Congrat's Marilyn




The Marty Robinson Volunteer Award is given each year to lay members of various UU congregations within NTUUC. This year we nominated Marilyn Alexander for her long-standing

Treasurer's Report

In the month of January, we had total receipts of \$13,647.99, which included the \$10,000.00 contribution, to be used at the Board's discretion, which was mentioned in last month's report as having been received on the first Sunday of January.

Total disbursements in January were \$1,589.39, including \$139.01 Share the Plate donation to the Grayson County Shelter, leaving net income for the month of January of \$12,058.60.

As of January 31, we had \$19,157.32 available in checking, a total of \$61,838.20 in savings and a total of \$14,549.47 in Certificates of Deposit. These balances reflect the transfer of \$20,000.00 which I made during the month of January from checking into the savings account.

I wish to report good news and bad news: The bad news is that last month's report mentioned a \$4,000 contribution made in December which I stated, erroneously, was to be used for the proposed elevator/lift. However, the note accompanying the contribution states that the money "... is specifically for repairs and maintenance to the building and grounds." The good news is that NTUUC awarded us a grant in February for the new elevator in the amount of \$7,410!

All bank accounts have been reconciled with no exceptions noted.

NTUUC ~ Update from our rep

Important discussion points from the February 3rd meeting that are important for our church include:

SPECIAL ANTI-RACISM WORKSHOP

"Being an Ally for Social Justice: Multiracial Democracy and Economic Justice for All" The workshop is a multi-day event to be held on April 13-15 at Horizon UU church.



The workshop leader is Chris Crass. He is a social justice educator who writes and speaks widely on courage for racial justice, feminism for men, lessons from past movements, and creating healthy culture and leadership for progressive activism. He works with community

groups, schools and faith communities to develop leadership and momentum for social justice action. He was a founder of the anti-racist movement building center, the Catalyst Project, helped launch the national white anti-racist network, SURJ (Showing Up For Racial Justice).

Rooted in his Unitarian Universalist faith, he works with congregations, seminaries, and religious activists to build the Spiritual Left. He is also the author of Towards Collective Liberation: Anti-Racist Organizing, Feminist Praxis, and Movement Building Strategy and Towards the "Other America": Anti-Racist Resources for White People Taking Action for Black Lives Matter. You can learn more about his work at www.chriscrass.org.

With racist hate, fear and violence on the rise, this is an interactive workshop that uses storytelling, lessons and insights from social justice efforts historically and today, to help us be more effective in our work to dismantle white supremacy and build beloved community in our congregations and in our work for multiracial democracy and economic justice for all in our communities and country. The schedule:

- Friday April 13 7:00 9:00 pm Community building and sharing our stories of what brings us to doing justice work.
- Saturday April 14 9:00 am 5:00 pm Focus on building up a culture of inspiration to counter despair, we will draw out lessons and insights from past and current anti-racist work and look at both anti-racist work in majority white communities and ways white people can show up as allies to join with people of color to dismantle white supremacy and build up racial justice.
- Sunday April 15 10:30 Worship Service "Renewal And Revival For Collective Liberation." Everyone is welcome (at no charge) to hear Chris Crass speak.

Workshop registration is \$50 and includes lunch. There is a \$5 discount on the registration fee until Sunday, April 8th. Registration closes Wednesday, April 11th at midnight. Limited Registration Assistance is available through NTUUC. Volunteers may have registration waived. More information and registration here.

Social Action Update ~

Our congregation has shown a consistent interest in social action. In February we participated in <u>The Promise and the Practice</u> of our Faith for Black Unitarian Universalism as a continuation of our denomination's discussion on racism. We also hope to participate in the matching donation – if we get \$10.00 donations for every member that will happen.

We are encouraged to "Make a long-term commitment to dismantle white supremacy, racism, and oppression from within our denomination and beyond, and to uplift the Black Lives, Voices, and Leadership of Unitarian Universalism. This is our time to be Bold, Radical, and Transformational as we commit to nurture a radically inclusive, justice centered, multiracial and multigenerational religious faith!"

There are two one hour <u>webinars</u> offered which can be an introduction, or part of an on-going discipline of education.

In addition, I will continue to post on our Facebook page opportunities to sign petitions or to stay informed. I did get feedback that at least one person wasn't sure where to find the posts. If you go to our Facebook page you will see on the left side a list of options starting with "Home." At the end of that list is "Community" and if you click on it you will end up on the Community page which is where posts will appear.

As a reminder, we answered yes to the two Congregational Study/Action Issues (CSAIs). This means we choose to direct our attention to studying these issues at this time:

- 1] Racism is fundamental to U.S. social systems. White supremacy culture operates economically, institutionally, politically, and culturally, shaping everyone's chances to live healthy, fulfilling lives. It is also the nation's most toxic export, shaping policies and practices that do profound harm to the Earth and all living things.
- 2] Systemic injustices intersect across environment, race, gender and all other forms of oppression. Identifying the underlying mechanisms which enable systemic and intersecting injustices enables us to mitigate their harm. Intersectional justice calls us to work together across oppressions and become a movement of movements. I will focus on these and other UUA social justice posts on our Facebook page. I look forward to your feedback.
