Committee on Ministry

This year the newsletter is going to highlight different committees, teams, and interest groups as a way for everyone to better understand the many aspects of sustaining our lay-led congregation. This month we focus on The Committee on Ministry, a 3-person team each elected to a 3-year term by the congregation.



The purpose of the Committee on Ministry (CoM) is to strengthen and support the congregational health of Red River UU Church by promoting effective ministries in all areas of Red River's mission. Working to uphold the philosophy of shared ministry, the Committee on Ministry seeks to affirm healthy relations between congregation members, between congregation and board as well as between a minister (should we call one) and the congregation.

In addition, if any individuals are experiencing an issue within the church that they do not seem to be able to resolve, you may bring it to the Committee. Please let one of the committee members know ahead of the meeting time. Committee members include Dan Althoff, Elbert Hill, and Marla Loturco.

The Committee has agreed to meet monthly on the

fourth Sunday at 12:45 in the chapel. We have reviewed the various areas of the church and made recommendations to the board.

The following statements are from the by-laws and the policies & procedures manual about the Committee on Ministry.

The committee on ministry will annually assess the effectiveness of the church's ministries and how well they hold to the congregation's values, goals and vision.

- Review all stated church goals/expectations related to ministry so that the committee can plan an effective annual assessment of the church ministries. This planned assessment will include co-ministry functions of the Board of Trustees, staff, committees, congregation and the services of the professional minister(s).
- Gather information from the congregation regarding its perception of the effectiveness of the church's ministries. Report the results of the above assessment to the Board of Trustees who will report as appropriate to others in the church.

The committee on ministry will facilitate communication leading to appropriate responsive actions between various parts of the church regarding concerns and wishes of friends, members, staff, committees, board, and professional ministers.

- The Committee will promote dialogue between groups representing various aspects of the congregation's ministry.
- The Committee will seek a commonality of goals and engender trust and mutual respect, always focusing on the positive potential rather than the negative.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of November, we had total receipts of \$2,823.50. Expenses for the month totaled \$3,694.88, which included \$1,176.69 of building maintenance/improvements and Share the Plate contribution of \$356.00, which left an excess of expenditures over receipts for the month of November of \$871.38.

As of November 30, 2019, we had \$6,504.84 available in checking, a total of \$66,983.22 in all savings accounts and a total of \$14,645.47 in Certificates of Deposit.

Rebecca Stanczak, our bookkeeper, and I have discussed upgrading the version of Quickbooks which I currently use to the same version she uses. The main reason for the upgrade is to facilitate the transfer the monthly financial statements she prepares, along with the bank recs and budget variance reports. The version of Quickbooks I am using (Desktop Pro 2017) does not allow me to open the reports she prepares and emails to me.

I recommend that we upgrade to the 2019 version that she is using and am prepared to make an inkind contribution of the Quickbooks Desktop Pro 2019 version which has a total cost of \$217.76.
