We held our Fall Meeting on Zoom on Oct 18th. Thanks to David, Doug, and Marla for helping make this work. I was a bit concerned that we might have a problem getting a quorum because we only had 8 online voters. However, we

had 17 people join the Zoom meeting and we easily made our quorum.

We approved:

- the Spring Congregation Minutes 2020
- that the interest from our Red River savings account held by the UU Common Endowment Fund be transferred to our Red River endowment fund also held by the UU Common Endowment Fund on May 1st of each year
- new, revised Congregational Annual Goals:
 - 1. Subscribe to our YouTube Channel and watch 2-3 morning assemblies each month
 - 2. Attend 1 Zoom coffee hour a month
 - 3. Sit in on 1 Adult Forum a month
 - 4. Read the church newsletter 5 times over the next 8 months
 - 5. Read the Wednesday UPDATE every week
 - 6. Find and join 1 UU Zoom event
 - 7. Reach out to 4 other members/friends over the next 8 months and have a friendly conversation [maybe try a video call using Zoom, Google, FaceTime, Duo, YouTube chat etc.]
 - 8. Be sure to press Share, Like, or write a comment for all online Red River UU events that catch your attention

What I like about these goals is that it puts the success of these goals on all of us. Following goals 1 and 8 results in free advertisement for our church. The more you like, comment, and share any and all Red River posts that appear on social media, the more a larger audience (friends and friends of friends) are introduced to Red River and what we are doing. Following goals 2, 3, and 6 help support online events. Following goals 4 and 5 helps keep you informed on what we are doing. Following goal 7 keeps us connected. Don't just contact someone you communicate with already, find someone that

you haven't seen or talked with in a while and give them a call. Some of our members do not do social media or use the internet so they could use a friendly call.

During the annual reports the Worship Team presented some statistics on attendance. Before we closed the building we were seeing an average attendance of around 28 people each Sunday. Since we went to online services we are now seeing on YouTube an average of 60 views per service and on Facebook an average of 57 views. Those are exciting numbers and with the help of all of us in following the Annual Goals, those numbers will increase.

One of the most exciting (for me) things that came out of the Fall Zoom meeting was that we had 17 people on the community Zoom screen. It felt great to see and talk with that many UU faces, even if it was on Zoom. That's why I encourage all of you to join in our Zoom sessions. Information on our Zoom sessions are posted in our church newsletter, our Wednesday UPDATE, and on our App and Website.

On Oct. 17th Jan Fletcher held our first Red River UU sponsored Zoom music circle. We only had 4 musicians sign in, but what we lacked in quantity we made up in quality. If you like live music please join us next time. You don't have to play to come to this. We meet on the third Saturday of each month starting at 6:30PM.

Jan also needed to resign as Treasurer. She has had to cut back on much of her volunteer activity due to health reasons. With regrets the Board accepted her resignation. Thank you Jan so much for all you do for us.

The Board also accepted Marilyn Alexander as our new Treasurer. Thank you Marilyn for filling this critical position.

Whew! That was a busy October.



Adult Forum for November

The topic for Adult Forum during November is "Activists: People who Can't NOT Lead."

Adult Forum, which currently meets via Zoom, is planned and led each month by a different AF member, and November is Marion Hill's turn. "I'm an activist in a minor way," she says, "and am fascinated by people who devote much of their lives to trying to bring important change in the world. These individuals often have a strong religious faith that supports or guides (and occasionally pushes back against) their activism. On the Sundays in November, we'll look at five such activists."



On November 1, AF will watch and discuss a video about the Rev. Dr. William Barber, a Christian minister in North Carolina who leads Moral Mondays, the Poor People's Campaign,

and Repairers of the Breach, attempting to address what he terms "the interlocking evils of systemic racism, poverty, ecological devastation, militarism and the war economy, and the distorted moral narrative of religious nationalism." In this video, Rev. Barber relates his lifelong mission for social justice to the upcoming Presidential election. (Image: Dr. Barber speaking at the 2016 UU General Assembly.)



