For those that missed the Sunday assembly on February 23rd, you missed a great presentation by James Smith. James and his wife Barbara bought our building in 1971 and created the Smith Memorial Chapel. In 1962 they added the chapel to the building and until they sold the house in 1996 they

lived on the second floor with their three children. James was the first American of Color to operate a funeral home in Grayson County.

OUR ANNUAL APPRECIATION DINNER was on February 27th. David Dyer was this year's awardee of the *Bruce Cameron Distinguished Service Award*. Congratulations, David - a well deserved recognition of the many things you've done to enhance our church (see below).

Also at the appreciation dinner we thanked everyone for what they do to support all the activities that Red River needs/does. I showed a series of slides on all the different committees, teams, and programs we do. The list is over 40 and I know I missed a few (my apologies). In addition, I sent out emails to many of the teams and committees asking from each an estimate on how many volunteer hours they put in during a

year. Adding all these numbers together as well as plugging in some estimates for emails I either didn't send out or those that did not respond, I got just over 5000 hours that we spend in volunteer time per year. If we paid \$10/hr for this time that's over \$50,000 which is more than our annual budget of \$44,479. This is a small church of just over 50 members and it takes a lot in money and volunteer hours to make us successful. Thank you everyone for making this happen and contributing to our success.

Planning for the April 18th Earth Day Festival is well underway. We are still looking for volunteers. We will also have a Red River booth at the festival and will need volunteers to help staff the booth for the day. See Amy, Marla or me if you are interested. This is a most visible outreach program that Red River sponsors and it is a golden opportunity to get the word out about who we are to the Texoma community.

The beginning of February we received a grant from NTUUC to help cover the cost of upgrading our security camera system and to add video streaming to our Sunday assemblies. I'm still getting some final quotes and refining the budget for this project and hope to start on it soon. I am looking for at least 2 people interested in becoming the video streaming techs so contact me if you are interested.

Forum Starts a New Series



In 1965, Rev. James Reeb was killed in Selma, Alabama. Reeb was a Unitarian Universalist minister, and activist during the Civil rights movement in Washington, D.C. and Boston, MA.. While participating in the Selma to Mont-

gomery marches actions in Selma, Alabama, in 1965, he was murdered by white segregationists, dying of head injuries in the hospital two days after being severely beaten.

Three men were tried for Reeb's murder, but no one was ever convicted. His murder remains unsolved.

Fifty years later, two journalists from Alabama return to the city where it happened, expose the lies that kept the murder from being solved and uncover a story about guilt and memory that says as much about America today as it does about the past.

NPR turned their story into a 7-part podcast that the Adult Forum began listening to on Feb 16th. Discussion follows each episode.

Treasurer's Report

In the month of January, we had total receipts of \$1,520.45. Expenses for the month totaled \$4,428.84, which included \$2,743.11 spent on building improvements and maintenance. The rear entrance and the top floor are now looking great! The result was an excess of expenditures over receipts for the month of January of \$2,908.39. It is worth noting that for the year to date (thru 1/31/2020) we have an excess of receipts over expenditures of \$15,254.36

As of January 31, 2020, we had \$6,935.94 available in checking, a total of \$66,983.22 in all savings accounts and a total of \$14,645.47 in Certificates of Deposit.

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


Heretic of the Week: Thomas Jefferson

In each week's issue of <u>The Catholic Herald</u> author Charles Coulombe writes a column called Heretic of the Week. His Heretics ~ Our Heroes!

Thomas Jefferson (1743-1826) is a world-renowned figure. Founding Father, author of the Declaration of Independence, ambassador, first secretary of state,

third president of the United States, founder of the University of Virginia, inventor, farmer – the list goes on. To this day, his Virginia plantation, Monticello, is a shrine of sorts. But what is less well known (and our current interest) are the religious beliefs of the famed statesman.



On one level, Jefferson was a conventional Anglican/Episcopalian, as was expected in the planter class into which he was born. Baptised, married, and buried with Anglican rites, he never belonged to any other denomination, and was a vestryman of his home parish. He was a regular worshipper at churches of that denomination in Charlottesville, Williamsburg, Philadelphia and Washington.

But that attendance was about as far as his adherence to the Church of England or its American daughter went. His theology was very different from that of either high church or low church in his day or ours.

Jefferson first began to doubt conventional Christianity while a student at Williamsburg's William and Mary College. Deism, with its rejection of Christ's divinity, the Trinity, miracles and indeed any kind of a personal God, was very much in the air.

In time Jefferson came to absorb all of these denials, save the last (to some degree).

He came to believe that most of Christianity was a sort of Platonism grafted on to what he considered the "primitive religion of Jesus" – primarily to benefit the priesthood; for this reason, he conceived a particular hatred of Catholicism and a suspicion of most clerics of any kind. In 1820 he published a Bible of his own, with all the miraculous elements of the Gospels excised, calling himself Unitarian (though he never joined a Unitarian church).
