The discussion, or Asset Mapping, focused on aspects of resources of a community with the intention of leveraging those assets for the common good. However, an hour is not sufficient to fully discuss what's good about Red River UU. And there is always room for improvement. To continue our discussion, it was agreed to set a time for our Social Action Team to meet regularly the fourth Sunday each month.

Beginning December 28 at 1 pm, Red River UU Social Action Team will meet to further explore ways we can increase our Solidarity as an organization so that we might further implement ways to support our community and Texoma. Treasurer's Report

For the fiscal year-to-date period of July 1 through October 31, we had an operating net profit of \$7,511.96. This was due to the timing of pledge donations, partially offset by expenses for yardwork.

We continue to expect to have a loss this fiscal year due to lower pledges and additional expenses for yard work.

As of October 31, 2025, we had \$23,276.95 available to be used for general operations in our bank checking account, \$9,955.00 available in our bank savings account, and approximately \$23,967.06 available in our UUA savings fund. The amount available in the UUA savings fund varies based on market value. In addition, we have the following restricted amounts: \$4,871.08 in our bank savings account restricted for the Minister Fund; \$5,951.89 in our bank savings account held in trust for Kat Walston; \$424.67 in our

bank checking account for share the plate; \$16,518.51 in the endowment fund; \$51,000.00 restricted in the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation; and \$21,053.06 restricted to cover continuing and renovations to the building and to increase visibility in the community in order to grow membership.

If you have yet to meet any of them, introduce yourself to them so y'all can get better acquainted.


Dinner for the Shelter

Not this year. Tommy Pigott, a State Department spokesperson, said the Trump administration was modernizing its approach to countering infectious diseases. So far this year, the White House has issued proclamations for dozens of other observances, including World Autism Awareness Day, National Manufacturing Day and World Intellectual Property Day.
