Minister Search Update

The Minister Search Team met in November with the new members. We thanked Jana Norris and David Dyer for their help and welcomed Liz Rapp and Walter Norris as their replacements.

For our first agenda item we discussed a resume we received from a person interested in our open minister position. This person had no formal minister training or experience, so we voted to not pursue them further.

Next, we went over the search and selection process. This process covers from our UUA Minister Search Portal activity to selecting a candidate and turning them over to the Board for final compensation negotiation and Membership approval. Starting Dec 1, ministerial candidates apply for open positions that UU churches have posted in the UUA Minister Search Portal. Fingers crossed that we would get some good candidates of interest.

Finally, we reviewed our list of questions for candidates.

We are now refining both the search and selection process and questions list to bring them up to current thinking. These are both living documents so need ongoing review and need a certain flexibility when needed.

We will meet again on December 12.

During all this update activity we discovered that the Bay Window in the room across from the kitchen had a bad leak during a heavy rainstorm. That leak has been repaired.

Money Matters

The new year started in July 2024 with a very generous donation of \$50,000 from Marilyn Alexander's daughter, Merrilee Kick. An additional \$10,361.00 was donated in October 2024. A total of \$54,138.44 has been spent on repairs and renovations. That leaves \$6,222.56 remaining in this fund as of October 31 which is expected to be spent in November.

In the month of October, we had total operating receipts of \$12,773.50. Total operating expenses for the month were \$3,975.05, leaving us with a net profit for the month of \$8,798.45. The net profit for the month was due to the timing of pledge payments.

For the fiscal year-to-date we had an operating net profit of \$6,496.20. The year-to-date net profit was due to the timing of pledge payments.

As of October 31, 2024, we had \$22,255.35 available in checking for general operations. There was also \$9,934.74 available in the bank savings account for general operations plus \$4,871.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. In addition, we invested a total of \$66,784.40 in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation.
