Hope everyone is having a Happy Holidays.

The two grants are submitted. Grant 1 is for the updates to the second floor and back stairs to turn it into a youth RE area with

a nursery. For this grant we are requesting \$5,530. Grant 2 is for repairs from the water damage caused by the roof leak and for repairs to the basement chimney structure and support walls. This grant is for \$4,320. Unfortunately, there have been over \$160,000 in grant requests submitted to NTUUC. I expect we will get one of our requests, but feel less certain about getting both.

We are already working on the basement repairs and have had a structural engineer review our progress and he is putting together recommendations on how to handle the more difficult areas. This is important to take care of even if we don't get the grant money covering these repairs.

We will also be starting on some of the work for the second floor soon. Unfortunately, we are in need of a RE Team and RE Director to make our new RE area successful. Today we only have Ellie and Angie (who do a great job) watching any children that show up. Anyone interested in working on the RE Team or applying for the RE Director position please contact Linn Cates or me. This is an important team going forward so we really need help in this area.

On December 8th we had a successful children's clothing swap even with the bad weather. For our first attempt 9 people showed up. Thanks to everyone who helped and a special thank you to Adrian who helped get this going and helped make it successful.

Congratulations Kelly!



As a way of acknowledging and appreciating the time and dedication volunteers and staff make in promoting Unitarian Universalism within the area, NTUUC created three special awards. One for ministry, one for Religious Education and one for Lay Volunteers.

The first awards were given in 2010. They are:

- The Marty Robinson Award Volunteerism
- The Robert Raible Award Ministry
- The Ruth Clark Award Religious Education

Red River UU is the *only* NTUUC congregation to receive the Marty Robinson Award every year. The 2019 Marty Robinson Award will be given to Kelly Cofield-Dyer in appreciation and recognition of her involvement on behalf of our congregation as well as promoting the cause of Unitarian Universalism throughout the area.

Kelly chairs the Caring Committee, helps provide snacks at coffee time, filled in as treasurer when no one else volunteered, has spoken in worship services, and helped lead a church workshop about bridging differences. Kelly lives UU's Seven Principles and has become an ambassador for the faith, often telling casual acquaintances about her church and inviting them to a service. By her example of treating all people with respect and generosity, she illustrates UU ideals to the wider community.

The board (less Kelly since she was the nominee) eagerly endorsed the suggestion from several people who felt Kelly was an excellent nominee. The nomination form goes into great detail of Kelly's involvement, dedication and enthusiasm. The 150-word summary reads:

Kelly Cofield-Dyer found Red River Unitarian Universalist Church four years ago as a "seeker on a journey," and is now a real ambassador for UUism. She lives the UU ideals, both inside and outside the church community, and also enthusiastically invites people unfamiliar with her chosen faith to experience it.

A Mid-Winter Surprise: Vellamo, in concert February 10th

The Worship Team received an invitation from Vellamo's leader, Pia Leinonen last fall asking if we might like to have this singing duo participate in a morning assembly. On their eighth visit to US their 9 week "Winter Trails 2019 – Tour" will take them all across the country from Florida to California through 8 states and over 20 concerts, including four Unitarian Universalist churches, beginning with Red River.

Save Sunday, Feb 10th and plan on being delighted by Pia's voice and Joni's guitar. As is our custom when having visiting performers, we suspend much of our morning liturgy in order to provide ample time for our guests to share their muic. They sent their press release by way of introducing themselves to us:

Vellamo is led by the performing and songwriting team of Pia Leinonen and Joni Tiala. Their music is

characterized by haunting melodies. Pia's ethereal lead vocals and Joni's virtuosic guitar stylings. In Finnish mythology, Vellamo is the goddess of the sea. Based in Kokkola, on the western coast of Finland, Vellamo combines the rich tradition of Finnish folksong with an appealing "retro" sensibility, creating a modern folk music experience.

Pia Leinonen, originally from the arctic region of Lapland, is Vellamo's lead singer. Her exquisite voice combines her love and vast knowledge of Finnish folk music with the western singer-songwriter tradition in a unique and beautiful way. Her moving and evocative

expression has been compared to other story-centric performer such as Joan Baez and Marlene Dietrich.

> Joni Tiala, originally from the Finnish port of Kokkola, began playing guitar at the age of 11. His eclectic musical background includes writing and performing for theater, progressive and alternative rock and Finnish and western folk. In addition to his work in Vellamo, Joni is an accomplished theater and session musician, and is founding member of the renowned Finnish progressive rock band, Moonwagon.

