We heard about the status of some special community events our church has planned through this year: Coat Drive, Fan Drive and School Supply Drive. All will be advertised in the newsletter, morning program, and the UPDATE. Be watching for information and when you can volunteer to support these drives.

After the firebomb at the Plano UU church, and the man with weapon at the Ft. Worth UU church, we recognized the need for additional safety for our congregation and our building. Jim installed a new security system and Marilyn and Amy attended a Safety Workshop put on by NTUUC at Horizon UU in Carrollton. That meeting provided a lot of good ideas for emergency preparedness, which we will be implementing in the coming months. Note: Jack is certified in CPR and is willing to become certified as a trainer. Everyone is encouraged to become certified in CPR and learn how to give directions to others, even if unable to perform CPR.

Last summer, Red River UU joined the Chamber of Commences in Denison and Plano. On Wednesday March 6<sup>th</sup> from 3:00-5:30 PM, our church will be the location for a ribbon cutting and Open House hosting the Denison Chamber of Commerce. We will need to provide refreshments and adult beverages. These events typically draw 20-50 people. We are excited about being able to show off Red River UU to the community. Your help will be needed to provide and serve refreshments, show off our church and tour people around.

The October Board Retreat gave us some direction in building membership, stewardship, delegating responsibilities to get more people involved in our activities and we developed a sample vision statement which was discussed at the Fall Meeting. A Vision Task Force composed of Amy, Doug, Cristin, and Jack and Sherilyn was formed. Hopefully, a vision statement will be proposed, and we will consider voting on it at the Spring Congregational Meeting.

Jim announced that the board has approved revisions to the Strategic Plan. The Plan lost its direction during the pandemic and needed to be revised to include what is in place now instead of where we were before the pandemic. The pandemic changed the landscape for a lot of churches and organizations.

I am happy to welcome Paula and Larry Jennings, who have volunteered to maintain our grounds. We can all be really pleased with their eagerness and skill. The grounds look a lot better under their care. Please thank them when you get a chance.

We still need another person to help with Conversation and Calories on the 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday of each month. The Worship Team is pleading for additional people to help with planning and presenting each Sunday's morning assembly. This is a function that we must maintain as the center of our church mission. People are needed as Worship Associates (those who read the parts that are not part of the discourse.) People are also needed to be part of the Worship Team (those who design our worship and upload the service to You Tube.) Please contact Marla to volunteer.

At the time of the Fall Meeting, the NTUUC grants committee had not yet met about our request for funds for minister compensation, so we could search for a minister. They met on October 28<sup>th</sup>, so I hope Jim will have more information by the time this newsletter is published.

If you are as excited about our tiny congregation as I am, I invite you to seek ways that you can be more involved in this adventure of having a UU church in Texoma. Yes, we are few, but there are droves of potential UU's within our reach. We live in a culture where locals unabashedly talk with strangers about their faith – checkout lines are a great place to talk about an open religion. If those folks can do it, so can we.

November 7: **Texas voters** will decide on fourteen amendments to the Constitution this coming November 7. The 88<sup>th</sup> Legislature passed these earlier this year and the voting public decides if these changes will benefit or not. For the complete list of the ballot for your area, go to Grayson County Elections. The amendments are listed there as well as a section which explains what the legal wording means. November 14: Oklahoma voters go to the polls Tuesday, November 14 to decide their Special Elections, Candidates and Propositions. Early voting is Thursday, November 9 and Friday, November 10. Go to your County Elections website for details. OK voter guide <u>here</u>.

Money Matters

In the month of September, we had total receipts of \$2,957.61. Total expenses for the month were \$4,568.92, leaving us with a net loss for the month of (\$1,611.31). The net loss for the month was primarily due to costs of improving building security and to the timing of various other budgeted costs.

We had a net profit for the fiscal year-to-date of \$3,494.61. The year-to-date net profit was primarily due to the timing of pledge income, partly offset by costs to improve building security and the timing of various other budgeted costs.

As of September 30, 2023, we had \$13,559.89 available in checking. There is a total of \$20,747.33 in the bank savings account, including \$4,352.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the Endowment Fund for minister compensation, if needed.
