# "Share the Bowl" History

Before Covid19 Red River Unitarian Universalists had a tradition of Share the Bowl. At the time we did it just one Sunday a month. However, it is recommended that that churches do it every Sunday. In this practice, all cash that is deposited in the bowl each Sunday is donated to charity unless it is otherwise designated.

Currently we have two charities we donate to. The Texoma Earth Day Festival and The Texoma Family Shelter.

The Worship Team would like to restart the weekly cash donation going to these two charities. We would collect for six months and then divide the proceeds between the two entities. This is also a social justice program as well.

Comments from other churches on their Share the Plate efforts:

"So often there seems to be a disconnect between what we do in our worship and the real-world expression of our values. This practice makes a clear and intentional connection. I think members are hungry for concrete ways to regularly express their values. And this is more tangible for people than just giving a percentage of the budget." Dupage Unitarian Universalist Church in Naperville, Illinois member Dean Reschke says of their sharing program. \*

James Lieb, a member of the East Brunswick congregation, said he had not been in the habit of putting money in the bowl, apart from pledge payments, until the congregation began giving the money away. "Now that the money goes for a special purpose, I'll put in \$10 for whatever the cause is. It's only a few hundred dollars a year for me, but when you add it to what everyone else donates, it adds up. And it also opens up one's perspective. I'm giving to charities I'd never heard of before. It feels like an incredibly positive thing to do.\*

As of November 30, 2024, we had \$23,589.04 available in checking for general operations. There was also \$9,934.74 available in the bank savings account for general operations plus \$4,871.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. In addition, we invested a total of \$66,784.40 in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation. *Carole Harner, Treasurer*.