> In addition to shows in their homeland, Vellamo spends half of each year touring abroad; their adventures have led them throughout the United States, Europe and New Zeal




A Review from the Bennington VT Banner:

BENNINGTON - Finland may be half a world away from Bennington, give or take a mile or two, but Fin folk musicians are not only influenced by Americana but they can add a little different flavor to the coffeehouse blend.

Care for a taste? The Meetinghouse Café of the Bennington Unitarian Universalist Fellowship will be offering a little music from Finland this week, as the duo Vellamo will open for returning favorite Hungrytown - the musical and marital duo of Ken Anderson and Rebecca Hall on Friday, Sept. 14, with the music starting at 8 p.m.

"We really love British folk and music, there's something really mystical there for Finnish ears, it's very different than Finnish folk," Pia Leinonen, lead singer for Vellamo, said this week in an email interview. "There is lots of American influences in Finnish culture nowadays: we like American rock, folk, country and pop really a lot. So what we are trying to do is to blend nicely together all these influences and make it sound like Vel-

"Differences between American folk and Finnish folk - yeah, of course the lamo has been performing in Europe lyrics to begin with, maybe the song struc-

tures are a bit different, it's quite hard to in a pub where they were playing. We analyze how though," Leinonen said, when asked how Finnish folk music is different and the same as Americana. "Influences come from very melancholy Slavic music, cheerful Scandinavian dance music and poetic 5/4-time lyrical structures from Kalevala, our national folklore.

Leinonen, originally from the arctic region of Lapland, has had her moving and evocative stylings compared to those of other story-centric performers such as Joan Baez and Marlene Dietrich. Joni Tiala, originally from the Finnish port of Kokkola, began playing guitar at the age of 11. He is now a master of several stringed instruments. His eclectic musical background includes writing and performing for theater, progressive and alternative rock and Finnish and western folk. In addition to his work in Vellamo, Tiala is an accomplished theater and session musician, and is founding member of the renowned Finnish progressive rock band, Moonwagon.

The duo's trip to America is a perfect example of cross-cultural exchanges.

"We met Rebecca and Ken (of Hun-

started talking, saying that you guys should come to play in Finland someday," Leinonen said. "Few weeks later Rebecca contacted us and we started planning a little tour for Hungrytown in Finland. They came, and following year they came again, played lovely gigs and stayed with us. This time we started planning gigs together for Vellamo in U.S., and here we are. So yes, this is a very first time in U.S. for both of

Vellamo, according to the band's website, combines the rich tradition of Finnish folksong with an appealing "retro" sensibility (recalling the likes of Judy Collins or Richard and Mimi Fariña), creating an exotic and magical acoustic experience. Pia and Joni have even been known to sneak in a "Vellamo-ized" Jethro Tull ong now and then.

We need to make it "Good and Bad" and we are the Good.


We need to make it "Us and Them" and we are the Us.

We are very close to being ready to present our report to the congregation as to our completion of the requirements and finish the application process to become a Certified Welcoming Congregation for persons who identify as LGBTQ.

This club was the anchor of the LGBTQ community in Texoma. They were one of the first sponsors for the AIDS Resource Center of Texoma, ARCOT, which was changed to the Callie Clinic. Hosting classic events of the LGBTQ culture such as drag and talent shows plus just providing an atmosphere of belonging to a larger family, Good Times Lounge welcomed many of us into the open arms of our Family.

On a more positive note, our friend, Valerie Hefner, is organizing the first ever Texoma Gay PRIDE event! Scheduled to be at Pecan Grove Park on June 8th, the event has a board and is currently considering applying for nonprofit status. Saturday Afternoon Flicks

Here is a review by Geoffrey Macnab from *The Independent:*

Already a box office phenomenon, <u>Crazy</u> <u>Rich Asians</u> is an expertly crafted melodrama along Cinderella lines. Shamelessly kitsch but funny and affecting

enough to get away with its own excesses and many toe-curling moments, this trailblazing film has extra significance as one of the first mainstream Hollywood films to feature an all-Asian cast

Not that *Crazy Rich Asians* wants to lecture us or to spend too long exposing the hypocrisy of most of its protagonists. It's a glossy, escapist romcom, after all. The film may be set in Singapore but its characters and themes will be instantly recognizable to anyone who has attended a fractious family wedding anywhere.

We know exactly how the story will resolve itself, but the filmmakers still show wit and invention in the way they handle the cliches and take us toward the inevitable (and predictably very soppy) finale. Wu makes a likeable and resourceful heroine, one prepared to use game theory or talk about micro-loans in the developing world if it will help keep her relationship with Nick alive.

Like My Big Fat Greek Wedding, Crazy Rich Asians has come from nowhere and hit the box office bull'seye. Sequels are bound to follow – and will almost certainly be anticlimactic in the extreme. The original, though, is just as much fun as all the advance hype has suggested.
