We had a great Fall Congregational Meeting on October 20<sup>th</sup>. Twenty members attended and with the count of proxies and online voting we had an additional eighteen virtual members. Some highlights of this meeting were:

- Another great potluck meal preceded the meeting. Thanks to everyone who provided food!
- The new artwork was installed for all to enjoy. A big thanks to the Aesthetics Team for their selection.
- We reaffirmed our Behavioral Covenant.
- We accepted the Pathway to Membership proposal which has been inserted into the Policies and Procedures Manual.
- We approved the change to the Bylaws referencing the Pathway to Membership in the section on becoming a new member.
- We accepted the changes to the Statement of Conscience in the Policies and Procedures Manual.

• We reviewed 32 reports from our many committees and Teams on their activity over the last year.

During the Open Discussion someone suggested a name change for the Clara Barton Parlor. It was suggested using online voting for proposing this change. Because we have not used online voting for these types of matters before, the Board agreed to explore the suggestion. We will get back to everyone once we figure out an appropriate process.

One last thing worth mentioning on the meeting is the need for more volunteers. Some of key positions for Committees and Teams have no leadership and many could use more members. In my next Jim Jabber column, I'll identity these needs in more detail.

Much progress has been made on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor update projects. New flooring in the Arts & Crafts Room, the emergency exit from the second floor has had the plaster repaired, new lighting installed, and the back stairs soon will have skid-free coating. Once the walls are painted and a replacement exterior door installed it will be safe for emergency use.

# Indivisible Immigration Initiative

At the last meeting, which was Oct 1<sup>st</sup> in the chapel, we decided to name our group that came out of the Close the Camps activities in the **summer Indivisible Immigration Initiative**. Please join us on Nov. 12th at Grace United Methodist Church in Sherman at 6:30 for our third meeting. We will have a guest speaker who will talk to us about volunteering at courts on the border.

Two announcements from the meeting:

There now is a Congressional candidate to oppose John Ratcliffe. Russell Foster is a Sherman native and has a compelling biography.

Be sure to vote in the state constitutional amendment election. The group urges people to look carefully at Proposition 4. **Proposition 4 (HJR 38)** 

**Amendment as it will appear on the ballot:** "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual income tax, including a tax on an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income."

### What this means:

Prop. 4 is perhaps the most contradictory measure on the ballot, specifically because of the language used in the amendment. Presently, Texas does not impose a personal income tax. However, the Texas Constitution allows for the legislature to impose a tax on the incomes of natural persons if legislative requirements are met. Prop. 4 would eliminate this possibility by repealing the language that would authorize the legislature to impose the tax. However, the amendment uses the term "individual," and the Texas Constitution uses the term "natural persons". This disparity in language could potentially create a <u>corporate tax loophole</u>.

# Treasurer's Report

In the month of September, we had total receipts of \$2,765.50. Expenses for the month totaled \$3,010.05, leaving an excess of expenditures over receipts for the month of September of \$244.55.

As of September 30, 2019, we had \$9,752.45 available in checking, a total of \$66,983.22 in all savings accounts and a total of \$14,645.47 in Certificates of Deposit.

Rebecca Stanczak, our new bookkeeper, had the bank account reconciled prior to Oct. 6th and confirmed that, because of the limitations of the Cloud version of Quickbooks which she has been using on a free 90-day trial basis, she will, as we previously agreed, move the accounting records back to a desktop version of Quickbooks which will again give us the reporting flexibility we desire and previously had.

She and I will continue to work together to ensure a smooth transition back to a desktop version of Quickbooks and resolve any problems that may arise in this transition, though none are anticipated.

# Common Read for November

The Berlin Wall came crashing down Nov 9, 1989. Here's a memory of that moment, and a lesson to be learned. By Don Mathis, former church member, now living in San Antonio

When I was a GI in Germany in 1973, I was able to visit the other side of the Berlin Wall. In order to show the soldiers the importance of its mission in Europe, the U.S. Army took a select few on a tour into East Germany. I was among those fortunate enough to pass through Checkpoint Charlie – and back.

There was no graffiti on the Berlin Wall then. It was feared and respected on both sides. Crosses and flowers dotted every block or so to show where lovers of freedom had died.

Curtains from 1961, nothing more than rags in 1973, still showed through the mortar in many bricked-over windows. Occupants of homes and visitors to stores were ordered to exit through the back door – and the fronts of buildings and churches became part of the wall.

Vestiges of the original Iron Curtain were still evident on my visit. A mixture of broken glass and cement topped many walls. Newer sections were capped by large pipes, impervious to grappling hooks, too large for a human grip.

The Brandenburg Gate was a mockery of its former glory. This barrier to traffic, to freedom, was a blockage in the artery of life.

And how many remember the spirit captured in the photo of a young East German soldier, taking his leap to liberty? His jump is now immortalized in a steel sculpture.

I watched TV with the world on Nov. 9, 1989, and cheered and cried with joy at the fall of the Berlin Wall. The echoes of that celebration 30 years ago still linger.

And now, in America, there are plans to build a wall in Texas. I'm crying again – but it is not tears of joy.

Our country needs to learn the futility of walls. It did not work for the German Democratic Republic, and it will not work for America.
