Unfortunately, things will get worse before they get better and we will all need to continue with our practices through the Christmas and New Years holiday season. I hope everyone is doing their best to follow our Annual Goals that I have listed below. I want to highlight #7. With all the restrictions we are having to do during the holidays, people may be feeling more isolated than ever. Please reach out (phone, facetime, zoom, dog sled, carrier pidgin, pony express, OMG a real letter, etc.) not only to your friends but also to members of Red River that you haven't seen in a while.

- Subscribe to our YouTube Channel and watch 2-3 morning assemblies each month
- Sit in on 1 Adult Forum a month
- Read the church newsletter 5 times over the next 8 months
- Read the wednesdayUPDATE every week
- Reach out to 4 other members/friends over the next 8 months and have a friendly conversation (zoom/Google/FaceTime/Duo)
- Be sure to press Share, Like, or write a comment for all online Red River UU events that catch your attention.

During the month of November, our church has helped the Texoma Family shelter with two events. The first event was a blanket and socks handout called "Share the Warmth".

These items were handed out in the church parking lot. (Check out the photos on page 4!) People drove through to get their packages. The second event was held also as a drive through for Thanksgiving food packages that the shelter handed out. Both events were very successful.

Since the pandemic has started we have been using the Little library to also distribute food items. Jolene has been leading this effort, but she has to pass this on to others since the Whittens are relocating to McKinney. We are looking for someone to take Jolene's place. If you are interested, please contact me. Also, we can always use food donations (canned goods and non-perishables) or money so we can buy items to place in the Little Library/Food Pantry.

The UU Ministers Association is recommending that visiting clergy receive an honorarium of \$315 (an increase of \$70 over the previous recommendation). The Board would appreciate donations to help defray the unexpected increase in clergy honoraria, but we are committed to providing high quality online assemblies, and we will find a way to guarantee that they continue.

Finally, I know that I am seeing some light at the end of the tunnel we seem to be stuck in. The election results have helped many of us feel more optimistic for 2021 and now there appears to be a vaccine on the near horizon that should finally stop this pandemic. I'm cautiously optimistic that we may be able to reopen our doors sometime in 2021. Fingers crossed!

# How to record what you want to share on December 27:


Would you like to share something with the congregation but don't feel confident about making a video on your own? We can help!

Our plan is to meet via Zoom once every two weeks during January and February, to discuss each chapter and than a summary discussion of the entire book.

Won't you join us?

The UU Common Read for that <u>Breathe</u>: A <u>Letter to My Sons</u> by Imani Perry (Beacon Press, 2019) is the new Common Read.

Emotionally raw and deeply reflective, Imani Perry issues a challenge to society to see Black children as deserving of humanity. She admits fear and frustration for her African American sons in a society that is increasingly racist and at times seems irredeemable. However, as a mother, feminist, writer, and intellectual, Perry offers an unfettered expression of love—finding beauty and possibility in life—and she exhorts her children and their peers to find the courage to chart their own paths and find steady footing and inspiration in Black tradition. The New York Times calls Breathe "an elixir of history, ancestry and compassion, which, together, become instruction...a parent's unflinching demand, born of inherited trauma and love, for her children's right simply to be possible."

Breathe offers a broader meditation on race, gender, and the meaning of a life well lived and is also an unforgettable lesson in Black resistance and resilience.

At this moment in time, we are in the midst of a historic national reckoning with what it means to live as a Black or Brown American and systems of institutional racism that have been operating to control, traumatize, and oppress people of color since our country's founding. As our President, Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, has written, "It matters that we support the uprisings whose goal is the liberation of Black people and communities who for too long have been crushed

2020–2021 by white supremacy, militarism, and capitalism. We must find the sources within ourselves to give us courage in this moment." In choosing Breathe as the 2020-2021 Common Read, our hope is that it nurtures this necessary courage.

Imani Perry: this Princeton professor urges us to reclaim black history. Sneak Peek: 3:57 minute video

Born to social activist parents in Birmingham, Alabama, just nine years after the 16th Street Baptist Church bombing, scholar and author Imani Perry grew up during a time of great change. At age 7, her family relocated to Cambridge, Massachusetts; her mother earned a Harvard doctorate while Perry's own academic and literary ambitions took root. Today, Perry is the Hughes-Rogers Professor of African American Studies at Princeton University where she examines the rich, layered interplay between history, race, law, and culture, with an emphasis on hip-hop music. Her interdisciplinary work is deeply reflective and also grounded in experience – her own, of those who came before her and that of the next generation. By sharing her multifaceted perspective, Perry hopes to reframe the way we think about black culture. "If there were one impact I'd like my work to have, it would be that people would cease talking about African American history and culture in terms of deprivation or inadequacy and actually acknowledge its depth and complexity and beauty," she says.

# Treasurer's Report ~ October 2020

In the month of October, we had total receipts of \$2,517.07. Expenses for the month totaled \$3,098.81. The result was an excess of expenditures over receipts of \$581.74.

As of October 31, 2020, we had \$2,575.17 available in checking, \$18,025.74 in general savings, \$12,058.50 in the Endowment Fund at UUCEF, and \$54,725.90 in the Savings Fund at UUCEF for a total of \$84,872.21 in all savings accounts. We have a total of \$6,779.39 remaining on the renovation loan.