On November 8, AF will watch and discuss a video about Sister Simone Campbell who since 2012 has led the "Nuns on the Bus" cru-

sade to call attention to social issues such as the need for economic justice and immigration reform. A practicing attorney who has focused on family law and the rights of the working poor, Sister Simone often finds that her outspokenness on behalf of Medicaid expansion, the Affordable Care Act, LGBTQ rights, and a humane approach to the issue of abortion places her at odds with the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. On November 15, AF will watch and discuss a video about the late Pete Seeger, who used his platform as a popular folk singer to speak for unions and the protection of wetlands and against the arms race and the Vietnam War. Although he was raised with no



religion and didn't join a UU church until late in life (joining then to get rehearsal space and because his mother had become a UU), he said that he had actually subscribed to UU val-

ues all his life and those values inform his music. (Image: Seeger singing at the UU General Assembly, 1996)



On November 22, AF will watch and discuss a video about Greta Thunberg, the 17-year-old Swedish climate activist who gained international attention when she scolded a gathering of

world leaders at the 2019 United Nations Climate Action Summit over their slowness in addressing the global threat of climate change: "How dare you!" Thunberg told the U.N. attendees. In this video, Thunberg is interviewed about her laser-like focus on the climate issue, her parents' response to it, and the way her activism relates to her Asperger-Syndrome diagnosis. On November 29, AF will watch and discuss a video about Archbishop Desmond Tutu, who along with Nelson Mandela led the fight to abolish the

racist policy of apartheid in South Africa. For his work as chair of the Truth & Reconciliation Commission (charged with investigating past human rights abuses by both pro- and anti-apartheid groups) that Mandela appointed him to, Tutu won the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize. Besides leading in race relations, he has also campaigned for gay rights and the rights of women. Although a much-honored official of the Anglican Church of South Africa, Tutu blends Christian beliefs with black liberation theology into a belief system he calls ubuntu (translated by him as reconciliation or hospitality).(Tutu at the Forgotten Liberators exhibit, 2019)

Earth Day Recycling Event

The Earth Day Recycling Event sponsored by the Earth Day Planning Committee was held in Sherman on October 24. We offered a wide variety of recycling opportunities- glass bottles and jars, Styrofoam, cardboard, paper, ink & toner cartridges, cell phones, shredding of sensitive documents, electronic waste recycling and drug take back.

The event was hugely successful, especially for a first time to attempt a fall event. Cars started lining up by 8:00 am and kept coming up until the last minute when we closed the parking lot. We completely filled the container for Choctaw Nation and had to start asking people to take their cardboard to the City of Sherman drop off re-cycling center. The electronic waste recycler collected enough to fill two 24-foot U-Haul trucks.

The owner stated this was their most successful recycling event in Sherman to date. The Sherman Police collected 9 boxes of unused and expired drugs. We estimate we provided recycling services to around 250 households.

Event sponsors were: Texoma Earth Day Festival, Douglass Distributing, Doctors Jeannine Hatt and Chuck Phelps, Red River Unitarian Universalist Church, Ghost Town Arts Collective, Grayson County Democrats, Sherman Police Department and Car Wrap City.

With a Twist This Year

97.5 KLAK, 93.1 KMKT and Mad Rock 102.5 are again sponsoring a drive to collect warm clothing for those in need. The twist this year, given the pandemic, is to collect for the two most asked for items: blankets and socks.

The two stations teamed up with the **Texoma Family Shelter** to raise as much money as possible *ONLINE*, so we can purchase brand new blankets & socks. We'll then provide these items to as many local individuals, families and organizations as we can.

The Texoma Family Shelter will be directing the distribution on Thursday, November 12th. The distribution will take place in the chapel at church.

This is a win-win for everyone, including us because every time the stations announce where people will go to pick up socks and blankets "Red River Unitarian Universalist Church" will be heard throughout Texoma. Name recognition is always helpful.

Should you feel comfortable helping the day before set up at 3 pm, do come. Anyone willing to help during the distribution which will be a "**Share the Warmth Drive-Thru distribution** that would be helpful. We'll be carrying socks and blankets from the chapel to the driveway while the radio staff (we are assuming) will be giving them to those in need.

The distribution will be from 10-2 with those helping to arrive at 9 am.

- Packages of Ramen noodles
- Canned or bottled drinks that won't spoil
- Crackers and cookies
- Disinfectant spray, wipes

- Paper products toilet paper, Kleenex, paper towels
- Disposable or cloth face masks
- Toothpaste and new, packaged toothbrush
- Other toiletries
- Small craft items, puzzles, games
