Because we have been closed since mid-March, we have had to quickly jump into being able to deliver our Sunday assemblies via some online format. We started with Zoom so that people can log in and see others, if using video options. This had worked well and was very successful during the Easter Flower Communion Service which al-

lowed members to talk about their flowers as Ellie put a flower in the vase. If you missed this assembly, it is available on our YouTube channel. It is worth the watch just to hear Ellie sing! To get at this on YouTube, open the YouTube App (you can download it free at Google Play or The App store) or go to YouTube.com on your browser. From YouTube search *redriveruu* to get at our channel. If you subscribe to our channel you can get at it easier by clicking the *Subscribe* button or menu choice depending on your device and browser. Once you are on our channel you will be able to not only see our current service but our past services. During the program you can type a chat that all who subscribe can see. Enjoy.

Going forward we will be streaming our assemblies to our YouTube channel and only use Zoom for special occasions. If any Team or Committee would like to use Zoom for their meetings contact Doug or me and we will get you set up. We will also use Zoom to hold our Spring Congregational Meeting. We are planning on holding that meeting on June 28st.

The Finance Team has been meeting and has recommended spending cuts that will reduce some of our remaining expenses for this year (through June 30th). Since the building is closed, some expenses are either not needed or are reduced, and some expenses can be managed at a lower spending level. The Finance Team is forecasting about \$3,000+ in expense savings if their assumptions hold true. This was important to do because we are behind on receiving pledge commitments for this year's budget and also, we do not know how long we will need to keep the doors closed. If you still have some of your pledge commitment outstanding and are in a financial position to pay, please do so. A big thank you to those members who are paid up on their pledge commitment.

The Stewardship Team is still planning on doing our annual stewardship campaign. This year the 2020 Stewardship will kick off on May 11th. As in past campaigns, you can pledge on line or download your commitment card from the email letter everyone will receive.

With the hit to the economy and the stock market the

Finance Team, Stewardship Team, and Board have some concerns as to how much in pledge commitment our congregation will feel comfortable giving. We will need to know what the total pledge income will be in order to present the 2020-2021 operating budget at the June 28th Spring congregational meeting

Thanks to the efforts of some of our members with Jolene heading this, we have removed half the books from our Little Library and replaced them with some canned goods, toilet paper, and other useful items. Adiós Zoom~Hola YouTube!

The migration from Zoom to YouTube went well. The worship team and AV crew managed to be only 6 minutes late for our first YouTube experience. The second one had a couple of glitches - the worst was a 5-minute delay at the start, which appeared as if the video was not loading. Forbearance from all was appreciated.

One advantage of Zoom was the ability to see the faces of one another, which helped us to feel a deeper sense of community while apart. That is not available on YouTube.

The morning assembly is recorded in advance, giving the AV people time to make sure all is well before uploading the morning assembly to YouTube. Those participating practice social distancing and only 2 or 3 others are in the chapel during the taping of each program.

Each video premieres at 11:15 AM on Sunday morning. One special perk of watching the premier is the ability to type a message to everyone watching. This is available to everyone who subscribes to our YouTube channel (See article on the next page).

Because of the option to type chat messages, the worship team is continuing the Among Ourselves portion of the morning assembly.

2020 Stewardship Campaign

Have you noticed recently when you get up, you're not quite sure what day it is? It is one of the little things that can happen when the days slip by without being much engaged with the world beyond our front steps.

The world, of course, is out there and we worry about ourselves and others, watch the reports and wonder if once the pandemic passes, what the New Normal, will entail.

Much will change and only after a long, long time will Covid-19 fade into history. We will go on, we will recover. Humankind, to date, has always recovered.

As individuals and families plan for that day, so too, does the church. Each spring we ask ourselves to make a financial commitment to sustain us for another fiscal year.

Please Subscribe!

Even though both Oklahoma and Texas officials are telling churches they may open, our Board is listening to the health officials, rather than politicians.

Besides, as we have only 50 chairs and needing 2 chairs between people would, for us, result in only 18 people being able to attend a morning assembly! It is prudent that the church is remaining closed for now.

Gathering via our YouTube channel does provide a way to connect while watching a morning assembly.

But only for those who subscribe to the YouTube channel. Everyone can watch from anywhere in the globe. Only people who subscribe to our channel can type messages.

During each morning assembly, we now have a segment "Among Ourselves" where subscribers can chat with the group. True, you don't see the person, but many of us remember land lines where we were tethered on a short leash from the receiver to the phone.

Subscribing is free and the only email you get is from YouTube reminding you when the Sunday Morning Assembly will start.

Once you are on the church YouTube channel, there will be an option to SIGN IN. Signing in does *not* make you a subscriber. You will see the church logo when you sign in. Next to it is a red SUBSCRIBE button. Tap/click it to subscribe.



It takes more time to read the instructions than to subscribe.

The more who subscribe, currently 25, the more we can keep in touch with one another until the day when we can return to the chapel.

Treasurer's Report

As previously approved by our Board, I have terminated the services of the bookkeeper we retained on a test basis at the start of this fiscal year. The bad news is that you're stuck with me keeping the books for the remainder of the year. The good news is that we don't have to pay the outside bookkeeper any more. Her final payment (\$90) was paid on April 6th.

As of March 31, 2020, we had \$3,738.64 available in checking, a total of \$66,983.22 in all savings accounts and a total of \$14,645.47 in Certificates of Deposit. Pledges received by mail in our PO Box are being deposited weekly.

Heretic of the week Harry Emerson Fosdick

In each week's issue of <u>The Catholic Herald</u>, author Charles Coulombe writes a column called Heretic of the Week. His Heretics ~ Our Heroes!



Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969) was born in Buffalo, New York, graduating from Colgate University in 1900 and Union Theological Seminary 1904. He had already been ordained a Baptist minister a year prior at Manhattan's Madison Avenue Church.

The year he graduated, he was called to the First Baptist Church in Montclair, New Jersey (now called Christ Church), and served there until 1915. During World War I, Fosdick became an army chaplain and went to France – years later repenting of his support

for the war. He returned to the US in 1918 and accepted a

call to New York's First Presbyterian Church.

Two things were happening that would determine the course of his future life. In 1921, his brother Raymond started a 30-year stint as director of the Rockefeller Foundation. This brought the young minister to the attention of John D Rockefeller, whose Court Preacher he essentially became.

The second was Fosdick's intervention in the Modernist/Fundamentalist controversy then roiling American Protestantism. As a Union Theological Seminary graduate, Fosdick was most certainly in the former camp, and in 1922 delivered a highly controversial sermon – "Shall the Fundamentalists Win?" – in which he declared that the Bible was not the literal Word of God, but a record of man's self-revelation; he also championed evolution.

He escaped a trial by the Presbyterian Church through resigning his charge two years later, and Rockefeller immediately installed him as pastor of his own church, Park Avenue Baptist Church (as well as printing and distributing Fosdick's sermons nationwide).

In 1930, Rockefeller built the interdenominational Riverside Church and appointed Fosdick as head of that congregation. Seven years later, Fosdick conducted Rockefeller's funeral. Fosdick wrote numerous books, and his sermons were broadcast across America.
