Coming Home?

Ed. Note: The following information was extracted the UUA post dated 1-29-2021, by Dr Susan Frederick-Gray, UUA President.

Because of the re-opening of some in-person spaces around us, and because of our strong desire to connect once again in the sacred spaces of our congregational buildings, many are asking when and how to resume in-person programs and services.

We have articulated the following principles for thinking about when and how to go back. They are grounded in Unitarian Universalism's deep values.

- Our abiding care and concern for the most vulnerable, inside and outside our congregation.
- Accessibility and inclusion for all of our members and friends to participate in our congregation, regardless of health status, health vulnerability, or ability.
- Recognition that we are part of an interdependent web and, as such, our risk-taking and our protective actions affect far more than just ourselves.
- Our congregational decisions can impact other congregations and the wider community.

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Jim's Jabber

It is with heavy heart to report that Ronda DeCaire, our dear church member and friend, lost her battle with cancer on January 10, 2021. We held a virtual gathering to honor and remember her life on January 24th. Thank you Doug for leading the service.

February is a month filled with awards and celebration. However, nothing is normal any more with the pandemic still present. NTUUC has canceled their award ceremony this year (and is also not bestowing any grants either). Our traditional Annual Appreciation Dinner and the presentation of the Bruce Cameron Distinguished Service Award, usually held in late February, also will not happen.

In its place, the Board decided to hold a special Zoom event we're calling "*Church Re-imagined: What's Behind the Curtain*." You no doubt saw the announcement on the front page of this month's *Red River Ramblings*. It will replace our online Coffee Hour, following Dr. Tata's remarks on Sunday, February 21st. (Use the online coffee hour Zoom link to join the fun.)

Spring is also the time for our annual Stewardship Campaign. While we had reduced our current expenses with the building closed, we've needed to increase the worship team's budget to pay for the additional speakers and cover added costs in producing video morning assemblies. Also, we've agreed to follow the UU Minister's Association recommendations to increase honoraria to ministers. We've been able to cover these added expenses through our cost savings measures along with non-budget funds we obtained. The 2021-2022 budget will have to cover these expanded costs.

The Spring Congregational meeting, again via Zoom, this year is on May 19th. We will have reports from the Board of Trustees, President, Committee on Ministry, and the Membership Committee. We will approve the budget for the next year, and elect various church leaders. Our Nominating committee is working on filling the open positions.

This newsletter's side panel article from the UUA explores ideas and recommendations regarding when to return home. We'll have an open discussion at the spring meeting on your thoughts about when we might reopen the church. It is our hope that once we reopen we can continue to broadcast our morning assemblies on our YouTube and Facebook platforms each week for those who want to join us online.

Take care, keep safe and keep on trucking.

- Our affirmation that good science, coupled with our UU values, must be the basis upon which we make decisions about in-person gathering.

UUA Recommendations:

We discourage strongly smaller in-person gatherings (such as meetings or one-toone pastoral care) in indoor spaces, even with masks. Even the best masks are not 100% effective in preventing the spread of the virus from person to person. Our values of safety and inclusion call on us to minimize risk. We do not always know who might be most vulnerable to being harmed, or killed, by this virus. And we do not want to place the burden of educating or correcting us on the people who are most vulnerable.

Common Read Discussion Group

There's still time to sign up for the UU Common Read. Marion notes that she has a few registered for a discussion of this interesting book (*Breathe*), but the discussions won't begin until mid-February. If you're interested, please get in touch with her right away.

Staying connected to other people during this pandemic is more difficult than when life is "normal," but doing so seems especially important. One way UUs can connect with others of our faith is by reading and discussing the UU Common Read for 2020-21: *Breathe: A Letter to My Sons* by Imani Perry.

The book is addressed to Perry's two African-American sons, advising them on how to navigate this often-racist society, but many of its observations can apply to everyone, not only people of color. Imani draws upon her own family anecdotes—sometimes funny, always insightful—as well as the writings of such disparate figures as James Baldwin, Emily Dickinson, Ida B. Wells, Toni Morrison, and Ralph Waldo Emerson.

The book is available in hard cover from inSpirit (the UU bookstore) for \$18.00 and also from Amazon for \$12.

Coming Home?


- Our highest values and commitments call us to refrain from in-person gathering until the COVID-19 pandemic is controlled. We invite you to think of your congregation as primarily digitally-connected, with small in-person nodes that can grow as the pandemic subsides.
 - Our recommendations for congregations are indeed more stringent than schools and businesses that surround you, for the following reasons:
 - As a community that values inclusion and collective care, we don't want to create in-person situations that inadvertently exclude those at higher risk, or create situations that force those at higher risk to publicly identify themselves.
 Our decision-making must center the needs of the most vulnerable.
 - The membership of most UU congregations is an older, more vulnerable population than the general public.
 - We do not want congregational staff and ministers to be put at risk on the job.
 - A normally-operating congregation presents too many opportunities to spread a highly contagious respiratory virus like COVID-19.

Details ... Behind the Curtain

Yes, Virginia, we can have a pleasant, entertaining, and fun time in a virtual room full of smiling RedRiverUU faces. For many of us this will be the first time you've participated in a church Zoom gathering!

This promises to be a 'worth it' gathering. It is not a congregational meeting, no one will try to recruit you to coordinate the spring stewardship campaign, or harangue you for *not once* watching a Morning Assembly. Nope! None of that.

Ongoing Virtual Gatherings

Treasurer's Report

In the month of December, we had total receipts of \$3171.46. Expenses for the month totaled \$2261.54. The result was an excess of receipts over expenditures of \$909.92. As of December 20, 2020, we had \$6220.68 available in checking, \$16,532.20 in general savings, \$12,058.50 in the Endowment Fund at UUCEF, and \$54,725.90 in the Savings Fund at UUCEF for a total of \$83,378.67 in all savings accounts. We have a total of \$6,779.39 remaining on the renovation loan.

Ongoing Virtual Gatherings

We invite you to think creatively in partnership with other congregations about how to minister to the needs of your communities—we know that many meaningful cross-congregational collaborations, forged in the time of COVID-19, are already underway. It is a time for joining together in mutual support. That is how we will make it through.

How to Decide When to Resume In-Person Gathering

We are guided by science and our deepest values, not politics, when we urge congregations to not resume full in-person operations until concrete public health criteria are met.

We offer this series of values-based and practical questions for you to consider.

Our <u>UU Congregation in Reston, Virginia has created an excellent policy</u> on when to consider regathering in person.

Our UU congregation in Duluth, Minnesota has developed a <u>six-tier COVID-19 safety plan</u> based on local health indicators. Their work provides a second example of how a congregation might enact its own guidelines.

Conclusion

As the pandemic continues to play out, we as Unitarian Universalists and we as UU congregations will continue to face uncertainty. The best we can do at any given time is to lean in to our values as well as draw on the gifts and wisdom of our own people. Know that, whatever comes, we as your UUA staff are your partners. We will be here to help you think through tough situations and find a way forward. We will help connect you with others so we can all learn together. We will be there, as your partners, working alongside you for health, love, spiritual connection, and justice in your communities and beyond.
