Adrian held another Clothing Swap, following the memorial service for Joe Combs. The next clothing swap will be August 4th, 3:00-8:00 pm and August 5th, 10:00-3:00 pm at church. The board suggested that the congregation gather school supplies to distribute during the swap. I have already started collecting some for my donation. Young school age children always need pencils, crayons, glue sticks, colored markers, spiral notebooks, etc. We don't need to get specific and try to fill the needs of a particular classroom or age group, since the children's clothing swap is for infants as well as Pre-K– upper elementary age children, so those school age children will be the ones we will be helping.

Planning is beginning for a 3-day summer children's program for the summer of 2024. Marilyn, David, and Megan are on that committee. The dates will be announced once the committee meets and determines the curriculum, age groups and how it is going to be organized. Stay tuned.

PRIDE MONTH AND ALLIES

June is Pride Month, a time for celebration of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer people, and a time to call attention to their need for allies in the fight for equality.

LGBTQ+ people have often been in a marginalized position in society, and that seems especially true now, when laws are being passed in many state legislatures targeting transgender folk.

I heard a good presentation earlier this month in my home church, Red River Unitarian Universalist Church in Denison, TX, by Adrian Hinman, a young non-binary person who spoke on the topic "For the good of society."

Hinman pointed out the need for all who oppose the religious right's targeting of trans people to speak up on their behalf, to become allies.

"Both Texas and Oklahoma are unsafe for transgender people right now," they said.

Actions that such allies can do include: contacting one's legislators to oppose anti-trans legislation; donating to Go Fund Me accounts to help fund transgender surgery for individuals who feel the surgery is right for them; and correcting acquaintances when they make transphobic jokes.

Supporting trans people doesn't always require large, bold steps, Hinman said. It can be as simple as escorting a trans person to a restroom, to help ensure their safety.

I admit that I am an imperfect ally. I sometimes forget to use people's correct personal pronouns. I'm trying to do better.

I have learned, from a couple of websites that Hinman mentioned in their talk, transequality.org and thetrevorproject.org, much helpful information about how to be a better ally. Here are a couple of guiding principles for any who wants to be allies to marginalized people in our society. (These are specific to supporting LGBTQ folk, but they can be adapted for the support of people of color, people with disabilities, immigrants, and others who may find themselves on the fringes of society.):

We can educate ourselves about what it means to be non-binary. Although we may not fully understand another person's feelings about their gender designation and we needn't further burden transgender persons by demanding explanations from them—we can all respect another person's stated identity.

If we make a mistake in referring to someone who's nonbinary—using the wrong pronoun, for instance—we can apologize and move on. We need not make a big deal of every mistake, since mistakes are part of learning. But we need to keep trying to do better.

Reasons to try to be a better ally for transgender people include these:

1. It's the right thing to do, to treat others as we would want to be treated.

2. It's easier for us, who are not part of a marginalized group, to take a stand. Like it or not, we are the privileged. And with privileges come responsibilities.

3. Knowing people that are "different" in some way from diverse backgrounds or with unfamiliar challenges—enriches our own lives.

Just as becoming friends with someone from a different country and another culture can open a part of the world to us that we hadn't known before, getting to know a trans person (with whatever individual interests and abilities they have) can expand our experience of what it means to be human.

Adrian Hinman enriches our church in numerous ways. They sometimes speak during worship services. They organize clothing swaps, to which people donate clothing they no longer need and from which others take garments they can use. And they periodically lead "games nights," which attract people to the church to play board games and solve puzzles, just for fun.

Being an ally of a trans person isn't just something we can do FOR that person; it's also something we can do FOR ourselves.

Minister Search Team

Our last meeting was held on June 15th. at 2pm in the Alexander Room. We went over the UUA Profile questions that Marla has been working on. We all agreed that the answers look good. The next step will be to schedule a work session with Marla (and her computer) to go over the questions and answers and fill in any additional information that we come up with collectively.

We also reviewed the latest updates to the UUA's minister compensation package. When we first did this, we estimated a compensation target of \$89,383 for the first year. Since then, enough time has passed that the UUA has increased the salary by 3% a year for two years. Our new estimate for a compensation target is now \$96,237. Our next meeting will be held on Sept 14th at 2pm in the Gil Alexander room. We will also be scheduling work sessions with Marla on the UUA church profile questionnaire and with Jana on her work on the church history.

Money Matters

In the month of May, we had total receipts of \$1,458.00. Total expenses for the month were \$3,608.41, leaving us with a net loss for the month of (\$2,150.41). The net loss for the month was primarily due to lower pledge income and to the timing of insurance payments.

Net loss for the fiscal year-to-date was (\$2,404.79). The year-to-date net loss was due to lower pledge income and expenses for garage repairs, partially offset by lower expenses in other categories.

As of May 31, 2023, we had \$8,029.71 available in checking. There is a total of \$20,647.17 in all savings accounts, including \$4,077.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the Endowment Fund for minister compensation, if needed.

A total of \$15,690 has currently been pledged for the minister's compensation fund. Additional pledges can be made by contacting the minister's search team.
