It is now official. The full NTUUC Board met on November 26th and voted unanimously to fund our full grant request of \$90,000. A big thank you goes out to Daniel Polk and Marilyn Alexander for making this happen.

Now the work for finding candidates begins. The Minister Search Team has submitted our completed application to the UUA through their web portal. It is now being reviewed by our UUA representative, Cameron Young with our Southern Region. I have a phone meeting with Cameron on Friday, December 1, to see what they recommend for our next steps.

We have sent a copy of our application to Daniel Polk. He says he may know of some candidates. A copy of our application was sent to Rev. Mark Davies so he can pass it on to any of his colleagues who might show some interest. We also sent a copy to Rev. Cooper with First UU in Houston who may also know of some possible candidates.

Since my last letter, we have received word that our NTUUC grant for potential minister compensation has been approved by the endowment committee in an evening zoom meeting on November 26th. I am our congregation's representative on the NTUUC Board as they reviewed the grant and after many questions, they approved the grant funding unanimously. So, the Minister Search Team is actively working to complete the UUA Ministerial on-line portal to advertising for prospective ministers and is currently completing the interview questions for applicants.

At our Fall Meeting we talked briefly about rewriting our vision statement. A vision statement should be an image of how the community will be changed just by having Red River UU as a presence in it. The statement should not have verbs. A sample is: "a more welcoming and accepting society in Texoma." We have a group of folks who volunteered to be on a

vision writing committee. To give the committee broader input, let's meet after the Morning Assembly in the chapel on December 10th to brainstorm ideas. Bring your plate from Conversation & Calories and let's converse! **December 10th – Plan on it!**



Money Matters

In the month of October, we had total receipts of \$4,413.00. Total expenses for the month were \$4,510.39, leaving us with a very small net loss for the month of (\$97.39). The net loss for the month was primarily due to costs for additional trifold brochures partly offset by the timing of pledges.

We had a net profit for the fiscal year-to-date of \$3,397.22. The year-to-date net profit was primarily due to the timing of income, partly offset by costs to improve building security and the timing of various other costs.

As of October 31, 2023, we had \$13,462.50 available in checking. There is a total of \$20,747.33 in the bank savings account, including \$4,642.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living.



There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the Endowment Fund for minister compensation, if needed.

From our non resident Poet

Stille Nacht/Silent Night - A Christmas story by Don Mathis

"7 O'clock News/Silent Night" by Simon & Garfunkel came out in the mid-60s, about the time I began to think. The traditional song starts out strongly but then a voice-over comes in with the evening news.

The events of the day (crime, politics, war) become louder as the carol grows fainter until only the news is heard. The end is a Walter Cronkite-type voice bidding all a good-night.

Silent Night" by Johnny Cash provides a traditional melody, but his harsh voice offers a juxtaposition in this folk song.

A dozen seasons later, my neighbor's son sang it in the original German at a Christmas concert. The voice of a 10-year-old child is heartrendingly beautiful while the Germanic language is so gravelly guttural, yet this child combined the words and music so hauntingly.

Years later, I heard the story of the Christmas truce during World War One. German troops singing "Stille Nacht" were answered by British solders singing "Silent Night." The suspension of hostilities that followed allowed enemies to become friends for a spell.



Cigarettes and stories were shared. Each viewed the other's photographs of loved ones. And, for a while, the combatants saw each other as human. Again, I appreciate the friction in this 200-year-old song, this time between war and peace, between enmity and fraternity.

What is it about this song — what is it about me — that finds the antithesis of "Silent Night" so fascinating? I think it allows me to see the peace that should be, the compassion that lives within each of us, and the love that is.

May your season be calm and bright. And may you sleep in heavenly peace.
