

Our 2022 Stewardship Campaign will run from April 3-17 this year. Please fill out your pledge card and send it in or better yet, pledge on-line. The Finance Team will take these pledge commitments and create a balanced budget for July 1, 2022- June 30, 2023. The Finance Team has put together a proposed budget of \$45,030 for this coming budget year. This sets a target of \$38,900 in pledges for our Stewardship Campaign. Here is a pie chart of

We held our special Congregation Meeting on March 20th to discuss and vote on if we want to officially pursue getting a minister. The vote was 26 yes, 1 no, and 2 abstains. We also voted on some minor Bylaw changes and the vote supporting those changes was unanimous (29 yes). We approved employing a contract minister for a 1-year contract that can be renewed if the congregation and minister approve. The membership has spoken.

The next major step is for the Board to recommend a five-person Contract Minister Search Committee to be presented at our May 15 congregational meeting. The search committee will then begin our formal search for a minister and identify grants and funding that the Board will submit to help us pay for a minister. If you are interested on being on this search team or know of someone that you would like to recommend, please let any Board member know. In your packet of documents for the May congregational meeting we will have more details on the next steps in our search process.

The annual Texoma Earth Day Festival is scheduled for April 23rd. Our church is the reason that Earth Day is in Texoma, and Amy has been leading it. We need more volunteers to help run this festival. Red River UU also plans on having a booth at the festival and we also need some volunteers to help staff our booth. Please let Amy or any Board member know if you are interested.

The Good Times Teams bring snacks for our Conversations and Calories after each Sunday morning assembly. If you are looking for a way to get involved and love food, our teams could use a few more good people.

We are slowly seeing more members and friends returning to the chapel. Please come join us.

Texoma Earth Day Festival

The Texoma Earth Day Festival returns on April 23, 2022. After a two-year break with providing only drive through recycling events during the pandemic, we are happy to bring back the full festival.



We will offer workshops on monarch way stations, solar energy, finding the best electric energy provider for your needs and worm composting. Our entertainment will include the Greater Harvest Church band and "Trashion" Fashion VII. For the first time, the festival will offer a free Children's Clothing Swap and a free Plant Swap.

Our recycling options, sponsored by several businesses and government entities, continue to expand and grow. We will have paper shredding, electronic waste collection, and an unused medication collection for limited hours. There will be containers throughout the day for cardboard, plastics 1,2,&5, aluminum & tin food containers, plastic bags (including shrink plastic film and bubble wrap), Styrofoam (not including soft foam) and ink & toner cartridges. We might be able to offer glass recycling, but it isn't confirmed at this time.

Red River UU is certified, and it would be wonderful to have two delegates attend this June's GA! It will be a Multi-Platform General Assembly

General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists, where we conduct business of the Association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean fully into our mission and principles. That remains true even when we cannot gather physically. In 2021, GA had more than 4,000 registered attendees participate from remote locations around the world.

For those who enjoyed the convenience and accessibility of remote participation, General Assembly will continue to offer virtual attendance with robust programming and enhanced delegate discussion tools. Join Wellness Coaches, Tommi Homuth and Joyce White, the Texas A&M Family & Community Health County Extension Agent as they present an 8-session workshop to help improve balance, flexibility and strength. The course starts Tuesday, May 5 and runs each Tuesday and Thursday from 10 am to noon. Classes will be held in the Alexander and Emerson rooms at church.

A Matter of Balance uses practical coping strategies to reduce fear of falling and to diminish the risk of falling including group discussions, mutual problem solving, exercises to improve strength, coordination and balance, and home safety evaluation. Fair Trade Coffee

Arion Hill will be ordering Fair Trade coffee soon. Fair Trade coffee is somewhat more expensive than Folger's, but it allows small farmers who grow coffee to sell to a coop rather than to big companies, thereby earning more money. To see what's available, go to https://shop.equalexchange.coop. That will show the retail price (for example, \$52.50 for 6/12 oz. pks). But we get it at the wholesale price (\$46.50 for the 6 pks.) They have both ground coffee and whole beans.

over the last quarter century and reflects the decisions made at the March 20th congregational meeting (you can read a summary of the votes taken in this month's *Jim's Jabber*. Our campaign this year will follow a similar format we're used in the last several years. You can anticipate receiving a letter from the Board of Trustees within the next few days. We can make our pledges on the church app, our website and by picking up a pledge card on the ledge in the foyer outside the chapel. The board hopes we can wrap up this year's appeal by April 17th so the final figures can be included in the packet of documents for the upcoming May 15 spring congregational meeting.

Treasurer's Keport

ebruary 2022 had receipts considerably higher than in January. Total income was \$7,300.00, more than double what was received in January. Expenses, on the other hand, were about \$500 less than in January. As a result, net income for the month of February was \$3,880.07. Net income for this fiscal year-to-date was \$26,001.37.

As of February 28, 2022, we had \$5,404.95 available in checking, the decrease from January reflecting the disbursement of the \$1,469.13 which had remained available for Lanan Shelton. We also have a total of \$19,103.13 in all savings accounts, including \$2,545.00 in the Ronda Decaire Memorial Fund. I haven't made any adjustment yet, but it should be noted that the total market value of our investment in UUCEF funds has declined from \$81,847.52 to \$77,296.88, a market value decline of \$4,550.64 (5.6%).
