Board Bits from the July meeting

The Board of Trustees met for the monthly meeting on August 19th in the chapel.

It was a lengthy but productive coming together.

L.D. Clark will be talking to folks regarding resurrecting a long-dead "music just for fun" component.

The building and grounds always occupy significant time, money and discussion. The major improvement in talks currently is the need for additional lighting in the chapel. Doug and L.D. will be working with Marilyn and Jim getting bids for materials and labor. Additional lighting will span the ceiling with special lighting over the piano and A/V desk.

Marla attended the meeting to give an update on NTUUC. Every year NTUUC awards grants to congregations for the financing of projects not funded in the budget. The congregation has until the end of November to prioritize our greatest need.

Doug was present giving an update on the upcoming Board retreat. The retreat will be held Sept. 8th and focus on training. The church By-Laws will be covered extensively to educate Board members on the laws that govern our church. The Policies and Procedures manual was established to provide guidelines for interacting with each other respectfully. This important church document is a vital training tool that will aid in our interactions being productive and not disruptive.

The date for the September Board meeting is TBA. The Board welcomes you to attend and discuss what's on your mind.

In the month of July, we had total receipts of \$3,564.00, and total expenses of \$3,540.32, including \$220.00, Share the Plate donation to the Grayson County Shelter, leaving an excess of receipts over expenditures for the month of July of \$23.68.

As of July 31, 2018, we had \$3,433.52 available in checking, a total of \$64,886.97 in all savings accounts and a total of \$14,572.71 in Certificates of Deposit.

Our Friday Night Flicks for September is Mudbound. We'll screen it on Friday, September 21st at 6 pm.

Set in the rural American South during World War II, Dee Rees' Mudbound is an epic story of two families pitted against one another by a ruthless social hierarchy, yet bound together by the shared farmland of the Mississippi Delta. Mudbound follows the McAllan family, newly transplanted from the quiet civility of Memphis and unprepared for the harsh demands of farming. Despite the grandiose dreams of Henry, his wife Laura struggles to keep the faith in her husband's losing venture. Meanwhile, Hap and Florence Jackson - sharecroppers who have worked the land for generations struggle bravely to build a small dream of their own despite the rigidly enforced social barriers they face. The war upends both families' plans as their returning loved ones, Jamie McAllan and Ronsel Jackson, forge a fast but uneasy friendship that challenges the brutal realities of the Jim Crow South in which they live. Runtime: 135 minutes.


