On May 9, 1930, George Hughes was lynched, the Grayson County Courthouse was burned to the ground, and the black business district on Mulberry Street was destroyed. There is no Texas Historical Marker for this tragic event. Black citizens of Sherman were absolutely terrorized following the lynching of George Hughes. Ignoring history does not make it go away. ne month of being open, it feels good to be back and to see everyone in person. However, now is not the time to let our guard down. With the Covid-D variant on the rise, the board has updated the protocols for being at church. We are now urging (but not requiring) everyone to wear a mask, even if you've been vaccinated. Meanwhile, if you come to church and have not been fully vaccinated, please wear your mask.

Now that we are doing live Sundays in church we also have the responsibility to reach out to those friends and members that can't join us. We now Zoom stream our morning assembly, Adult Forum, and coffee and conversations. The sound system that is currently installed in the chapel is setup to give the in-house members the best audio experience that we can afford and for that purpose it does a particularly good job. Unfortunately, it has some issues in sound quality on our recordings and Zoom live stream. Some of the equipment is also getting old and showing its age (like many of us). The AV Team is addressing these issues (with the equipment, not us), and hopefully will be making improvements over the next 30 days.

We are also excited to announce that we received a \$7200 Grant from NTUUC to be used to improve and upgrade our audio, video, and lighting in the chapel and RE rooms. We will be switching our equipment in the chapel from 10-year-old analog to new, modern digital (think old scratchy vinyl record on an old turntable vs a new CD played on a state of the art CD music player). If any of you are interested in learning how to run digital sound equipment with a 2-camera setup please contact me, we could use some additional help on the AV Team.

Treasurer's Report

For the twelve months ended June 30, 2021, we had total income of \$53,249.06 which included \$12,825.77 of appreciation in investment funds we now have with the UUA Common Endowment Fund. Total expenses were \$37,395.36, leaving an excess of income over expenses of \$15,853.70.

Adjusting for the market appreciation in our UUACEF funds, our adjusted net income was \$3,027,93, compared to\$2,773.31 for the prior fiscal year.

It is worth noting that the total of Pledges and Unpledged Regular Giving exceeded the budget by \$3,645.00.

As of June 30, 2021, we had \$2,589.31available in checking, a total of \$19,090.31 in all savings accounts and a total of \$79,605.17 in the UUA Common Endowment Fund.

All bank accounts have been reconciled with no exceptions noted.

There are a hundred plus separate small squares of fabric using 20 colors to create an inside and outside ribbon illusion, giving the finished design the name Illusion.

A beautiful addition to the chapel and accepted with great thanks to Marla for creating it. If you did not know, Marla also created the various chancel cloths, four of which portray the four seasons - summer being the one shown in the photograph.

Speaker Bios



Ron Wallace (August 15) is a Native son of Oklahoma and a national poetry award winner. He is the author of four volumes of poetry published by TJMF Publishing of Clarksville, Indiana. All

four have received critical acclaim and met with success in the poetry world. His first book, Native Son, was a finalist in the 2007 Oklahoma Book Awards. I Come from Cowboys ... and Indians won the 2009 Oklahoma Writer's Federation "Best Book of Poetry Award" and Oklahoma Cantos was again a finalist in the 2011 Oklahoma Book Awards, a finalist in the Western Heritage Book Awards and won the 2011 Oklahoma Writer's Federation "Best Book of Poetry Award".

Wallace's Choctaw, Cherokee, Osage heritage is intertwined with his Scots-Irish roots and often reflected in his writing. He lists James Dickey, Robinson Jeffers, Yusef Komunyakaa and his former Southeastern Oklahoma State University professor and poet, Howard Starks as his major influences.

A former public-school teacher and coach he has been a featured poet at The Abydos Learning Project in Texas three times, a featured poet at the Woody Guthrie Festival in Okemah, Oklahoma for the last four years. He has been a reader at the Tennessee Humanities Festival, a member of the Emerging Poets Southern Tour. His work has won several individual state and national awards and has been published in many journals and anthologies.

Melissa Thiel (August 22) grew up in Grayson County and graduated high school in Tom Bean. She received an associate degree at Grayson County Jr

College (now Grayson College) and went on to study at Texas Woman's University to complete her bachelor's in history. She received her master's in history with emphasis in Public History in 2019. It was during her studies that she learned about the lynching of George Hughes at the Grayson County Courthouse. Melissa leads the local effort to document the event with a Texas Historical Marker.
