This was done to make room for artwork that the Aesthetics Committee will be installing on the front walls of the chapel. This new artwork comes with a price (\$850) that is not in the current fiscal year budget, so during our assembly on the Oct 6<sup>th</sup> we will have a second offering to collect money to pay for the artwork.

### We Did It!



# Pro-Immigrant Group - Oct 1st



"Do not get lost in a sea of despair. Be hopeful, be optimistic. Our struggle is not the struggle of a day, a week, a month, or a year, it is the struggle of a lifetime. Never, ever be afraid to

make some noise and get in good trouble, necessary trouble." U.S. Congressman John Lewis

Are you horrified by images of children detained in cages on our border? Does it bother you that our government is separating families who take great risks to seek refuge here? Did the photo of the bodies of Óscar Alberto Martínez Ramírez and his 23-month-old daughter, Valeria, on the cover of our morning program disturb you? And does it anger you that our current asylum policy is in vio-

lation of U.S. and International Law? How would you like to have an opportunity to turn your anger into positive action? This opportunity embodies all 7 Unitarian Universalist principles. A group of us from Indivisible Sherman have decided we cannot be silent, we can't just stand by and watch while human rights are being violated in our name, and we must do something. We first met last month at Grace United Methodist Church. At our meeting, we discussed our goals and decided to begin by first learning as much as possible about current immigration issues. We are particularly interested in determining how we can help at the local level, learning about available resources with which we can join forces, and seeking information from experts on how we can be most effective in being agents of change.

We are meeting again here at Red River UU, on Tuesday, October first at 6:30 - 8 pm. Please join us in this fight for human rights. As Bill Holston reminded us from our pulpit on September 22<sup>nd</sup>, Immigrant Rights are Human Rights. As individuals we may not be able to accomplish a lot, but together, "We Shall Overcome!" - Jolene

### Our Common Read for Oct.

The membership committee has been exploring a new approach to membership, as outlined at last June's General Assembly in Spokane, WA. Marion Hill, membership committee chair, attended the workshop and brought the idea back home.

What follows is the concept endorsed by the membership committee and which will be discussed at the upcoming Fall Congregational Meeting on October 20<sup>th</sup>.

### **Pathways to Membership**

Joining Red River Unitarian Universalist Church does not require adherence to specific theological beliefs, but the congregation does expect members to be active in four areas of church and community involvement. The areas are listed below, along with examples (not an exhaustive list) of actions that would "qualify" under each category.

If you are considering joining but have questions about any of the four areas or your individual contribution in any, please contact any person on the Membership Team (<a href="membership@redriveruu.org">membership@redriveruu.org</a>). One of us will gladly guide you along the Pathway to Membership. Have you done any of these actions?

- 1. Participate in life of church
  - a. act as greeter
  - b. perform music, sing in choir, or act as AV tech, to assist with a worship service
  - c. pledge and donate money, serve on a committee/team/interest group, such as Good Times team (non-church members may serve on a team but not be team leader.)
  - d. join in an 'all-church event (potluck meal, work day, Appreciation Dinner)
- 2. Be theologically aware and accepting of diversity
  - a. Read about what UUs believe (see p. 2)
  - Learn the history of the congregation, the Unitarian Universalist Association, UU Service Committee and other UU organizations
  - c. Take a "New to UU" class or "Building Your Own Theology" class
  - d. Study any religion other than one you grew up in or practice currently

#### 3. Advocate for justice

- Partner with group working for justice, within church or outside (such as the church's Welcoming Congregation Committee)
- b. Advocate on an issue with an elected official (by phone, email, or in person)
- c. Attend a protest march, rally, or other community action event

#### 4. Preserve the environment

- a. Volunteer with Texoma Earth Day Festival (planning committee or at festival)
- b. Recycle and promote sustainability in your home and workplace, and at church
- c. Educate others about environmental issues

\*You join the church by signing the membership book in the presence of a member of the Board of Trustees and someone on the Membership Team (with whom you discuss your involvement in the four activity areas). Prior to your signing, complete the congregational information form and a Time & Talents Card, indicating your specific interests and abilities and how you will participate in church life.

To vote at a congregational meeting, you must have: (1) signed the membership book at least 30 days before the meeting; and (2) participated in church life (see activity #1 above) during the year prior to that meeting, in a way that can be documented. For example, if you donate money in a Sunday collection, the donation should be by check or in an envelope with your name on it.

#### Resources available

Many books related to Activity #2 are available in the lending library at Red River UU Church (in the glass-door cabinets in the Emerson Room, near the kitchen). When borrowing volumes from the lending library, please note your name and the date of borrowing on the card for that book in the box of cards on the bottom shelf of the cabinet. When you return a volume, please enter the date of return on the card for that book.

# Treasurer's Report

In the month of August, we had total receipts of \$2,996.50. Expenses for the month (which included our first quarterly Fair Share contribution of \$650.00 to UUA) totaled \$3,328.66, leaving an excess of expenditures over receipts for the month of August of \$332.16.

As of August 31, 2019, we had \$9,997.00 available in checking, a total of \$66,983.22 in all savings accounts and a total of \$14,645.47 in Certificates of Deposit.

Rebecca Stanczak, our new bookkeeper, and I have discussed the limitations of the Cloud version of Quickbooks which she is using on a free 90-day trial basis. We both feel that the limitations of this version of Quickbooks offset advantages we initially felt would be provided. We have agreed to terminate the trial (at no cost to RRUU) and move the accounting records back to a desk-top version of Quickbooks which will again give the reporting flexibility we desire and previously had.

She does have electronic access to our bank statements and, as expected, has resolved the previously reported minor unreconciled difference in our checking account. She and I will be working together to ensure the smooth transition back to a desktop version of Quickbooks and resolve any problems that may arise in this transition, though none are currently anticipated.
