Since this monthly newsletter comes so close to Thanksgiving, I have to say that I hope everyone had a happy Thanksgiving. For those who attended the Friday moveable feast of Thanksgiving leftovers at Red River I enjoyed the opportunity of overeating again.

The Giving Tree is in the upper lobby and waits for people to select an item to purchase for the church. Red River needs several items that are not part of our operating budget. Things like coffee, and toilet paper, gardening supplies and light bulbs, just to name a few. The list is on the table, along with a few simple instructions regarding how to purchase. Thanks, in advance, for participating. Last year we, collectively, purchased over \$500 worth of necessities, all items to keep our vital community happy.

The renovation of the second floor is nearing completion. New ceiling crown molding throughout all the room, new chandler in the F. Church Library, concealing the wiring for the security cameras in each room, new flooring in the Arts & Crafts room and new lighting on both the front and rear stairways. Take the hike (18 steps) to the second floor and check it out. You will be pleasantly surprised.

The rooms will soon be waiting for children. Ellie and Angie have faithfully been working with visiting children. We have several UUA curricula ready for use. The only thing missing is one adult to be the coordinator of our Religious Education program. We have three people who are willing to serve on the RE Team, but need a coordinator. The board is looking for someone to serve for a two-year period to help get the program going. Lacking a volunteer, it will not be able to establish an on-going program. If you want more information, please speak with me or any board member.

While speaking of volunteer needs - we have one more opening that is really important to fill, especially now during the multiple social action concerns facing the nation. We've heard of several during the last few months from various guest speakers on Sunday. A Social Justice coordinator would be a person committed to keeping the congregation informed, inviting people to participate by calling elected officials, writing letters, perhaps attending Indivisible Texoma events, etc. Studies indicate many newcomers are drawn to UU congregations because of our involvements in a wide range of social action opportunities. Again, if you want more information, please make my day/week/month by asking for more information.

For the last decade NTUUC (North Texas UU Congregations) has given grants to the 13 North Texas UU congregations. We've received many grants, but NTUUC has plans on stopping these annual grants. 2020 may be our last year to get a grant. The board voted to ask for funds to improve our ability to reach a broader audience by adding video streaming for our morning assemblies. Initially we will be able to steam to new monitors in the RE rooms on the second floor as well as in the Barton Parlor. Eventually the streaming services will also be on a Red River UU YouTube channel as well as on our LGBTQ+ and on the Church Facebook pages. This will require some technical upgrades and replacing our current security surveillance system (which is showing its age and having problems) with improved controlled cameras to allow people to monitor our RE rooms from smart phones. I'll have more about this as thing progress.



Several people requested more information after the December 17th morning assembly:

The 1619 Project is a program organized by *The*

New York Times in 2019 with the goal of re-examining the legacy of slavery in the United States and timed for the 400th anniversary of the arrival in America of the first enslaved people from West Africa. It is an interactive project by Nikole Hannah-Jones, a reporter for *The New York Times*, with contributions by the paper's writers, including essays, poems, short fiction, and a photo essay. Originally conceived of as a special issue for August 20, 2019, it was soon turned into a full-fledged project, including coverage in the newspaper and on its website.

The entire project can be accessed <u>here</u>. There are six 40-50 minute audio segments, each accessible independently. with transcriptions as well. A powerful, and important history to help dismantle white privilege.

Rise? Sit? Kneel?

"Why do we rise for somethings during our assembly, and sit for other things?" was the question put to the worship team recently. It led to a meaningful conversation and I was asked to pen a response. By way of review, our '*standard liturgy*' included 4 times to rise, in body or spirit: chalice lighting, spoken affirmation, benediction/parting thought and extinguishing the chalice. Yes, we did not include singing. We quickly agreed people sing better when standing. We do, however, on a regular basis we select songs and specifically ask people to remain seated.

We first asked when do people gathered for some function traditionally stand? People stand as the bride come down the aisle; when the queen/leader/president walks into the room; reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, or sing one's National Anthem. Western Christians stand to praise God, sit to learn and kneel to pray. Eastern Orthodox Christians stand throughout their worship, (made easier by the lack of pews or chairs). Standing is an act of respect. Standing says what is about to occur is important and special.

We rise to light the chalice and to say our Spoken Affirmation The simple action of standing, I feel, is an act that reminds me what we are about to do is to enter special time, By standing, we call ourselves to be mindful that this time is not mundane, but sacred. Standing for the Benediction, another long-standing religious tradition, serves as a way to prepare ourselves for leaving and when linked to reciting the same words every week to extinguish the chalice forms bookends for our assembly. For me, it serves to prepare me to return to the ordinary, everyday world.

The beauty of Unitarian Universalism resides within the heart of each of us. One's personal sense of what the holy entails is not beholden on anyone else. We avoid the stand during our assemblies, believing language that excludes tarnishes worship. We don't say, "Please stand," because some physically cannot, or struggle mightily to do so. Rather we invite people to stand or rise "in body or spirit." Those who find meaning and wish to do so, stand. Those for whom rising carries no significance remain seated.

On any given Sunday we have a loving balance during the four times we place an asterisk next to the liturgical term. And that is as it ought to be. In our free and responsible search for truth and meaning we care for ourselves as we wish. Rise? Sit? Kneel?

The worship team conclusion has been to offer inclusive options for people to make whatever decision feel most comforting to themselves.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of September, we had total receipts of \$2,765.50. Expenses for the month totaled \$3,010.05, leaving an excess of expenditures over receipts for the month of September of \$244.55.

As of September 30, 2019, we had \$9,752.45 available in checking, a total of \$66,983.22 in all savings accounts and a total of \$14,645.47 in Certificates of Deposit.

Rebecca Stanczyk, our new bookkeeper, had the bank account reconciled prior to Oct. 6th and confirmed that, because of the limitations of the Cloud version of Quickbooks which she has been using on a free 90-day trial basis, she will, as we previously agreed, move the accounting records back to a desktop version of Quickbooks which will again give us the reporting flexibility we desire and previously had.

She and I will continue to work together to ensure a smooth transition back to a desktop version of Quickbooks and resolve any problems that may arise in this transition, though none are anticipated.
