Jim's Jabber

On November 10th several of us from Red River went to the NTUUC meeting at First UU in Dallas. Thanks to Dick, Doug, Linn and Jack for attending. The meeting's purpose was for

NTUUC to get feedback from the different congregations in the organization as to what opportunities and changes NTUUC should adopt going forward. We broke into 6 discussion groups to get feedback in the areas of:

- Connect and Train UUs
- Grow and Spotlight/Market UU
- Social Justice
- Big UU Church Platform Sharing and Resources
- Common Endowment
- Serving People of Color

Nothing profound came from these discussion groups other than the need to have more meetings and to have them better organized. One thing I did learn is that NTUUC now has around \$3M in the endowment and spends around 5% annually for NTUUC administration (\$100k) and grants (\$60k).

I will pass on any new information as it becomes available from NTUUC.

We have had an unusual year of high dollar expenses hit us and all of these are outside our budget. The Board has (in the Bylaws) the ability to approve up to \$10,000 in non-budgeted expenses and we have used this to cover some these expenses. Some of the bigger expenses to hit us so far are:

- Sewer repair \$4500
- AC repairs and AC replacement \$4000? (still waiting on final bill). This was approved in the prior budget year and should be covered by a \$4000 donation made last December to the Facilities improvement budget.
- 1st floor bathroom repair and upgrade \$400 with thanks to David for his labor.

In addition, we are still facing future expenses for the following (approximant values):

 Repair of the brick fireplace and interior wall foundation in the basement. Bruce and I are looking into the best, most cost-effective way to do this. So far about \$100 in materials has been spent.

- Repair of the water damage from the roof leak; sheetrock repair and paint. Areas impacted are the main entry from the 1st floor landing all the way to the back door, stair wall going up to the 2nd floor, and the 2 bathrooms. \$3,000.
- Upgrade the 2nd floor to support a youth RE area and nursery. about \$8,000 in material and labor, the biggest being the repairs and upgrade of the back stairs to make them safe to use as an emergency exit.
- Improve lighting in the chapel (add more ceiling lights). \$1000.
- Possible purchase of an adjacent lot should it become available. \$6000.

We will be applying for 2 grants this year. One to cover the RE area improvement and the other to cover the repairs from the water damage and basement work. We should get one of them but not sure if we will get both. Also, the money for these grants will not be available until February 2019. Some of these fixes cannot wait that long so we are looking at creative ways to fund the work so that at least the emergency fix items are covered.

So that's it for now. I hope everyone has a great and safe holiday season.

TXUUJM ~ legislative day: Mar 20



Harvard Square Library is delighted to present our first eBook, which includes an account of the Universalist and Unitarian role in giving shape to the American Christmas celebrations we know today.


It also includes five classic Christmas stories by Unitarian authors, including Rev. Theodore Parker's own Christmas story.
