can let in latecomers and welcome them appropriately.

Emergency Response Training



As noted in Helen's column above, the board has become more proactive in finding ways we can feel more safe while at church.

Part of the approach was to invite Robert Shelton to give

a reprise of the training class he gave in February 2016 on how to deal with agitated individuals who pose a threat to our congregation.

This training will help in confronting a situation, if one ever arises. He has extensive training in deescalating a potential crisis and, if this fails, the next steps to be taken.

While we're learning about emergency responses, Helen will give a tutorial on 2 step CPR and how to use the new cardiac defibrillator. The training will be on Sunday, Dec 10 at 12:45

We also will be taking steps to shore up the security of the back door. Robert Shelton will do a reprise of his presentation on interacting with an angry intruder after service on December 10th as well. Please don't hesitate to come to any member of the Board if you have questions.

Right now, we are in the process of developing a security plan and looking into some training that is offered through our insurance and the local police department, as well as investigating what some other churches do.

On a brighter note, we are making progress in our search for solutions to make the second floor more accessible. We are looking at a wheelchair lift right now, and options for funding. I think this will be "phase 1" of the endeavor-right now a lift is affordable. If you are interested in looking at what the lift would look like, please talk to Jim Holmes for more information. In the future we hope to consider options that would lead to an elevator.

I have purchased a defibrillator for our use, and on December 10th, after the service and fellowship time, I will present a tutorial on '2 step CPR' and 'how to use the AED.' The new guidelines are surprisingly easy, as is the AED. I hope you will join me.

I.C.E. for your safety!

Got your cell phone handy? Take a moment right now to put "ICE" by the names of the people you'd want called in case of emergency.

That's what "ICE" stands for -- "in case of emergency."

The point is to let rescue workers, police, or doctors check your cell phone and reach the people you would want contacted if you're in an accident or other emergency.

Most people don't have ICE on their cell phones, but all first responders check phones to see who to call.

When we first moved into our building a group decided we needed a hospitality committee. It formed with the name "Good Times Team". Its goal (from our Policy and Procedures Manual) was:

The goal of the Hospitality Team is to provide a welcoming atmosphere before Adult Forum and after the worship service and to encourage a feeling of camaraderie among members and visitors. The Hospitality Team achieves its goal by recruiting and supporting members and friends to provide:

- Beverages and simple snacks before Adult Forum and following the worship service.
- Beverages and food for occasional church-related special events as agreed upon between Hospitality Team and Board
- This Team works closely with Membership, Chalice Circles, and Worship.

The Good Times Team was amazing, hard-working and achieved their goals - much to the joy of the congregation. Time passed, burnout trumped enthusiasm and after several years, the team turned in their smocks (which are hanging behind the kitchen door).

That's when the congregation voted to institute an all-church invitation for refreshments - dividing ourselves by last name. This quasi universal draft has been equally successful. But again burnout trumped enthusiasm.

The "Sunday Mornings At Red River" survey indicated that many people were willing to continue bringing refreshments and at the Fall Congregational Meeting, 20 people volunteered to provide snacks.

The New Good Times Team's goal is not as expansive at the original team. Each week one team will provide refreshments and clean up after the service. They are not responsible for providing beverages before the Adult Forum, but will do clean up following their assigned week. The Good Time Teams are:

Symbolism of Yule: Introspect, Planning for the Future.

Symbols of Yule: Yule log, evergreen boughs or wreaths, holly, baskets of clove studded fruit,

Herbs of Yule: Bayberry, blessed thistle, evergreen,

frankincense holly, laurel, mistletoe

Foods of Yule: Cookies, fruits, nuts, pork dishes,

turkey, eggnog, ginger tea, spiced cider,

Incense of Yule: Pine, cedar, bayberry, cinnamon. **Colors of Yule:** Red, green, gold, white, silver, yellow, orange.

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Stones of Yule: Rubies, bloodstones, garnets, emeralds, diamonds.

Church App Update



The church app, available at the Apps Store and Google Play, has undergone a face lift because it is now hosted by a new company, AppInstitute. (It seems apps get sold, like mortgages.) The new company offers far more options for us, including multiple video clips (currently there are 5 on the app); more tabs for more content; you can now send a message to

the church via the app; more images in the gallery; along with an easier way to update each tab.

One major drawback of the new app, however: **The only way get updates is to close and reopen it.** If you have been leaving the app open in the background on your device, stop doing that. Close it instead. The next time you open it, all updates will happen automatically.

Soon there will be a sign in option, which will allow the church to send individual messages (perhaps to all members, or visitors, or various committees or teams, etc.) rather than having messages go to everyone's devices (currently that's 168 devices).

How do you like it? Give suggestions and reports about things are aren't working. Just touch the Message tab and sent your feedback.

Church Directory ~ needs you

Everyone listed in the current directory, along with new members and active friends received a personalized email "*The New Church Directory Needs You*" on Nov. 21st asking to make changes, then reply. About 55% have yet to reply.

If you haven't done so, look for the email, check to see if the information we have in the church database is accurate; make changes and corrections as needed and reply. Even if there are no changes, please reply and say so. It would be nice to have the new directory finished this month.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of October, we had total receipts of \$4,458.40 from pledges and weekly offerings. The Share the Plate offering was \$48.

Total disbursements were \$2775.78, leaving net income for the month of October of \$1,682.62.

As of October 31, we had \$21,498.97 available in checking, a total of \$41,822.39 in savings and a total of \$14,549.47 in Certificates of Deposit.

Crises ~ a personal reflection

From the UUA Southern Region

We in the UUA Southern Region are not strangers to violence and disruptions in our churches. This weekend's massacre at the First Baptist Church of Sutherland Springs, Texas, reminds many of us of that Sunday in July 2008 when the UU Church of Knoxville was visited by an(other) angry white man with a gun, leaving two people dead and six more wounded. Rob Spirko was in the congregation that day. He offered this post on Facebook in response to the latest mass shooting:

"We are in crisis. A crisis of gun culture? Sure. But below that, a crisis of masculinity. A crisis of pain. This country, as it is, breaks people.

And gives them no way to gather the pieces. And men try to weld the pieces back together with rage. It only buys them a little time, and they know it. Eventually, when it melts, it looks like a pool of blood on the floor of a church. Some if us know that's not a metaphor, not really.

The roots go deep. One of them: if we want to address this crisis, we should address child and spousal abuse. That's what the latest shooter had been court martialed for, I hear. Was he abused himself? Or had he just absorbed too much toxicity? Whatever the cause, we need to get better at breaking the cycle of abuse, for both victim and abuser. At the very least, if we could see to it that a man who was driven out of the military for abusing his spouse could not so easily buy killing weapons, that would be useful, too.

I have written elsewhere that the 2008 TVUUC shooting was a canary in the coal mine. The toxicity has long been with us, but the level seems to be rising. In ancient Greek, krisis could mean "a moment of judgment." It could also be the turning point of a play, where the action changes. In medical terms, it's the moment when the patient's fever breaks. We have seemingly been in a crisis for a long time, and yet the fever seems unabated. We have not turned; we have not changed. We are, however, being judged.

Thoughts and prayers are not enough. In Texas, they were praying as they died. What will we do--what will *you* do--to break this cycle of rage and pain?"

Thank you for posing this critical question, Rob. For some powerful insights and suggestions, we suggest this recent article in the York Times. As Unitarian Universalist congregations, we affirm and promote "justice, equity and compassion in human relations" and the "goal of world community, with peace, liberty, and justice for all". Each day is a chance to make our values real, even somber days like these. Let us challenge ourselves and encourage each other as we journey on.
