Amy was going to meet with Jan to make sure that both flyers could also be included in new business welcoming packets.



Voting Rights Strengthens American Democracy Congress must pass the

John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act



Washington, D.C. – Today, federal legislators reintroduced the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2023. The Voting Rights Act had a long history of bipartisan support, and this bill merits similar bipartisan support. If passed, the measure will restore and strengthen the Voting Rights Act, repairing the damage done since *Shelby County* and *Brnovich v. Democratic National Committee*.

"As Unitarian Universalists, we are deeply committed to a profound inclusionary American democracy. The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2023 moves us in this direction," said Pablo DeJesús, executive director of Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice. "For the good of our entire nation, we affirm today that our democracy works best for each of us as individuals when it covers all of our communities in the liberty we want, a liberty that is secured by peaceful means, at the ballot box, in free and fair elections; a liberty based on participation that includes all of us regardless of color, political party, or zip code," said DeJesús.

"In our faith tradition, we uphold the inherent worth and dignity of every person as well as a free and responsible search for truth and meaning. We value the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process. As a consequence of our principles and our values, we believe that voting rights matter for every person in the U.S.," continued DeJesús.

"We reject the forces of hate and exclusion that seek to deny and dilute our fundamental right to vote, especially for voters of color. Our generation's federal legislators must rise to the challenge of this moment and meet their obligations to protect the right to vote. Congress must pass the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2023," concluded DeJesús.

Money Matters

In the month of August, we had total receipts of \$1,654.00. Total expenses for the month were \$5,397.01, leaving us with a net loss for the month of (\$3,743.01). The net loss for the month was primarily due to the timing of pledge income, building repairs, and the timing of insurance payments.

WE had a net profit for the fiscal year-to-date of \$5,105.92. The year-to-date net profit was primarily due to the timing of pledge income.

As of August 31,2023, we had \$15,208.81 available in checking. There is a total of \$20,709.72 in all savings accounts, including \$4,317.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the Endowment Fund for minister compensation, if needed.

A total of \$15,690 has currently been pledged for the minister's compensation fund. Additional pledges can be made by contacting the minister search team or by pledging here.
